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CLAYTON COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS DISTRICT OVERVIEW



Clayton County Public Schools (CCPS) is fully accredited through Cognia. The district offers a focused world-class program based on a challenging curriculum which is taught from pre-kindergarten through 12th grade. Serving over 52,000 students, Clayton County Public Schools is ranked among the 100 largest school districts in the U.S. and is the fifth-largest school system in Georgia. Made up of 67 schools and a variety of programs, the school system has over 6,200 employees. Established with a district-wide theme of Committed to High Performance, CCPS is providing boundless opportunities for its students to be prepared to live and succeed in a global economy through an innovative, technology-based, STEM & STEAM approach to education. The school district is located just 17 miles from Downtown Atlanta and Clayton County houses the world's busiest airport -Hartsfield-Jackson International Atlanta Airport. CCPS offers a variety of learning options such as traditional schools, fine arts magnet schools and/or programs, Career, Technical, and Agricultural (CTAE) Pathways, the International Baccalaureate Program, the Cambridge International Program, online/virtual courses, and Gifted Education Programs. The school district also provides state-of-the-art facilities for community and district growth including the Clayton County Public Schools Performing Arts Center and the S. Truett Cathy Professional Learning Center.

COMMITTED TO HIGH PERFORMANCE

Six CCPS' Schools have earned National Magnet School Certification from Magnet Schools of America. These schools include Kay R. Pace Elementary School of the Arts, Unidos Dual Language Elementary School, M.D. Roberts Middle School, Elite Scholars Academy, Martha Ellen Stilwell School of the Arts, and Morrow High School. These are the only nationally certified magnet schools in the state of Georgia.




- Continued plans to build a Clayton County College and Career Academy to help students explore career and higher education opportunities by offering training in aviation mechanics/avionics, artificial intelligence (including drones and robots), distribution and logistics and culinary arts pathways.
- Reestablishment of Clayton County Public Schools Foundation Incorporated; raised over \$1,000,000 in four years and provided over 500 scholarships to CCPS Graduates. Awarded Classes of 2018, 2019, 2020 & 2021 Salutatorians/Valedictorians computer laptops for their academic achievements through the support of the Clayton County Public Schools Foundation, Inc. and strategic community partners.
- Martha Ellen Stilwell School of the Arts and Elite Scholars Academy (ESA) continues to earn selections to Top Schools in Georgia Rankings established by U.S. News and World Reports. ESA & Stilwell ranked 18th and 28th respectively.



In 2019, CCRPI Data indicated that 28 CCPS schools reported scores that were higher than their scores reported in 2018. Five CCPS schools outperformed the state's overall score of 75.9. They were Elite Scholars Academy (94.9), Martha Ellen Stilwell School of the Arts (91.4), Elite Scholars Academy Middle (91.0), Kay R. Pace Elementary School of the Arts

(79.2), and Thurgood Marshall Elementary School (76.2). The district-wide score is reported at 62.4. An updated calculation for the 2018 CCRPI made comparisons with prior years not possible or valid. Data from the 2020 School Year is not calculated due to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

- Enhanced and expanded online reading and math resources to eliminate students' deficits and to improve student achievement and Extending Learning Beyond the Classroom -- a program that has provided Chromebooks to students in grades 3 through 12 to suppor their academic success outside of the classroom.
- Accelerated the Implementation of the "Extending Learning Beyond the Classroom" program to ensure access for all students during the COVID-19 Pandemic. The program provided 38,000 new laptops and devices to students in grades 3-12.



- Enhanced and expanded online reading and math resources to eliminate students' deficits and to improve student achievement and Extending Learning Beyond the Classroom -- a program that has provided Chromebooks to students in grades 3 through 12 to support their academic success outside of the classroom.
- Adoption/revision of school improvement framework to achieve greater coherence and operate more effectively towards producing district-wide improvement and increases in student outcomes, resulting from a culture of high-performance.
- The review and enhancement of the Strategic Improvement Plan for the school district as it continues to chart a path towards creating a culture of high performance.



- Continued to enhance and expand the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) approach to implement a STEMulating Culture of High Performance by infusing STEM mindset into all content areas in all grade levels to apply knowledge and real-world connections in one's daily life.
- Clayton County Public Schools offers Dual Language Immersion Programs at Kilpatrick Elementary (Spanish), Mt. Zion Primary (Spanish), Mt. Zion Elementary (Spanish), Unidos Dual Language Elementary (Spanish), and Morrow Middle School (Spanish).

- Expansion of School Choice, Advanced Placement Classes and CTAE Programs at various schools and increased number of students in Advanced Placement courses and participation in Dual Enrollment Programs as well as Purchased additional reading and math online tools (i-Ready, Achieve3000, and Odysseyware) to eliminate students' reading and math skill deficits and improve outcomes.
- The graduation rate for the Class of 2020 was 76.6 percent, an increase over the rate for 2019 of 3.9 percentage points. Since the state of Georgia began calculating and monitoring graduation rate in compliance with U.S.

