9th English Description: This class is a survey of short stories, poetry, non-fiction, plays, an epic, and novels. Students will gain experience in reading, writing, speaking, and critical thinking while studying a range of diverse literary works. This course will also introduce the elements of the composition process (prewriting, drafting, revising, and editing). The goal is for students to better understand and analyze the multiple dimensions of the human experience by examining this experience through literature. Course Prerequisite: Successful completion of 8th Grade Language Arts.

Course Content: Each unit has a 100 point summative test and various formative assignments.

Expectations for Hybrid Schedule
