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1	MS. STOUFFER: Good evening,
2	everyone. Thank you for being patient as we
3	were able to readjust our room from our
4	previous meeting.
5	Good evening. I declare this
6	public meeting to be open. My name is Denise
7	Stouffer, and I'm the lead education
8	associate. I have been appointed by the
9	Secretary of Education to conduct this public
10	hearing.
11	The Early College High School at
12	Delaware State University charter school has
13	filed an application to renew its charter for
14	a term of five years. As is required by law,
15	this matter was referred to the Charter School
16	Accountability Committee for investigation and
17	report. This joint public hearing is being
18	held by the Department of Education and the
19	State Board of Education.
20	I'd like to introduce Donna
21	Johnson of the State Board of Education.
22	MS. JOHNSON: Hello.
23	MS. STOUFFER: And Catherine
24	Hickey, a deputy attorney general for the

Department of Education.

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I would like the record to reflect that the public notice of the time, date and place of today's public hearing was published in The News Journal and the Delaware State News on September 9th, 2017. addition, notice was posted at the Charter School Accountability Committee's official place of business, on the Delaware Department of Education's official website, and on the State Public Meeting Calendar on the state's Further, the Early College official website. High School at Delaware State University charter school was personally notified of the time, date and place of today's public hearing on September 9th, 2017.

A court reporter is present so that the record of this hearing can be made. It will be necessary for each speaker to clearly identify his- or herself before beginning to speak so that the court reporter will be able to note who you are. The record of this hearing will be provided to the Secretary of Education and the members of the

1	State Board of Education, together with any
2	written or electronic comments received during
3	the course of the renewal decision process.
4	To date, there have been no comments received
5	on this renewal application.
6	We will proceed in the following
7	manner. First, we will hear from any
8	representatives of the charter school who wish
9	to comment on the renewal application. Then
10	we will take comments from anyone else who
11	desires to speak. There was a sign-up sheet
12	at the door. And there continues to be a
13	sign-up sheet in the back of the room on the
14	table right outside the door. If you desire
15	to speak and you haven't done so already
16	please sign up now. I will pause for a moment
17	for anyone who desires to sign up to speak.
18	Okay. Can I please have a show
19	of hands of who desires to make a comment this
20	evening so I can determine whether it may be
21	necessary to impose a time limit?
22	I'd like to go off the record a
23	moment.
24	



1	(A brief discussion was held off
2	the record.)
3	MS. STOUFFER: Considering the
4	number of people that would like to speak, I
5	would like to be as liberal as possible with
6	the time. However, I'd like everyone to limit
7	their comments to five minutes. I also
8	reserve the right to limit comment if it's
9	purely repetitive or cumulative.
10	At this point I will accept
11	comments from any representatives of the
12	school.
13	DR. HORTON: Good evening.
14	My name is Marsha Horton. I'd
15	like to start this evening with a brief
16	explanation of what an early college high
17	school is.
18	The early college model is an
19	initiative in the United States initially
20	funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates
21	Foundation. It allows students to receive a
22	high school diploma and up to two years of
23	college credit by taking a combination of high
24	school and college classes. The primary goal

1 is to increase student access to 2 post-secondary credentials. According to a study completed by the American Institutes for 3 4 Research, early college students are more likely to graduate from high school, more 5 likely to enroll in college, and more likely 6 7 to earn college degrees. There are over 300 early college 8 high schools in this country, but there is 9 10 only one in Delaware. We are unique. 11 unique because we offer opportunity. We are 12 unique because we offer a personalized learning environment within the context of 13 14 project-based learning. We are unique because 15 we offer options. Students can take courses 16 in 41 of the 42 majors offered by Delaware 17 State University. The only exception is 18 aviation, due to the age of our students. We are unique because our students have full 19 access to DSU's accomplished faculty and 20 21 resources. This provides opportunities for internship and community partnerships not 22 This relationship is also a 23 easily found. 24 direct benefit to the university as it

