






Dual Enrollment






Early College

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Articulation

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MOWR vs. ACCEL


- The funding source
 - •FTE vs. Georgia lottery funds
- Enrollment hours required

 - ACCEL students may attend part-time or full-time
 MOWR requires the student be enrolled full-time (12 semester hours)
- •HOPE Scholarship maximum hourly caps
 - •ACCEL hours count against the hourly caps
 - •MOWR hours do not count against the hourly caps
- Course selection
 - •ACCEL student limited to ACCEL course directory which is limited to core classes.
 - •MOWR students are eligible to take course that may be used to satisfy a high school graduation requirement.



MOWR— The New One

Let us look at the MOWR law so I can point out some of the important pieces that are guiding us in this program development.

AN ACT

repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

(c) The department shall develop appropriate forms and counseling guidelines for the program and shall make such forms and guidelines available to local school systems and eligible institutions. No later than the first day of April each year, each local school system shall provide general information about the program, including such forms, to all its tenth and eleventh grade students. A local school system shall also provide counseling services in accordance with the counseling guidelines provided by the department to such students and their parents or guardians before the students enroll in the program. Prior to participating in the program, the student and the student's parent or guardian shall sign the form provided by the school system or by an eligible institution stating that they have received the counseling specified in this subsection and that they understand the responsibilities that shall be assumed in participating in the program.

Education shall approve any such course which is substantially comparable to a state approved course. The secondary credit granted shall be for the comparable course and course hours approved by the State Board of Education. Upon completion of an eligible institution's approved course, the eligible student shall be responsible for requesting that the institution notify the student's local school system regarding his or her grade in that course.



Who Is NOT Eligible To Participate?

- •Students who were not enrolled in a Georgia public high school during the two previous FTE counts.
- Students attending private schools.
- Students participating in a home school program.
- •Students who recently moved to the state and were not included in the October and March FTE counts. (Military Exemption)
- •Students who are not determined by the high school to be a resident of Georgia. (Military Exception)
- Students not on track to graduate.
- •Students who did not meet the college's MOWR/DE requirements.





Who is eligible to participate?

Definitions...

- •An *eligible student* is "a student entering the 11th or 12th grade who spent the prior school year in attendance at a public high school in the state."
- Eligible institution means any eligible postsecondary institution (PSI) as defined in Code Section 20-3-519

approved course at that institution, whether or not the course is taught during the regular public school day, and receive secondary credit therefor under the conditions provided in this Code section. An eligible institution which accepts an eligible student authorized to apply for enrollment under the program shall not receive any state funds for that student unless such institution complies with the requirements of this Code section regarding eligible institutions. (c) The department shall develop appropriate forms and counseling guidelines for the program and shall make such forms and guidelines available to local school systems and eligible institutions. No later than the first day of April each year, each local school system shall provide general information about the program, including such forms, to all its tenth and eleventh grade students. A local school system shall also provide counseling services in accordance with the counseling guidelines provided by the department to such students and their parents or guardians before the students enroll in the program. Prior to participating in the program, the student and the student's parent or guardian shall sign the form provided by the school system or by an eligible institution stating that they have received the counseling

(d)(1) A local school system shall grant academic credit to an eligible student enrolled in a course in an eligible institution if that course has been approved by the State Board of Education and if such student successfully completes that course. The State Board of Education shall approve any such course which is substantially comparable to a state approved course. The secondary credit granted shall be for the comparable course and course hours approved by the State Board of Education. Upon completion of an eligible institution's approved course, the eligible student shall be responsible for requesting that the institution notify the student's local school system regarding his or her grade in that course.

(2) Secondary school credits granted for eligible institution courses under paragraph (1) of this subsection shall be counted toward State Board of Education graduation requirements and subject area requirements of the local school system. Evidence of successful completion of each course and secondary credits granted shall be included in the eligible student's secondary school records.

award a mgn school diploma to any engible student who is enrolled at an eligible institution under the program as long as the credit earned at such institution satisfies course requirements needed for the eligible student to complete high school graduation. The department shall consult the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia and the State Board of Technical and Adult Education in developing rules and regulations to be recommended to the State Board of Education for approval regarding the eligibility criteria for program participation.

