Why Chinese?

Chinese is the most widely spoken first language in the world. The Mandarin dialect is the official language of China and Taiwan, and is widely spoken in Indonesia, Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore, Brunei, the Philippines and Mongolia. According to the most recent US census, Chinese is actually the third most spoken language in the United States.

China is the heir to the traditions of one of the world's richest and most ancient cultures and is the world's second largest economy. According to a Bloomberg study of the most important languages for international business, Mandarin Chinese ranks first after English. China's economic, political and cultural impact in the next few years will have a significant impact on the world. As business relationships deepen between Delaware and China, having skills to communicate in Mandarin will be an invaluable economic advantage.

Why Immersion?

More than forty years of research consistently documents the power of immersion education to help students attain high levels of world language proficiency. No other type of instruction, short of living in a non-English-speaking environment, is as successful. Young children especially thrive in this type of learning environment where learning a new language comes as naturally as learning their first one. World language immersion programs are also the least expensive way for schools and districts to deliver high quality world language learning opportunities to their students.

Who Can Participate?

Delaware World Language Immersion Programs are open to all Delaware students of varying backgrounds and abilities. Applications are open to all students enrolling in Kindergarten at one of the participating Delaware elementary schools. Parents who feel that their child may have significant communication delays in their first language should seriously weigh the pros and cons of enrolling their child in an immersion program.



What to Expect

World Language Immersion Programs offer a robust bilingual experience for young learners at the point in their cognitive development that is perfect for the acquisition of a new language. Students benefit from the instruction of two highly qualified classroom teachers -- one who teaches them for half of the day in English and the other for half of the day in Chinese. The English-speaking teacher teaches English Language Arts as well as some other elements of the Delaware Recommended Curriculum (science, social studies, mathematics, etc.)

The Chinese-speaking teacher teaches Chinese Language Arts, mathematics, science and portions of the social studies curriculum.

World Language Immersion students follow the same standardsbased curriculum in all content areas that a non-immersion students would follow in any other Delaware elementary classroom.

During the instructional day, the Chinese-language teacher speaks only in Mandarin Spanish and communicates using a range of engaging strategies, including pictures, songs, games, body language, expressions pantomime, drama, etc. Young learners are adept at acquiring language in meaningful contexts. After a brief period at the beginning of the year, students will also only speak in Mandarin during the Spanish-language half of the day.

Instruction Continues

All Districts with Elementary World Language Immersion Programs have identified a continuously K12 Immersion pathway for students to continuous build toward advanced-level language proficiency.

In the middle school, students will have a hybrid, online world language learning experience with Spanish-speaking peers.

In high school, immersion students will be able to take the AP Spanish course in 9th grade and then participate in dual-enrollment or dual credit courses with local universities.