1	reflects its core values of outreach,
2	community, scholarship, diversity and
3	integrity.
4	Nowhere else in the state can
5	you earn up to 60 credits of college course
6	work while still in high school. Nowhere else
7	in the state can you earn those credits
8	tuition free. The cost of tuition is an
9	in-kind contribution by Delaware State
10	University who made a decision to invest in
11	the future of our students. Nowhere else in
12	the state can you earn those credits without
13	having to sit for a special exam.
14	Do our students test? Are they
15	assessed? Absolutely. They are assessed with
16	the same instruments the other college
17	students are assessed with quizzes,
18	projects, presentations and exams.
19	As of the end of the spring 2017
20	semester, our then ninth through eleventh
21	grade students have earned 3,588 credits.
22	With their being 282 students, that's an
23	average of over 12 credits per student. If
24	you consider only the seniors the current

1 seniors -- they have earned an average of 32 credits before their senior year. 2 The only Early College High 3 4 School represents a dream and a promise for our community at large, but specifically for 5 6 parents and students. 7 Today I am wearing multiple I am president of the board of 8 hats. directors for the Early College High School. 9 I am dean for the College of Education, Health 10 11 and Public Policy at Delaware State 12 University. So I have the opportunity to see firsthand how powerful this relationship is 13 14 and can be. Third -- and most importantly --15 I am the parent of a child that attends the 16 Early College High School. 17 My daughter is strong and 18 bright, but academic success has not always come easy for her. She has to study and she 19 has to work hard. She wants to be a doctor, 20 21 and it was her decision to go to the Early College High School. 22 Her reasoning: 23 if I can get started on my college classes 24 early, then the sooner I can graduate and go

1 on to medical school." It has been exciting to see her 2 3 come home from school focused on completing 4 the hours -- yes, hours -- of homework, yet committed enough to hear her -- show her own 5 success so that her dad and I don't have to 6 7 nag and push and nag and push and nag and push 8 some more. She sometimes gets weary, but she 9 never gives up. She is fully supported by her 10 team of teachers without regard to anything 11 besides her wonderful potential. There are no 12 favorites. They see her as who she is -- a young lady who has a desire to excel. 13 We are 14 behind her and they are behind her. And she 15 knows that beyond a shadow of a doubt. 16 I am very proud of the Early 17 College High School at Delaware State 18 University. In three short years, they have accomplished what many thought was impossible. 19 And we have only just begun. 20 21 Thank you. Good evening. 22 DR. EDNEY: 23 My name is Dr. Evelyn Edney, 24 I'm the very proud principal at the Early



College High School at Delaware State
University. We are in our fourth year of
serving students from all three counties in
the entire State of Delaware.

Our basic goal is to take 13and 14-year-olds and make them college ready
within a year or two so that they can be fully
enrolled in college courses by the time they
are juniors. People may think we are crazy to
do this. I can speak for our entire staff
when I say this is the hardest job that we've
ever had. But I can also say with resounding
enthusiasm we would not trade any of it for
the world.

journey in the ninth grade year where they take accelerated high school courses in all core areas. The ninth grade year is for skill building and being aware of the factors that make a student college ready. The ninth graders are in an academy for their first year with teachers whose job it is to set high expectations and to coach them up so that they get the gravity of taking rigorous courses.

In their sophomore year, the students continue with their high school courses and focus on choosing a program of study based on 41 of the 42 majors that DSU has to offer. By their junior and senior year, the goal is for the students to take anywhere from nine to fifteen college credits each semester. All of these credits are introductory courses that any freshman at DSU can take.

ECHS students are treated the same. But in order to do this, we stress the importance of being college ready. There is something so rewarding when a student's ECHS college readiness rubric scores them as being college ready. For the student, it means that they can be on a college campus, sitting in a college classroom next to college students taking college courses with a college curriculum earning college credit. For the teachers, a student being college ready means the work they have been doing with the student is valued and meaningful.

