- Understand the law: Copyright law protects literary works, paintings, photographs, drawings, films, music, choreography, and sculpture. Many companies have copyright lawyers that look for people who use copyrighted materials without permission and will enforce their copyrights with a lawsuit.
- Do not take anything from the internet. This would include screen shots, scanned items or pictures from a search engine like Google images. It is almost always copyrighted. - o Be imaginative. Create your own ideas such as original photos, drawings, movies, music etc...
