


Welcome to Grade 6 and the Eagles Team! Ms. Fox's English Language Arts class



Daily Supplies




(Replace as needed.)

Electronic Devices

Recovering A Grade (Replaces a Grade)

• Re-doing or finishing incomplete/low scoring/missing work •It covers the same or is similar to work that was done unsuccessfully

•Recovery opportunities are only offered after a student goes through a review process, like re-reading, correcting errors, extra practice, or reteaching

Homework

Homework is usually independent reading for a book project. These projects always come due near the end of the quarter. They are shared with the class like a book talk. Other homework may include reading to prepare for in class discussions and activities. Sometimes students will be expected to participate in discussions or complete other assignments on myLearning.

Notebooks



Interactive Student Notebooks are an on-going diary of learning. The consumable workbook pages are stored inside. This may be kept in the classroom if desired, but it is ultimately the student's responsibility.

The pocket & prong folder is a place to store HW assignments and study resources separate from the binder we call our notebook. This will be taken to and from class each day.

Absences and Late Work

 Absence notes should be dated and contain the student's full name. They need to be on loose paper or emailed, not in student planners, because they are sent to the office. A doctor's note is required for extended medical absences.

• Excused Absences?

Work needs to be completed immediately upon return to avoid falling behind. For example, without asking, you have a grace period of 2 days for a 1 day absence. Extended medical leave, contact the teacher to set up a reasonable schedule to make-up work.

Unexcused Absences/Missing Work?

Late assignments will be treated like any other type of recovery. An opportunity to recover will be offered after following a review process assigned by the teacher. Make sure to take advantage of these opportunities when they are offered. If you have missing work at the end of the quarter, you will miss activities and sometimes elective classes to keep trying to recover work from a core class. The team classes are the core classes; Math, English Language Arts, Science, & Social Studies.

Make Up Work can be discovered by checking the due dates posted in the room, on the class website, in myStudent, and in the team newsletter. Students should ask or email the teacher if there are questions. If they wait too long, you will see an "M" for missing in the gradebook. After that, the student would need to go through the grade recovery process.