There are many ways to earn college credit in the country through



International Baccalaureate and Advanced Placement programs, but there is no program like this in the state -- or the region, for that matter. And ECHS students feel special as a result. We are so fortunate to have DSU in our lives. There's something magical that happens when you have a partner who is -- that has a vested interest in the growth of young people. Our students stand behind -- beside scientists and mathematicians and educators and learn from the DSU professors who have some of the greatest minds in the world. will be fortunate, even if a little bit of that genius rubs off on our students. And DSU allows all of this tuition free. I have begun my 27th year in Delaware public education, and I will be on this earth for 50 years in three more days. And I have never come across an educational experience like the students at ECHS get to experience every day. I am blessed to witness the -- witness this and how it affects these

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students' lives, their families' lives, their

1	communities and the world as a whole. And I
2	am awestruck that they have earned 3,588
3	credits before any of them have turned 18.
4	They are slated to earn another 900 this
5	semester and on track for over 2,000 for the
6	year just in time to graduate our very first
7	class in May.
8	You can probably tell how happy
9	I am to be part of such a wonderful
10	experience. It puts a smile on my face, and
11	I as I awake. And it gives me the reason I
12	get out of bed. We are so very proud of our
13	students and all they have accomplished. We
14	love our Hornets with their Hornet Pride.
15	(Clapping.)
16	Thank you.
17	MS. MC CANTS: Good evening.
18	I'm Nyia McCants. I'm the
19	assistant principal at the Early College High
20	School at Delaware State University.
21	I want to thank you for
22	providing us this opportunity to share
23	information about our school. Beyond what is
24	written in our renewal application, this

1	affords each of us the opportunity to put a
2	face to our submitted written application and
3	share our story.
4	I joined the ECHS family in June
5	2016 after being at a previous traditional
6	public school for eight years and, prior to
7	that, ten years in the alternative education
8	with DSCYF. To be honest, I was not
9	completely sure what I was walking into when I
10	accepted the position to enter into charter
11	world. I did know that I believe in the
12	vision and mission of what ECHS had to offer
13	young people in the State of Delaware.
14	Rewind back several years to
15	when I initially read that my alma mater,
16	Delaware State University, was a partner in
17	chartering a new high school where students
18	can earn up to 60 college credits upon
19	graduation. I thought to myself: I would
20	love to be a part of that school. Fast
21	forward to 2016, and I was presented with the
22	chance to join the team.
23	In my previous schools, there
24	have been challenges that the school community

needed to work through, and ECHS is not different as far as overcoming challenges. ECHS is different in the types of challenges we are faced with on a daily basis. We are a small charter school that has to be extremely creative in our resources to provide the best educational experience for our students. All of our staff where a lot of hats, as Dr. Horton mentioned earlier, on any given I will say that each of our staff day. members work tirelessly in what is in the best interest of our students and to prepare them for the next level to take college courses as young as 14 and 15 years old. The power of place is a reality for our students and staff every day on the campus of Delaware State University. students have a college-going mind-set much sooner than the average high school student. Early College High School at Delaware State University are working together to streamline processes that impact our students -- college registration, teaching spaces, applying for

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admission to Delaware State University and

1 student accommodations, just to name a few. 2 For most of our staff, the 3 charter renewal experience is a first. 4 believe in the future possibilities and advancement for our students and staff. 5 The 6 Early College High School staff has the 7 flexibility to be creative and innovative as 8 we impress upon our students to become 9 critical thinkers, college ready, and make our 10 mark on the world. 11 MR. YANCY: Good evening. 12 My name is Timothy Yancy. 13 the operations manager and athletic director 14 at Early College High School. I just wanted 15 to take a few moments to express my passion 16 and my -- just love for the Early College High School. 17 18 Early College High School is a place where students can dream big dreams, 19 whether it's in the classroom or whether it's 20 21 on the athletic field or court, on the school 22 bus, on the campus of Delaware State, at 23 homecoming, prom or graduation this year. 24 Students at ECHS are dreaming big dreams every

