Bullying Allegations and Incidents Reported in Delaware Public Schools Annual Report

Executive Summary

Bullying is best defined as repetitive conduct designed to harm another individual either physically, mentally or emotionally as well as to create an imbalance of power between two individuals. The impacts of bullying can include long-term mental health issues as well as negative educational outcomes. Nationally, the Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) notes that close to 40 percent of secondary school students have been bullied on at least one occasion in the past 12 months. (Control, 2015, 2017) That number is close to what is reported from the 5,000 students who answered the YRBS in Delaware.

These students do not often share their victimization with staff members, other adults or their families, based upon the far fewer numbers of recorded allegations from district and charter schools. If we use the same data rule to compare the self-reporting from the YRBS and the statewide reported allegations that districts and charter schools must record in E-School, less than 1 percent of the students who self-reported in the YRBS survey that they were victims of bullying actually reported to their schools that they were allegedly victims of bullying, either physical or cyber.

As a state, we realize that this means students simply are not reporting that they are being victimized. In some cases, adults discover the bullying and correct it, even if the students fail to report it. Nationally nearly 70 percent of students stated that they witnessed bullying in some form but failed to notify anyone or take any action. Of the students who witnessed it and attempted to intervene, the bullying stopped within an estimated 53 seconds.

Yet another significant consequence of bullying is highlighted in the most recent US Secret Service Threat Assessment Study of school shootings, which notes that 60 percent of the school shootings between 2004 and 2017 had a nexus to bullying victimization (Center, 2019). Students who conducted physical attacks in schools had either been significantly victimized or felt as if they had been significantly victimized. In 34 percent of those cases, the school was aware of the alleged victimization prior to the attack.

When looking at the three-year trends within the First State, the number of allegations of bullying has decreased from 1,978 during the 2016-2017 school year to 637 during the 2018-2019 school year, 68 percent less than the reporting total three years ago. This is compared with the number of substantiated incidents that have reduced by only 26 percent or 146 fewer incidents. There was no significant reduction between 2015 and 2017 YRBS studies of the number of students stating that they were the victims of bullying, while the reduction in reported allegations was significant.

Responding to Bullying through School Climate Improvements

While there is no simple answer to solving the issue of bullying, schools that attempt to create a climate of inclusivity and civility can help students take ownership of their school "community" and reduce tolerance for bullying among their peers. The most telling statistic from the national surveys is the note regarding what happens when a bystander attempts to intercede. When a peer attempts to intervene, the act of bullying tends to end within about 53 seconds. The peer's intervention tends to be successful and sets a positive example to other bystanders that intervention can lead to a positive outcome.

This form of supportive community would also increase the support that victims receive from not only staff and mental health workers, but from their own peer group. Leaders can help create a more universal community of caring by implementing trauma-informed practices and professional development for their staffs. Administrators should support trauma awareness and utilizing restorative disciplinary practices if they wish to develop a stronger sense of community within their schools.

While the data reflects a reduction in the number of allegations of bullying statewide, the number of substantiated bullying events remains about the same. And this trend has continued for the past three years with no significant statistical change. This should not be construed as a factual representation of the amount of bullying that occurs in our schools, simply as the number of times that a bullying offense is recorded with a disciplinary consequence. Based upon the number of unreported incidents that we see reflected in the national and statewide YRBS data, the number of actual bullying incidents would appear to be greater than what we can see reflected in reported disciplinary data.

Section 1 of this report includes charts that document the submitted number of allegations and substantiated incidents of bullying by all public districts and charter schools in Delaware for the previous two school years. In addition, Section 2 of this report highlights the annual desk audit of a random selection of schools, both district and charter, to ensure compliance with all applicable state regulations and laws in the area of bullying prevention, investigation, response and reporting.

Figure 1. Three-year Trend of Reported Alleged and Substantiated Bullying Incidents Statewide

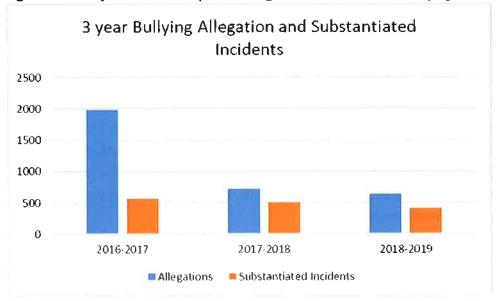


Figure 2. Recorded Allegations & Substantiated Bullying Incidents 2017 & 2018 School Years by Charter and District

Section 2. Random Desk Audit Compliance

Nine schools are randomly selected annually to review if they are in compliance with all regulatory and code language surrounding bullying prevention activities, mandatory recording and reporting and parental notification of alleged and substantiated bullying incidents. This includes the requirement to organize a bullying prevention committee for each school, inclusion of the Delaware Department of Justice bullying prevention anonymous reporting telephone line on family correspondence as well as on each school's web site, inclusion of bullying and cyberbullying prevention policies in district and/or charter school codes of conduct and policies.

The following schools were selected for auditing for the 2018-2019 school year. Completed audits note a 0-100 point scale for compliance. In addition to areas for corrective action or improvement, best practices for several schools have been included for use as a reference tool by other schools within Delaware.

The staff at Star Hill Elementary, with the support of the Caesar Rodney District Office, developed anonymous reporting forms that are grade and age appropriate to allow students to comfortably report bullying behaviors. In addition, they did an excellent job of developing a comprehensive bullying investigation and response tool that includes not only guidance on how to effectively conduct an investigation but follow up steps that the school team should follow to support addressing the incidents and preventing future incidents between students. These forms are included here for easy reference and will be available on the DOE School Climate Bullying Prevention Tools web page.

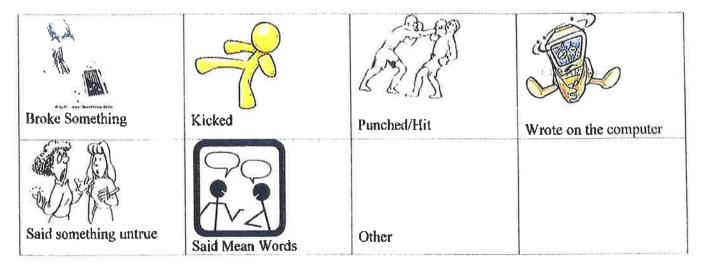
