Since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month, which is an annual celebration of achievements by Black Americans and a time for recognizing the central role of African Americans in U.S. history. Black History Month was the brainchild of historian [Carter G. Woodson](#) and other prominent African Americans.