1	day. I believe our teachers, staff and
2	parents all are inspired by being a part of
3	Early College High School and dream big dreams
4	every day as well. It is our passion and
5	desire to encourage and empower and educate
6	these students. That makes us a great place
7	for kids.
8	The opportunity to earn 60
9	college credits is an amazing experience for
10	our Early College High School students. It is
11	a unique mix of being in a high school and
12	being at a college. This is an opportunity of
13	a lifetime. And I'm truly blessed to be a
14	part of this institution and work at the Early
15	College High School.
16	I come from the higher education
17	world. I spent nine years there. And I can
18	truly say that this is the best place that
19	I've enjoyed working with and am truly blessed
20	being with such outstanding individuals.
21	Thank you for your time.
22	MS. GILLIS: Good evening,
23	everyone.
24	My name is Crystal Gillis. I am



1	the PTSA parent/teacher/student
2	association president. And I'm a proud
3	parent as well.
4	When I when my daughter first
5	was going to high school, I thought, hmm,
6	let's look for something different. Then I
7	ran across Early College High School at DSU.
8	And I'm like, whoa, wait a minute. What is
9	this? You can get an associate's degree out
10	of high school? I'm loving this. Let's try
11	it.
12	She's like, "Oh."
13	Come on, Taylor.
14	She said, "Okay. Let's try it."
15	Taylor is a junior and Taylor is
16	loving it. And I too am a proud parent
17	National Honor Society student mother. You
18	know, I'm the proud parent.
19	The Early College High School is
20	a phenomenal place. The kids do dream big.
21	They can go further. Once they get their
22	associate's degree, they're going to continue
23	their education, because the kids are serious
24	students. So it is a great opportunity. And

1	I'm so proud to have her there. And I'm proud
2	that the school is still here.
3	Thank you.
4	MS. ALLEN: Good evening.
5	My name is Stacy Allen, and I am
6	the vice president of the PTSA at Early
7	College High School.
8	What can I say?
9	To begin, when the opportunity
10	arised (sic) for my daughter to go to high
11	school, I was very apprehensive to send her to
12	this school. We were walking in the mall, and
13	they were having their registration
14	advertisement. They were out trying to tell
15	students about the school.
16	And my daughter is like, "Mom,
17	look at this."
18	And I was just like, hmm, I
19	don't know. You can go to a regular high
20	school.
21	Again, I'm a public school
22	teacher, thinking, well, this is, you know
23	I teach public school. Nothing happened to
24	me. I went through public school. It's going

1 to be great. You'll be fine. Just -- you 2 know, I just was thinking: Charter? Let's -- you're doing so well in public 3 4 school. You have so much going on. You're already in so many different activities. 5 are on the band. Let's just keep on moving 6 7 forward in that tradition. And she was like, "Mom, I really 8 think this is going to save" -- and, again, 9 10 this is my -- at that time, a 13-year-old --11 "this is going to save you money." 12 So once she brought up the money, I was like, okay, let's think about 13 14 that. And we talked about it. And I let her 15 basically tell me why she would want to attend -- again, that's the teacher side of 16 17 Why do you want to attend this school? me. 18 And, again, money was a big part. 19 But she was just like, "It's smaller, Mom. And I like the smaller feel of 20 21 it. I think they're going to pay more attention to me instead of being put in such a 22 23 big high school. You'll see, Mom. It'll work 24 out fine."

1 And I kept on saying, Nyia, they don't have this. They don't have this. 2 don't have this. 3 And she's like, "Mom, just give 4 it a chance. Maybe they'll get it. " She was 5 6 very optimistic. And I wasn't being very 7 optimistic. Fast forward. 8 My daughter is a junior now. And they have more than won me 9 10 I mean, I just want to help make them 11 grow even after she graduates. I'm just like, 12 what can I do? What can I do? Because I am so impressed with not just her development, 13 14 just what I see taking place with all the 15 students there. 16 Again, I am public school at 17 I've been teaching now for 17 years, heart. 18 going on -- this is my 18th year. But the opportunity -- the way that I watch my 19 daughter -- how she was so naive when she 20 21 entered and how she's so mature. I mean, she's setting my calendar. 22 She's telling me, 23 "No, Mom. This is where you need to be. 24 is what we have to do. This is what I'm doing