 Department of Education rules focusing on a four-year cohort, CCPS has experienced a nine-year growth in the percent of students graduating (2011-2020)



reflecting a 25.1 percentage point increase in the district-wide rate.

- Members of the CCPS' Class of 2021 totaled over 3,000 collecting \$89.1 million dollars in academic, athletic, Georgia Hope, and Zell Miller Scholarships. A total of 41 students in CCPS Class of 2021 graduated with Associate's Degrees earned from various institutions.
- Clayton County Public Schools (CCPS) continues to expand Dual Enrollment opportunities for scholars as nearly 500 students are currently enrolled in the district's dual enrollment program participating in over 1,800 dual enrollment classes for college credit. CCPS Collegiate Dual Enrollment partners include Albany State University, Atlanta Metropolitan State University, Atlanta Technical College, Devry University, Clayton State University, Georgia Military College,
- Georgia State College, Kennesaw State University, Middle Georgia State College, Southern Crescent, Toccoa Falls College, and Truett McConnell University.
- Establishment of a School-Based Virtual Learning Program for athome students to engage in rigorous remote instruction provided by CCPS teachers. This program serves over 7,200 students ranging from Pre-K to 12th grade.



Cambridge International School

- Arnold Elementary, Suder Elementary, and Elite Scholars Academy have been granted full eligibility to join the Cambridge Assessment International Education organization as well as Lee Street Elementary has been awarded International Baccalaureate Program candidacy. Jonesboro Middle and Jonesboro High are currently seeking candidacy to join the International Baccalaureate Program.
- Riverdale High School partnered with Devry University's Advantage Academy for Network Administration. This partnership allows selected students to earn an Associate of Science degree in Network Systems Administration while simultaneously enrolled in their junior and senior years of high school.



- Brown Elementary is the first elementary school in CCPS to earn the COGNIA STEM Certification which is valid for five years.
- Continued Superintendent Advisory Groups and community meetings entitled Critical Conversations, YouTube Live Presentations, Real Talk Sessions and State of the Schools Annual Address to engage all stakeholders in open dialogue and transparency to strengthen relations between the school district and all facets of the community. Included in this initiative were increased stakeholder climate and satisfaction surveys.



Successful openings of new Michelle Obama STEM Elementary Academy (2021) and newly renovated/constructed Jonesboro High School (2021) and Safety & Security Headquarters and Hines Ward Field (2020).

- Nine district schools were named by State Schools Superintendent Richard Woods as Advanced Placement Honor Schools for 2021.
 CCPS' Schools include Elite Scholars Academy, Martha Ellen Stilwell School of the Arts, Morrow High School, Jonesboro High School, Mt. Zion High School, North Clayton High School, Forest Park High School, Charles R. Drew High School, and Mundy's Mill High School.
- All traditional CCPS high schools are eligible to award International Skill Diploma Seals (ISDS). ISDS are awarded to students who complete the international education curriculum and engage in extracurricular activities and experiences that foster the achievement of global competencies.



- All CCPS high schools are eligible to award the Georgia Department
 of Education (GaDOE) Fine Arts Diploma Seal. Awarded to
 graduating high school seniors, this diploma signifies students who
 have completed a Georgia Fine Arts Pathway, Creative Industry Skill
 Focus Course, Community Arts Partnerships, Written Reflection, and
 a Fine Arts Portfolio.
- Increased professional development programs and the continuation
 of district-wide and school-based mentoring programs. Professional
 development programs focused on developing staff in areas of
 content, pedagogy, and leadership capacity with the district beginning
 to address the areas of social-emotional learning (SEL) and mental
 health or wellness training for staff.



• Over the past two years, 23 CCPS graduating seniors and members of the Firefighter/EMS Apprenticeship Academy turned their tassels, signifying completion of an intensive three-year program developed in partnership with Clayton County Fire and Rescue Services. These seniors completed the Firefighter & EMT Pathways, with 17 earning their firefighter helmets, qualifying them for a job offer from Clayton County Fire & Emergency Services Department with a starting salary in excess of \$42,000. Eight are presently working for the county and the remaining 9 will begin during September 2021.

- Expanded a robust number of prominent business/corporate, community, collegiate, faithbased and governmental partnerships to strengthen partners in education support to the school district.
- Martha Ellen Stilwell School of the Arts became the second school in CCPS to be named by the U.S.
 Department of Education as National Blue Ribbon Schools in the Exemplary High Performing Schools category. Elite Scholar Academy was named a National Blue Ribbon School in the Exemplary High Performing Schools Category in 2014.
- Dr. Michael Robinson, Principal of the Martha Ellen Stilwell School of the Arts, became the first Clayton County Public Schools principal to receive the Terrell H. Bell Award for Outstanding Leadership. He is one of 10 principals nationally to receive this honor. The award recognizes outstanding school leaders and the vital role they play in guiding students and schools to excellence, frequently under challenging circumstances.
- A College Board report of scores on Advanced Placement (AP) tests taken in the 2020-2021 school year by high school students from various grade levels across CCPS shows a performance of 18% of participating students (1408 test-takers) earning a qualifying score of 3 or higher. This percentage represents the number of students who participated in one or more AP tests.
- Dr. Sheneaise Ratcliff, Principal of E.W. Oliver Elementary School was named the recipient of the Outstanding Principal Award for Elementary Schools by the Georgia Parent-Teachers Association.
- Continued the practice of establishing and promoting CCPS Legislative Priorities by working collaboratively with the local/state legislative delegation and officials to enact and support initiatives in the best interest of CCPS' students and local community-at-large.



