

- Crossroad was commissioned for the dedication of a bridge sculpture at BHMS.




Culture

About Fitzgerald

- Settled in 1896 by a land company under the direction of Philander H. Fitzgerald, the town is best known as a place of reconciliation among Civil War (1861-65) veterans. A festival in downtown Fitzgerald. The town is still known today as the "City Where America Reunited."
- Annual Pioneer Picnics were held in Blue & Gray Park to honor the veterans until their numbers dwindled away in the 1940s. Their legacy lives today in the Blue & Gray Musuem housed in the restored A,B,&A depot. Artifacts brought home from the war reside along with tokens of early life in Fitzgerald.
- It was settled in 1895 after the governor of Georgia, William J. Northern, sponsored a relief train to Midwesterners suffering from a severe drought.
