STRUCTURE

Twenty-three (23) PIC provided career specialists work in Boston high Schools to link classroom learning with career aspirations. This is accomplished by placements in workplace experiences and community-based programs.

Most private sector placements are competitive. PIC specialists prepare and match students with positions. Students with greater technical skills have more options and usually better pay and more responsibility.

Work experiences are sourced and coordinated by dedicated PIC Employer Account Managers. From industry-leading companies to neighborhood small businesses, employers include State Street, Brigham and Women's Hospital, Aramark, Bank of America, and Vertex Pharmaceuticals.

OVERVIEW

The **Boston Private Industry Council (PIC)** is the city's Workforce Development Board and its school-to-career intermediary. Under the leadership of Mayor Martin J. Walsh, the PIC oversees Boston's one-stop career centers and the federal investment in job training.

PIC also deploys a talented and highly motivated staff (career specialists and employer account managers) to generate workplace experiences and to help create pathways that lead from high school to early career, while re-engaging those young adults who have fallen behind. They collaborate with business, the Boston Public Schools (BPS), higher education, government, labor, and community organizations.
