EVALUATION OF METHODS AND STRATEGIES:

(1) Grades 9-12, Advanced Placement (AP), IB and AICE

The following percentages reflect within race/ethnicity calculations for students enrolled in AP/IB/AICE courses. In 2010-11, 15% of Whites, 4% of Blacks, 16% of Hispanics, 14% of White Males, 3% of Black Males, and 16% of Hispanic Males were enrolled. In 2014-15, 19% of Whites (an increase of 4 percentage points), 5% of Blacks (an increase of 1 percentage point), 16% of Hispanics (no increase or decrease of percentage points), 15% of White Males (an increase of 1 percentage point), 4% of Black Males (an increase of 1 percentage point), and 11% of Hispanic Males (a decrease of 5 percentage points) were enrolled.

- The District implemented a plan for identifying upcoming seventh grade students for Algebra
 I to enable those students access to greater math opportunities in high school, including Dual
 Enrollment and Advanced Placement courses. Current sixth grade students will be taking a
 comprehensive seventy grade test to help determine early Algebra placement.
- All courses will be implementing new Florida Standards while maintaining a rigorous curriculum to ensure students are prepared for their next mathematics course.

Evidence of Success

The evaluation reveals progress in increasing enrollment in AP/IB/AICE courses for Black and Hispanic students in grades 9-12. Black students increased by 1 percentage point, from 4% in 2010-11 to 5% in 2014-15; Hispanic students remained constant at 16 percentage points, from 16% to 16% for the same time period.

The evaluation reveals progress in increasing enrollment in AP/IB/AICE courses for Black male students in grades 9-12. Black male students increased by 1 percentage point, from 3% in 2010-11 to 4% in 2014-15; Hispanic male students decreased 5 percentage points from 16% to 11% for the same time period.

- The new Florida math course descriptions do not have an overlap of standards between grade levels; therefore, it is more difficult for students to accelerate to Algebra I by skipping a course. The District has offered the opportunity to an identified group of rising sixth graders to take a competency-based sixth grade math course. This will allow one year of acceleration and ensure the student reaches Algebra I in eighth grade. During the summer of 2016, this opportunity will be repeated for students to accelerate a second year.
- To assist middle schools in offering courses beyond Algebra I, virtual courses are offered as needed.
- Elementary and secondary mathematics specialists offered two parent information nights to provide information on math advancement. The events were recorded and posted on the district website.
- Elementary schools identified all rising sixth grade students that met the criteria for an advance math program.
- Two middle schools and two high schools are participating in the Florida College Board Partnership.

In 2014-15, 7% of Whites (an increase of 1 percentage point), 1% of Blacks (no increase or decrease of percentage points), 5% of Hispanics (an increase of 1 percentage point), 5% of White Males (no increase or decrease of percentage points), 1% of Black Males (no increase or decrease of percentage points), and 3% of Hispanic Males (no increase or decrease of percentage points) were enrolled.

In 2014-15, 56% of Whites (an increase of 2 percentage points), 30% of Blacks (an increase of 5 percentage points), 50% of Hispanics (an increase of 4 percentage points), 52% of White Males (an increase of 5 percentage points), 25% of Black Males (an increase of 5 percentage points), and 47% of Hispanic Males (an increase of 8 percentage points) were enrolled.

The data in the report does represent the District's demographic data. However, the District's data reveals a disparity between the make-up of the District's student population and the workforce employed by the District in the administrative and instructional areas.

The District implemented a new procedure for the 2009-2010 academic year concerning annual contract non-renewal which is continuing. All annual contract non-renewals are reviewed during the staffing process to ensure compliance will all Federal, State and District laws, case law, guidelines, initiatives (including Florida Equity Act) and rules. The review process is an effort to continue the District's initiative to recruit and retain certified/highly qualified gender specific and minority instructors. Superintendent Thomas considers the District's diversity plan objectives formulated under the Florida Equity Act when reviewing selections for administrative and professional appointments.

The District continues to use the administrative evaluative instrument to access each site based administrator's progress in employing a diversified work force as evidenced by School Board Rule 2.04 (14) (Diversity Component) requiring the Diversity Component be a part of all principals' evaluation.

Despite the difficult economic situation in the State of Florida, the District gave a 4% pay raise during the 2014-2015 academic year which assisted in boosting our starting teacher salaries closer to the state average. This raise allows the District to become more competitive in our effort to recruit minority instructors into the District. We are continuing to address the District's position financially to determine if we can address our salary issue for the 2015-2016 academic year.

The data contained in the report reflect an increase in hiring black teachers from 322 to 356 an increase from 16% to 17.42% an increase of 1.42% and an increase in Hispanic teachers by .51% over the 2013-2014 academic year. We showed increases in hiring black guidance counselors from 50% to 57.14%, an increase of 7.14% during the same time period. We also showed increases in hiring black district administrators from 6% to 9.62%, an increase of 3.62%, and an increase in Hispanic district administrators by 1.49%. We have also instituted a training component for individuals seeking entrance into our principal pool (prerequisite for school based administrative positions). This component is to ensure individuals previously not successful the opportunity to increase their ability to make the cut scores for entrance into the pool. This training component has been highly successful.

In the spring of 2015, we sent recruiting teams to 16 institutions and held a teacher fair in Escambia County. Part of our recruit efforts was to attract minority graduates into our teaching positions. The recruiting team provided teaching contracts to many individuals including 33 minority graduates from the college recruiting trips. We also had over 500 individuals attend our teacher fair looking for teaching jobs within Escambia County School District. We continue to place great emphasis on attracting individuals typically underrepresented in our teaching ranks into the profession.

This contract provides a full time Case Manager to conduct a group instruction with pregnant and parenting students in monthly support groups to cover such topics as: pregnancy/prenatal care, labor and delivery, medical services for parents and infants, child development, parenting skills, infant care, Healthy Start program, substance abuse prevention, child abuse/neglect prevention, relationships and domestic violence, employment skills, family planning with emphasis on sexual abstinence, and available community resources/contacts/locations.

Our district does not operate a single facility for pregnant and parenting students.
