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Tragedy at Howard High School

A local high school, Howard High School of Technology, has been hit with two tragic events within the span of a month. On April 21st, sophomore Amy Joyner-Francis was beaten to death in a bathroom, and on May 19th, freshman Brandon Wingo was shot dead as he walked home from school.

Students at Howard are mourning the death of both of these students who had promising futures ahead of them. Amy was studying nursing, and was ironically known as someone who was

against violence. Brandon was a promising athlete who was always polite.

According to the National Center for School Crisis & Bereavement, by the time children complete high school, most will experience the death of a family member or friend, with 5% of children experiencing the death of a parent by 16 years of age. **Nearly 40% will experience the death of a peer, and 20% will have witnessed a death.** These numbers are staggering!

The principal at Howard stressed that that the incidents are not a reflection of the school, but rather the

harsh reality of the challenges the city of Wilmington is facing. The story is about two young promising students who tragically lost their lives, NOT Howard High School.

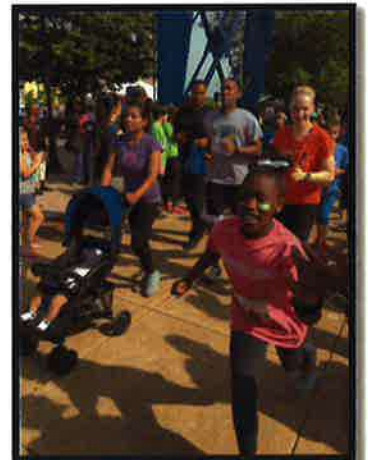

History of Mothers and Fathers Day

Grace Golden Clayton was mourning the loss of her father when, on December 1907, the Monongah Mining Disaster in nearby Monongah killed 361 men, 250 of them fathers, leaving around a thousand fatherless children. Clayton suggested her pastor Robert Thomas Webb do something to honor all those fathers.

What is Leukemia?

 Leukemia is cancer that originates in blood-forming tissue. The disease is characterized by the uncontrolled growth of blood cells, usually white blood cells (leukocytes), in the bone marrow. White blood cells are a fundamental component of the body's immune response.

The leukemia cells crowd out and replace normal blood and marrow cells. Symptoms of acute leukemia depend on how much the cancer has grown. They may include:

- A new lump or swollen gland in your neck or under your arm.
- Frequent nosebleeds, bleeding from the gums, or more frequent bruising
- Frequent fevers.
- Night sweats.

- Bone pain.
- Unexplained appetite loss or recent weight loss.
- Feeling tired a lot without a known reason.
- Swelling and pain on the left side of the belly.

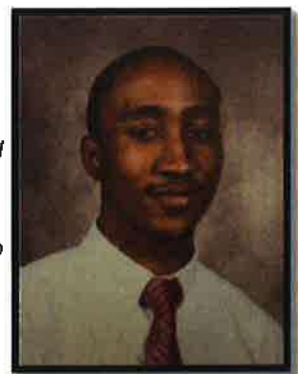
BW: *We were your very first students. What is a memory from that year that you will never forget?*

What Causes Allergies?

Allergies are abnormal immune system reactions to things that are typically harmless to most people. When you're allergic to something, your immune system mistakenly believes that this substance is harmful to your body. (Substances that cause allergic reactions, such as certain foods, dust, plant pollen, or medicines, are known as allergens.)

In an attempt to protect the body, the immune system produces IgE antibodies to that allergen. Those antibodies then cause certain cells in the body to release chemicals into the bloodstream, one of which is histamine (pronounced: HIS-tuh-meem).

The histamine then acts on the eyes, nose, throat, lungs, skin, or gastrointestinal tract and causes the symptoms of the allergic reaction. Future exposure to that same allergen will trigger this antibody response again. This means that every time you come into contact with that allergen, you'll have an allergic reaction.