- Eight Clayton County Public Schools students, who were members of Class 73 of the Orange Duffel Bag Initiative (ODBI), successfully completed their 12-week program earning a certificate of achievement, an orange duffel bag and a fully-loaded laptop computer. The program is a collaborative effort involving Clayton County Public Schools (CCPS), Clayton State University (CSU), United Way of Greater Atlanta, Georgia Department of Human Services and ODBI.
- V'Shoi Emanuel, a student at Martha Ellen Stilwell School of the Arts, has been selected as a 2021 YoungArts Program Jazz Merit winner! Chosen as one of 659 most accomplished young visual, literary and performing artists from across the country, V'Shoi is one of only 14 high school jazz bassists awarded this accomplishment.
- Students who took the SAT in 2019-2020 at Elite Scholars Academy and at Martha Ellen Stilwell School of the Arts either exceeded or equaled state and national composite scores as reported by the College Board and the Georgia Department of Education (GaDOE).
- The school district and the Clayton County Public Schools
 Foundation, Inc. (CCPSF) were awarded \$50,000 in grant funding
 from the PNC Foundation to support the COVID-19 Clayton County
 Public Schools Technology & Internet Needs Project. The grant will
 be used to enhance virtual learning throughout the district.

COVID-19: Clayton Calling the Shots!



Clayton County Public Schools has prioritized the safety of all staff, students, their families and the community at-large by working with local and state health officials to spearhead vaccination efforts within the school system and beyond. As the district continues to encourage vaccinations and adherence to safety protocols aimed at mitigating the spread of COVID-19, please see the highlights below relative to the district's efforts.

- Creation of COVID-19 Protocols for employees and students as well as a COVID game plan for parents in preparation for the 2021-2022 school year. In addition, Clayton County School Board approved the Incentivisation of vaccinations for employees as recommended by the Superintendent.
- Creation of the "Clayton Calling the Shots -- Get Vaxxed" informational campaign designed to increase vaccination awareness across the county for eligible students, staff and stakeholders!
- Established a comprehensive COVID-19 Dashboard in November 2020, housed on the district website, to promote transparency. The CCPS COVID-19 Dashboard features the number of positive cases among Clayton County residents and district students and staff as officially confirmed and reported to the district. This data is updated weekly using a 5-day (Monday-Friday) reporting period time frame.
- Began partnering with local organizations to provide free drive-thru COVID-19 testing opportunities in January 2021. These efforts are ongoing.
- Clayton County Public Schools established an in-district COVID-19
 Vaccination Clinic for employees in March 2021 through a partnership
 with the Clayton County Health District and Clayton County Fire and
 Emergency Management. Since then, the clinic has expanded to
 serve the Clayton County Community.


COVID-19: Clayton Calling the Shots!

- Since March 2021, Clayton County Public Schools has vaccinated nearly 2,100 individuals via the CCPS Vaccination Clinic and mass vaccination drives held in partnership with local health agencies as part of the "Clayton Calling the Shots" informational vaccination campaign.
- Continues to partner with local agencies to host mass vaccination drives for the Clayton County community utilizing CCPS schools and facilities as host sites.
- Launched School-based COVID-19 testing sites and vaccination clinics to provide voluntary COVID-19 testing and vaccinations to students and staff during the work/school day. These efforts began in September 2021.

CLAYTON COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS CONSTRUCTION & S.P.L.O.S.T.

The Construction Department is responsible for the planning and implementation of the Local Facilities Plan. This plan is developed by conducting a needs assessment survey for each school involving input from school administrators, central office personnel, and operations. The SPLOST budget is developed using this information. Utilizing SPLOST, the construction department prepares the construction budgets for capital projects, acquires design professionals and provides project management from pre-construction to completion.



LIFTING LITERACY IN CCPS & BEYOND

Clayton County Public Schools is committed to providing high-quality literacy instruction for all students to allow them to reach their fullest potential. Please see a few initiatives below regarding the district's focus on literacy and at-home learning!

- During the first nine weeks, scholars in grades K-5 are receiving an additional 45 minutes of targeted reading instruction to support focus areas and priority standards.
- Penmanship is important to practice. Activities such as sand and playdough are recommended to build fine and gross motor skills. Scholars in second through fifth grade are being taught cursive writing skills as this is a state standard and district expectation.
- Read 20 minutes a day to ensure that your child is increasing their word knowledge and vocabulary. When you read 20 additional minutes a day, you are exposed to 1.8 million more words. Ride and Read promotes caregivers having books in the backseat for their children to read. You may use the pocket on the back of the driver and passenger seats to store the books.
- · Chat and Chew promote conversation during various dining times.
- See and Say encourages caregivers to talk about what they see throughout the day.