1 right now. And you need to have it aligned. I have a study" -- "I have to make sure I have 2 study hours." 3 4 And I'm just like, all right, 5 okay. She's more organized than me. And I'm just -- if you knew my child before -- and now 6 7 it's like, what? I just -- I mean, I don't have a 8 well written speech. I don't have -- all I 9 10 can do is tell you from the heart it's an 11 amazing transformation that I've seen. 12 that she wasn't going to do well any school she went to. It is just how much she has 13 14 progressed, how much she has matured, and how 15 much she is already envisioning herself and putting herself in situations where she knows 16 17 she's going to succeed. 18 She's already out there scouting -- I mean, schools. 19 She's contacting colleges for herself, talking to deans at 20 21 other colleges, telling them about herself and what she has to offer. 22 23 And I'm like, what? 1 Dayna Cobb. I am the PTSA secretary. I am 2 a Del State alum. And I am the proud parent 3 of a sophomore at ECHS. 4 When I first heard about ECHS --5 my son wasn't able to go yet. He was in middle school. 6 And I was so excited about it. 7 I love my alma mater. Like, I'm a proud Hornet. And so I couldn't wait. And he was 8 apprehensive. And I had to have the buy-in 9 10 from my child or else it wouldn't work out. 11 And we decided to put our name in the lottery. He was picked. 12 13 I know everything has said 14 amazing things about this organization -- the 15 school -- and I would agree with all of them. 16 But I think the most important part is hope. 17 I'm a scientist. My husband is 18 technical. And my son is an artsy person. And so, to him, "Maybe not college, Mom. 19 may not do science. This isn't my thing." 20 21 And just yesterday -- this is his first college class this semester. 22 And he got 23 pulled to the side by the professor in his 24 first class. And the professor told him he



1 had one of the highest averages in his class. And he called me on his walk to go to lunch. 2 And he was so excited. And he was so happy. 3 4 And the professor told him, "I hope that you're thinking of coming to Delaware State 5 University." And for the first time I heard 6 7 my son be excited about college, be excited That's 8 and have that hope. That is huge. what ECHS did for my child. And I hope you 9 10 continue do that for other people's children. 11 Thank you. 12 MR. JOHNSTON: Hello. My name is Jalen Johnston. I am a proud student here 13 at the Early College High School. 14 I want to 15 thank you for allowing me to give you a taste 16 of the high at Early College High School. 17 The Early College High School is 18 not an ordinary high school. It is an extraordinary high school that gives us a --19 unlimited opportunities. I currently take a 20 21 college class called Macroeconomics where it teaches us the principles of economics. 22 23 are given assignments, tests and quizzes that 24 are -- that regular college students receive.

ECHS has highly-educated teachers to prepare us for our college classes which their teaching pay off at the end of the day. And I thank them for that. Our high school still has the same regular high school jitters, like homecoming, which is this Saturday, as well as activities and our tremendous sports teams, soon to be bringing football to the high. I hope that State of Delaware students from all around can participate in this excellent This school gives us unlimited program. opportunities to prepare us to dream big dreams. MS. GILLIS-HAMMOND: Hello, everybody. My name is Taylor Gillis-Hammond, and I am a junior at the Early College High School. And the two college classes I am currently taking are French -- and I'm taking Intro to Biology. So, at first, I was kind of iffy about the school, but then I was able to talk myself into going there. I was like, okay, well, this is going to help me in the long

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1 run. And I know it's going to be good for me. 2 So far so good. And I am so proud to be going 3 here. 4 ECHS courses have prepared me for my college classes. 5 At first, I was like, I don't know if I can handle the stress. 6 don't know if I can do this. 7 But then some of my teachers, like, during my ninth grade year 8 and tenth grade year, they encouraged me to do 9 10 more and they encouraged me to better myself. 11 And I am so, like -- I have earned more from 12 this opportunity. Yesterday when I was talking to 13 my French professor, he said, "It's amazing, 14 15 because I can barely tell you apart from all 16 the college students because you act so mature 17 and you're so prepared for this. You don't 18 have any shyness. And you're just so proud and eager to learn." And he told me that I 19 should keep doing this and keep going forward. 20 21 And he just encouraged me to keep going. 22 This school has given me many 23 opportunities that I feel as though I would 24 not have at any other school in the State of

