





# Prior to the BRIDGES Grant, the DCSS high school student advisory program consisted of:

- Random assignment of students to groups each year
- ❖Inconsistent scheduling
- ❖Mainly used for:
  - Student schedule and report card distribution
  - ❖Distribution of school-wide information
  - Annual registration conferences




#### Let's Get Real






