

CTAE - What Does it Mean?

- CTAE Career, Technical and Agricultural Education
 - Sometimes referred to as CTE
- CTAE department is responsible for career and leadership development of students in middle and high schools
- CTAE provides all students with the opportunity to select three sequenced electives in a career pathway
 - Along with academic course work
- Will prepare students to continue education at any level or to enter the world of work





Career Cluster vs Career Pathway

Career Clusters

- Contain occupations in the same field of work requiring similar skills
- Help focus education plans towards obtaining necessary knowledge, competencies, and training
- Helps students discover their interests and passion
- 16 Career Clusters representing more than 79 Career Pathways

Career Pathways

- Are state-approved career enhancement programs
- Sequence of academic and career related courses
- Can lead to an industryrecognized certificate or license
- Education beyond high school would still be required





 - Examples: Integrity, accountability, punctuality
- Communicates effectively both verbally and nonverbally

- Builds essential work relationships
- Show proficiency at managing self and time
- Performs well in a team environment
- Demonstrates excellent customer service skills
- Solve problems effectively
- Demonstrates job getting and keeping skills




End of Pathway Assessment (EOPA)

- What is the End of Pathway Assessment (EOPA)?
 - Established to measure the level of technical skill attained in specific CTAE pathway.
- These assessments are valid and reliable assessments linked directly to industry validated standards
- Who can take the EOPA?
 - Students who have successfully completed the three designated courses or
 - Currently enrolled in the last designated course in the pathway and be on track to successfully complete the last course
- EOPA will gauge the level of student achievement as a result of career pathway completion
- Students leave high school with industry-recognized credentials
 - Could possibly lead to increased earning potential throughout career span