1 Delaware. 2 MS. RUGGIERO: Okay. Well, my 3 name is Toni Marie Ruggiero. I'm currently an 4 eleventh grader at ECHS. And I came to the school in the 5 6 middle of last year. And I was -- at first I 7 was kind of apprehensive about it. But, then, there was also a part of me that was eager to 8 come, because I just moved to Delaware from 9 10 And it was a completely different Arizona. 11 experience. 12 So I decided -- I talked with my And, like, I'm going to try it. 13 mother. 14 at first, like, I loved the experience. And I 15 still do. The -- they really prepared -- they 16 really helped me prepare to become more of a 17 mature young adult than I ever could imagine. 18 My last school, they -- I have a very -- I have the type of mind-set that I 19 want to keep going. I want to motivate 20 21 myself. I want to do -- start to do as -just as best as I could. And that -- I wasn't 22 23 getting that from my old school. And I can 24 definitely say I'm getting that from here.



1 I'm currently taking three And I haven't even been here 2 college courses. a whole year yet, which is crazy to me. 3 4 And I can say the teachers are Like, they make me want to pull 5 phenomenal. my hair out sometimes by all the work. 6 7 I couldn't ask for any other you know what? teachers because they really help prepare me 8 9 for an amazing experience that I couldn't get 10 anywhere else. 11 And I was told last week by my 12 professor -- like, my professor was so surprised that I was in high school that he 13 14 yelled it out in the whole class. He's like, 15 "You're a high school student?" 16 I'm like, "Yeah, I am." 17 And -- because, like, he 18 couldn't tell because I just blended in with 19 the college class so well. And I just -- this is just an 20 21 amazing experience. Like -- and I never 22 thought I would be able to get this And I prepare myself, like, even 23 opportunity. 24 before, like, seniors prepare themselves,



1	like and, like, my I'm doing something
2	that my whole family is, like, shocked. Even,

18	MS. LEWIS: All right. Hello,
19	everyone. My name is Giselle Lewis, and I am
20	currently a senior at the Early College High
21	School.
22	So today you've heard a lot of
23	great things about the school and, like, a lot
24	of, like, factual things. I'm going to give

1 you guys my personal experience at the school 2 and how it's helped me. 3 So currently I am taking -- I 4 have over 43 credits, I believe. I came in here my sophomore year, actually, and just --5 I can see myself how I've matured and how I've 6 been more dependent on myself rather than 7 depending on, you know, my teacher. 8 I mean, I 9 can depend on my teacher. 10 But, you know, growing up as a 11 responsible adult, going into the college class, at first was a little intimidating, 12 because I didn't know what to expect. You 13 14 know, it was a new experience. I'm a college 15 I'm like, oh, my gosh. student. Are they going to tell I'm a high school student? 16 don't know. 17 18 But being able to be as 19 successful as the college students that go there is amazing. And also just being able to 20 21 balance high school and college together -- I mean, high school and college together --22 23 like, I'm in student council -- president of 24 student council for the class of 2018,

1 National Honor Society. And it's just amazing 2 that I can get a taste of both. I would love to see this school 3 4 continue and prosper. By sister actually goes 5 to the Early College High School as well. 6 She's a junior. Her name is Talia. 7 to see how she has flourished and how she's, 8 like, become more open and -- you know, she loves school. She used to hate school. 9 10 I used to not really be too fond 11 of school, but I get excited. Because I'm 12 looking at my future, not just thinking about I'm thinking about where am I going to 13 now. 14 be a couple years from now. It has just 15 helped me open doors. I have connections. 16 The university gives me connections to other 17 colleges, internships, like, honestly. 18 when colleges review my transcript, they'll say, wow, she's already taken college credit. 19 Like, it just stands out to them. When they 20 21 submit their college applications, it's like, wow, she went to an Early College High School. 22 23 Like, it's amazing. And I just think it's a 24 great experience for all the students.