(e)(1) The department shall pay to eligible institutions through appropriation of state funds the lesser of the following amounts for each participating eligible student enrolled therein, less a records fee of \$200.00 for administration costs of the local school system:

- (A) The actual cost of tuition, materials, and fees directly related to the courses taken by the eligible student at such institution; or
- (B) The amount that the participating eligible student would have earned under this article if he or she had been in equivalent instructional programs in the local school system.
- (2) The total allotment of state funds to the local school system in which a participating student is enrolled at an eligible institution pursuant to this Code section shall be calculated as otherwise provided in this article with an ensuing reduction equivalent to the amount of state funds appropriated to such eligible institution pursuant to this subsection.

- (2) Secondary school credits granted for eligible institution courses under paragraph (1) of this subsection shall be counted toward State Board of Education graduation requirements and subject area requirements of the local school system. Evidence of successful completion of each course and secondary credits granted shall be included in the eligible student's secondary school records.
- (3) The State Board of Education shall establish rules to require local school systems to award a high school diploma to any eligible student who is enrolled at an eligible institution under the program as long as the credit earned at such institution satisfies course requirements needed for the eligible student to complete high school graduation. The department shall consult the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia and the State Board of Technical and Adult Education in developing rules and regulations to be

Funding

- (i) Any person who knowingly makes or furnishes any false statement or misrepresentation, or who accepts such statement or misrepresentation knowing it to be false, for the purpose of enabling an eligible institution to obtain wrongfully any payment under this Code section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."

SECTION 3.

All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.

- (3) The records fee contained in paragraph (1) of this subsection may be increased by the State Board of Education by up to 4 percent annually, at the board's sole discretion.
- (4) An eligible institution shall not charge an eligible student for coursework taken pursuant to this program and shall accept the payment made pursuant to paragraph (1) of this subsection as full payment for such eligible student.
- (f) The State Board of Education shall establish rules and regulations relating to applicable state and federal testing requirements for eligible students participating in the program.
- (g) An eligible student enrolled in an eligible institution for secondary credit shall not be eligible for any other state student financial aid at an eligible institution for courses taken

(h) Hours for courses taken at an eligible institution pursuant to this Code section by a participating eligible student shall not count against any maximum hourly caps which may be applicable for purposes of HOPE scholarships or grants.

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More On Funding...

"An eligible student enrolled in an eligible institution for secondary credit shall not be eligible for any other state student financial aid at an eligible institution for courses taken under the program."

"Hours for courses taken at an eligible institution... shall not count against any maximum hourly caps which may be applicable for purposes of HOPE scholarships or grants."



Responsibilities Of The Local System

- 1) Inform parents and students of MOWR.
- 2) Provide counseling services to interested parents and students.
- 3) Student must <u>complete and sign</u> the *Move on When* Ready Participation Permission Form.



Responsibilities Continued

- 4) Make sure the student meets entrance requirements for the college, university, or technical college they wish to attend.
- 5) Students must meet all state assessment requirements.
- 6) Testing will be done on local system's schedule.
- 7) MOWR Application.



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How Is Credit Awarded?

Secondary credit for postsecondary courses will be awarded according to the following conversion beginning in the 2010-2011 school year:

One to two semester hour credits = .5 high school unit credit Three to five semester hour credit = 1 high school unit credit One to three quarter hour credits = .5 high school unit credit Four to eight quarter hour credit = 1 high school unit credit



MOWR Courses

What does this mean?

- •Currently, the only courses approved as comparable courses are those found in the Accel Directory and the Dual Enrollment Matrix.
- •Eventually, the MOWR list will expand to include other stateapproved courses that can be taken to meet high school graduation courses.



Links To MOWR Courses

Courses at an eligible institution to be used are to be approved by the State Board of Education and they are to be comparable to a state approved course.
