A Message from the Principal

Aloha,

Hanalei School continues to focus on Social Emotional Learning (SEL). During our recent Professional Development Day on February 7, 2020 we took a deep dive into our Panorama Data. Panorama data is "student perception" data and is focused on eight key areas. Each area is outlined below.

- **Pedagogical Effectiveness-** Perceptions of the quality of teaching and the amount of learning students experience from a particular teacher
- Classroom Teacher- How strong the social connection is between teachers and students within and beyond the classroom
- Classroom Climate- Perceptions of the overall social and leaning climate of the classroom
- Classroom Engagement- How attentive and interested students are in the class
- Classroom Rigorous Expectations- How much students feel that a specific teacher holds them to high expectations around effort, understanding, persistence, and performance in class
- **School Belonging-** How much students feel that they are a valued member of the school community
- Valuing of School- How much students feel that school is interesting, important, and useful
- School Safety- Perceptions of students physical and psychological safety at school

When developing our academic plan, this data will be used to integrate student perception data into school improvement planning, identify school-wide focus areas that aligns with existing academic and climate goals, and use data to measure effectiveness of Tier 1 programming. As we plan professional development we will use this data to leverage student voice toward teacher development, inform professional development and coaching for teachers, and equip teachers with strategies and resources to improve student experiences.

The achievement gap between our "high-needs" students (those students who receive free and reduced lunch, students on individual education plans, and our students with english as a second language) and our "non high-needs" continues to be a focus. As a result, the Hanalei staff continues to examine specific strategies to close this gap. Part of our February 7 professional development day was spent examining the work of Eric Jensen and his recent book "*Poor Students, Rich Teaching*". This book is focused on seven high-impact mindsets for students from poverty. Many of these strategies are considered universal strategies and will help all students be successful both inside and outside of the classroom.

We believe that feedback fosters growth and we welcome it to help our staff grow both professionally and personally. We view this feedback as an opportunity to improve upon the services and the staff, student, and community relationships. This past January a parent survey was sent home with your child. This School Quality Survey (SQS) is an opportunity for your voice to be heard. If you have not already, please take a few minutes to complete this survey. The survey can then be mailed back using the prepaid envelope. All surveys should be mailed back no later than March 13, 2020. Should you have any questions and or concerns regarding these surveys please call me directly here at school.


2nd GRADE

If you are interested in having your student learn more about coding (computer programming) and computer science by playing fun and educational computer activities (that are totally free), you should definitely check out Code.org's Hour of Code activities.

The Hour of Code is a global movement introducing tens of millions of students worldwide to computer science, inspiring kids to learn more, breaking stereotypes, and leaving them feeling empowered. The Hour of Code is organized by Code.org, a public non-profit dedicated to expanding access to computer science and increasing participation by women and underrepresented students of color.

The Hour of Code began as a one-hour coding challenge to give students a fun first introduction to computer science. HourOfCode.com offers hundreds of one-hour activities in over 48 languages for kindergarten aged students and up (adults can play and learn too!). Activities require no experience - tutorials are usually built in - and can be run on browsers, tablets, and smartphones.

Why computer science?

Computer science is changing every industry on the planet. Every 21st-century student should have the opportunity to learn how to create technology. Computer science concepts also help nurture creativity and problem-solving skills to prepare students for any future career. Computing occupations are the fastest-growing, best paying, and now the largest sector of all new wages in the US. Every child deserves the opportunity to succeed. (source: Code.org)

Counselor Connection

Behavior Modification 101



Spring Break is right around the corner, which means more time with your kids- which can be great! But it can also be challenging at times. Have you ever wished you had a magic wand to make your child behave just the way you want them to? You are not alone! Many parents feel that way from time to time. While there is no magical answer to changing your child's behavior, there are some strategies that can be helpful.

One strategy is having family rules. You are probably thinking that is nothing new, we have rules at our house. I am sure that is true, but do you have those rules posted? From my experience working with families, I can tell you that unless your rules are posted (on your fridge or by the family calendar, etc.) their existence (in your child's mind) is questionable and up for negotiation.

Tip: Have two to four household rules, discuss them with your children, explain the consequences for not following the rules and then post them some place that you can refer to them when needed. A quick reminder is always good. "What are the rules in this house?"

A second strategy is having consequences for your child's behavior. Don't forget that consequences are both positive and negative. If your child's behavior is negative, the consequence is negative. If your child's behavior is positive then the consequence is positive. Parents often wonder why they need to use positive consequences. The main reason for using positive consequences is to encourage your child to continue to do that behavior. After all, if your boss tells you how they appreciate you staying late to help finish a project, you are more likely to do it again.

Tip: Use things your child enjoys as positive consequences, rewards don't need to be elaborate or cost money. Play a game with him/her, let her/him choose what you will have for dinner. Spending time with your child is a great positive consequence. Negative consequences also work best if you take away something that is meaningful to your child, such as a favorite toy or a cell phone.

Tip: Be consistent. It is important to try to be as consistent as possible when giving consequences. The more consistent you are the faster you can shape your child's behavior.