1	And I love to see like, my
2	heart goes out for others just to see, like,
3	the ninth, tenth, eleventh and seniors just
4	seeing the process of them growing into
5	mature, independent, like, adult college
6	students is amazing. And I want the best for
7	all of the grades. And for the ones more to
8	come. So it would be great just to when I
9	graduate even then, when I'm not going to
10	the school anymore, just to see how the school
11	grows. So it will be amazing.
12	So yeah.
13	I ended on an awkward note.
14	Sorry. But yeah.
15	MS. GILDON: Good evening.
16	My name is Sara Gildon. I have
17	the distinct honor and privilege of teaching
18	ninth grade personal finance and tenth grade
19	economics at the Early College High School at
20	Delaware State University. I'm also the
21	advisor for National Honor Society, and I'm
22	the 2017 Teacher of the Year.
23	Now, with that being said, Early
24	College High School is all about



1 transformation. We take ninth graders -- or, rather, eighth graders plus three months. 2 And our job is to take and mold them into the 3 4 ideal college student. This is no easy task. It starts from day one their freshman year. 5 6 And we start our process with our 7 individualized and personalized growth plans that every student completes in their freshman 8 9 year and updates through their senior year. 10 With that, they start looking at 11 what it means to be a college student, what it 12 means to be college ready. Our students in the ninth grade have already gotten their 13 first taste of a college readiness score which 14 15 is based on our college readiness rubric. 16 There were cheers and there were tears -- lots 17 of tears -- because they're just not there. And it would be a crime for us to not take the 18 time to help these students find their way and 19 understanding the idea that every one of our 20 21 students must choose their own path, must follow a given path, and are going to be 22 college ready at different times and to assure 23 24 them that that is okay.

So we start that first week of ninth grade looking at these plans. And we're looking at what skills they need to improve, what skills they are really strong at. examine the habits of mind so that they can start building their profiles or their plans forward. Our students have to start thinking college mind-set early because they have to declare their major by the end of their tenth grade year. I was nervous and changed my major a few times in college, let alone in high school. So, with that, they go through and they watch their scores. And it's almost like Christmas morning when they get those Just having to see if they grew or reports. seeing if they're college ready. And then we You're college ready. celebrated. We have a celebration. You improved three points on your college readiness rubric. That deserves a celebration too. Understanding that with this plan and with the rubric, our kids might not

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take the same amount of college classes as
other students. They might only be able to
handle one college class their tenth grade
year. Or maybe they needed to wait till their
junior year. But the key here is that our
size and our structure allow us the
opportunity to help every student be
successful at the pace that they can reach
those academic goals and to know that it's
okay that if we have some kids their junior
year that aren't in all but one college class
and that you support those students so they
are successful at no matter what academic
level they're achieving at, high school or
collegiate.

DR. FOX-LYKENS: Good evening.
My name is Dr. Fox-Lykens. I am
a former founding school board member of this
Early College High School. I'm the former
director of the Center for Teaching and
Learning at Delaware State University.
I would just like to voice my
opinion and ask that the state take a very

serious look at the governance of the high Charter schools are under corporate However, in this case, there is a sole law. incorporator -- one person making the decision as to who will serve on the board and who will not serve on the board. That person is the university president. That could be a conflict of interest. Furthermore, the majority of the board is made up of people with a vested interest in Delaware State University. Primarily, Delaware State University signs their paycheck. As the secretary of the board, I went to FOIA training. I attended Delaware Department of Justice FOIA training. were many times that I saw, out of convenience, board members having conversations in the hallways of the university that should not be taking place. That's a FOIA violation. Two or three board members discussing board business because its convenient because we work together is a FOIA violation.

