- 2 Informational books often include pictures or photographs with captions. Captions provide details about the picture. Which of the books has a picture and caption that was most interesting to you? Why?
- 3 What did the book teach you that you did not already know? How will you use this information in the future?
- 4 What are 2-3 new words that you learned from reading this book? Write the words and tell what they mean.
