At the time your students took the recent ISBE-Sponsored SAT exam, they had the ability to send their scores to up to four colleges or scholarship organizations by writing the affiliated code directly on their answer sheet. Unfortunately, some colleges were left off the code list provided by the College Board.

We apologize for this error. To make it up to your students, we are offering them the chance to send their scores for free to up to four of the colleges missing from the initial list, in addition to those they previously selected. Students may make up to four selections from the list below.

To take advantage of additional score sends, students must call the Illinois Educator Customer Service line at 1-844-688-9995 no later than **7 p.m. CT on Friday, May 26**. The score sends will be free for **up to four of the schools listed above**. College Board will not cover rush fees. Any extra score reports or those sent after the deadline will incur a cost of \$12 each.