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I found myself constantly battling with a board of trustee member. board of trustees for the university operates very differently than a public school board. They are not under FOIA regulations. They do not have to disclose things. I'm a 25-year educator, all in public schools -- K-12 and postsecondary. Ι know how school boards should run. T know they're accountable to the public. And to be constantly fighting FOIA violations is unnecessary. The reason that was happening is because of the makeup of the board. I cannot, as an employee of Delaware State University and secretary of the board, go up against one of the board of trustees on this board who actually -- my job is contingent upon that board member liking me or not liking me. So I ask the state: Please look at the governance structure in the event that there is a conflict between this high school and the university. Because of the way the governance is set up, the university is going

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1 to win. That is a detriment to the taxpayers 2 of this state. 3 Thank you. MS. EDNEY: 4 Let's end on a happy 5 note. 6 MS. SAVAGE: Good evening, 7 everyone. 8 My name is Dara Laws-Savage, and I come to the Early College High School with 9 10 23 years of educational experience in the 11 State of Delaware. I am a former AP English 12 12 teacher. I am a former E-110 teacher from the University of Delaware. 13 And I can tell 14 you that there is no place in this world I 15 would rather teach. 16 I left my district of 13 years 17 to come work under Evelyn Edney and her 18 leadership. This school is based on the power of place. We have students who completely 19 transform themselves just by being in the 20 21 right place at the right time. 22 If you have a student who is on 23 a college campus and they're with students who 24 are already academically and



1 collegiately-minded, they're going to become 2 That is the power of place. There's a proverb that says 3 4 "Iron sharpens iron." And when these students are around students who aspire to be great, 5 6 they aspire to be great. 7 You've heard the numbers -- the number of college credits that they have 8 earned. But to see these babies -- because 9 10 that's what they are when we get them -transform themselves and to be able to speak 11 12 in front of adults without blinking, to be able to hold their own in a college class, and 13 14 to be able to be asked by a college student to 15 tutor them, we've done our job. 16 There's no other school in the 17 State of Delaware that can do what the Early 18 College High School does. I've been there. I've been their AP teacher with the test. 19 I have taught E-110 in a 20 It's not the same. 21 high school classroom. It is not the same. Power of place makes a difference. And we are 22 23 the only ones who do it the way we do it. 24 Hornet Pride is -- sorry -- it's



a rule. Hornet Pride is something that these students embody. And even when they are out, that Hornet Pride shows through. They tell their friends, "I'm on campus." And just to hear them say it -- "I'm on campus. I've got to catch the shuttle. I'm on campus." so powerful for them to be in that place, doing what they do, and excelling more than any of their friends who are in a traditional high school. It is absolutely the best school in the State of Delaware. I would not work anywhere else. And if you have any questions, concerns, our doors are open. Come see us. Come see our kids in action. This is just a taste. This is just the tip of the iceberg. The Early College High School at Delaware State University is going to be a leader in education in the State of Delaware. Once you sign that paper and we keep going, watch what we do. Thank you for your time. MS. STOUFFER: Is there anyone else who desires to speak?

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1	Okay. If not, I want to
2	thank would you like to speak?
3	DR. HORTON: Yeah. As a final,
4	summarizing comment.
5	MS. STOUFFER: Okay.
6	DR. HORTON: You've had the
7	opportunity today to hear from a variety of
8	constituents. You've heard from our parents.
9	You've heard from our teachers. You've heard
10	from our wonderful students. You've even
11	heard from a former board member.
12	What I would like to say is we
13	are unique. I said that before. We have a
14	unique relationship with Delaware State
15	University. We have a unique relationship
16	with the community. We have unique
17	relationships with our students.
18	The value of that is
19	immeasurable. Sometimes it can be
20	uncomfortable, but it is wonderful. It is
21	powerful and it's impactful.
22	Thank you for your time.
23	MS. STOUFFER: Anyone else?
24	All right. If not, I want to



1	thank you all for participating today. The
2	Secretary will consider your comments in
3	deciding at the conclusion of the renewal
4	process what decision to submit to the State
5	Board for assent, if needed.
6	This hearing is now closed.
