Never make a list for an answer to a constructed response question!

Now you're ready to begin your answer.

R-Restate or reword question

- * Reword question for topic sentence or thesis statement
- * Include title and author of work being discussed

*Thesis statement example

R-Restate/reword

*Answer the question...

Use evidence from the text to support your answer. Cite specific lines or details from the work.
