



Resolve Credit Conversion Issues

Effective July 1, 2010...

Rule 160-4-2-.34 for credit conversion for coursework taken at a post-secondary institution

Semester Hours


1-2 semester hours = .5 Carnegie unit

3 to 5 semester hours = 1 Carnegie unit

Remove Transfer Barriers

SAT 530 Critical Reading and 530 Mathematics no longer a System requirement for students wishing to take English or Math courses at USG institutions or for a student to receive transfer credit for an English or math course taken through dual enrollment at another institution.

All dual enrollment credits earned at a COC institution will be transferable



Benefits of College Credit Now

Dual Enrollment

High School students take courses from a postsecondary institution while still enrolled as a high school student and receive credit at both the high school and postsecondary institution.

Joint Enrollment

High school students take courses at a postsecondary institution while still enrolled as a high school student and receive college credit only at the postsecondary institution.



Articulated Credit

An articulation agreement is established by institutions to aid in a seamless transition without repetition of coursework already mastered in high school. Student will successfully pass a designed assessment to receive credit at the postsecondary level.



High School Juniors and Seniors satisfy high school graduation requirements while enrolled full-time at a postsecondary institution.

Funding Options

- State FTE
- A determined set amount will be used for payment

Move On When Ready First Year Data

- A MOWR student cannot take additional classes at the high school while participating. They are full-time at college.
- First year's results for 2010-11:
 - 460 total students
 - 126 attended TCSG college—11 different institutions
 - 326 attended USG college or university—20 different institutions
 - 8 attended private colleges—4 different institutions
 - Payments to colleges and universities of almost \$600,000

WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR MOWR?

- High school juniors or seniors seeking a high school diploma from an eligible, public Georgia high school
- Student reported as enrolled in a public school for funding purposes during the preceding October and March fulltime equivalent (FTE) program counts
- Student wishing to enroll full time in an eligible college, university or public technical college as a dual credit student taking approved college level courses.

WHO IS NOT ELIGIBLE?

- Students who are homeschooled
- Students who transferred from out of state within last year*
- Students who attend private school
- Students who <u>ARE NOT</u> on track for graduation

* Dependents of military members stationed in Georgia are eligible for MOWR

Admission Requirements

TCSG

Test Scores - Degree Level

Must test program ready

GPA – No minimum required

On-track for high school graduation

Interview with HS Coordinator

Complete admissions paperwork

USG

Test Scores* - Minimum combined SAT

CR/Math of 970 or ACT composite of 20

GPA* - Minimum 3.0 high school GPA

On-track for high school graduation and completion of the USG RHSC requirements.

Exemption of all LS requirements.

Complete admissions paperwork

*The Board of Regents sets minimum admission requirements and institutions may have higher requirements.

ACCEL vs MOWR

ACCEL

- Can be part-time or fulltime at the college
- Academic Courses only

- NEW-Hours do not count toward HOPE paid hour cap
- NEW-Funding is from state instead of lottery

MOWR

- Must be full-time at the college
- Academic, Electives and CTAE Courses
- Hours do not count towards any HOPE caps
- Funding comes from FTE money

MOWR Enrollment Process

- High school informs all rising juniors and seniors of College Credit
 Now opportunities no later than April 1.
- Interested students consults with HS Counselor to determine eligibility.
- Eligible student and parent meet with HS Counselor to complete MOWR paperwork.
- MOWR Participation Permission form is sent to the postsecondary institution.
- Student completes admission process at postsecondary institution.
- Student is notified by the postsecondary institution of acceptance.

Move On When Ready Participation Permission Form

Move on When Ready (MOWR) provides opportunities for high school eleventh and twelfth grade students to enroll full-time in postsecondary institutions to earn dual credits. "Move on When Ready Act"; to provide for definitions; to provide a program for eleventh and twelfth grade students to attend postsecondary colleges and schools for high school credit; to provide for notice to parents and students of the program; to provide requirements for course credit; to provide for state funding; to provide for testing; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes (O.C.G.A. Sec. 20-2-161.3)

The counseling services concerning participation in Move On When Ready have been provided to the participant and parents/guardians. The GaDOE's program guidelines and the student responsibilities have been explained and discussed and they clearly understand what is expected in order to enroll and continue participation in MOWR. The student understands he/she must still meet the postsecondary institution's guidelines to complete the process.

Tuition, fees, books and materials are the costs that MOWR FTE funding covers. All other expenses will be the student and parents/guardians responsibility to pay.

Yes/No The student is currently on track to graduate from high school and meets all the eligibility requirements for participation.

Yes/No The student is a resident of Georgia. (A resident of Georgia is deemed to be an individual who is lawfully domicile in the State of Georgia, according to Federal and State laws and who has been in enrolled in a public school for funding purposes during the preceding October and March full-time equivalent (FTE) program counts in accordance with Code Section 20-2-160.)

College Credit Now: Opportunities for High School Students

High school students in Georgia have access to a number of opportunities for enhancing their high school curriculum and to earn college credit prior to their high school graduation.

Dual Enrollment

Students participating in dual enrollment take college courses to simultaneously satisfy their high school graduation requirements while earning college credit. Dual enrollment students may qualify to participate in the Accel program, Move on When Ready or to receive the HOPE Grant.

Accel Program

Georgia's Accel program, administered by the Georgia Student Finance Commission, provides eligible students with an award for their tuition and approved fees, as well as a book allowance, for eligible college courses taken prior to their high school graduation.

Move on When Ready provides eligible students the opportunity to enroll full-time in college or university prior to their high school graduation and to take courses which result in both college and high school credit. The tuition and eligible fees for students participating in Move on When Ready is provided through the high school full-time equivalent program count.
