 - Phi Beta Lambda (PBL) College



History of

- FBLA organization dates back to 1937
 - Hamden Forkner of Teachers College, Columbia University in New York City
 - Recommends a national organization is needed for business clubs in high schools and colleges in the nation
- In 1940 the name Future Business Leaders of America is selected for the organization
- 1942 an experimental chapter was chartered in Johnson City, Tennessee
 - End of the year, 39 chapters were added

- 1946 Headquarters office is established
 - Located at the National Education Association Center in Washington, DC
- 1947 Iowa becomes the first FBLA state chapter.
- 1958 Phi Beta Lambda is created
 - The University of Norther Iowa is the first PBL chapter
- 1973 FBLA-PBL appoints Edward D. Miller as the association's first full-time executive director
- 1981 The Conrad N. Hilton Foundation purchases land in Reston,
 Virginia
 - The site for a future FBLA-PBL National Center
 - 1990 groundbreaking ceremony for the National Center (opened 1991)

FBLA Events

- Members of FBLA are able to compete in events at the local, state, and national levels
 - Test knowledge and skills related to business.
 - Competitive event open to an individual, team, or chapter.
- Members are also encouraged to participate in community service projects and activities
 - March of Dimes, State Projects, Local Events
