

New labs further STEAM education at ETHS

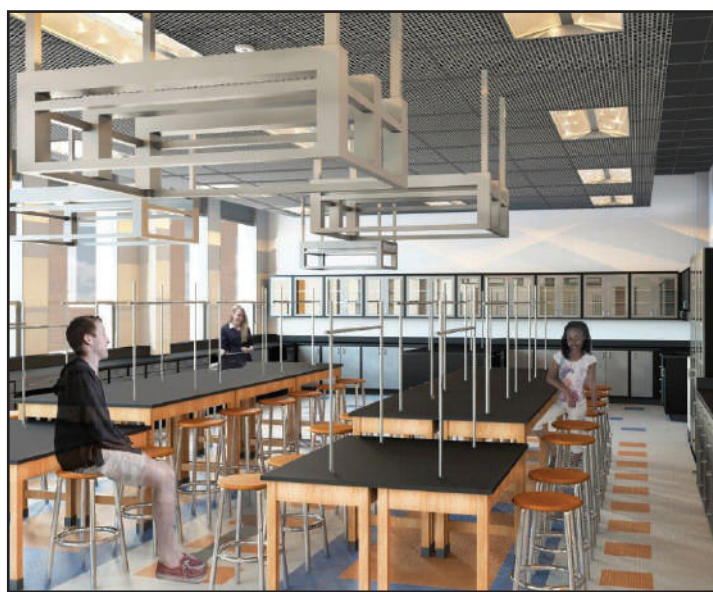
Preparing students to compete in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) is critical to today's global economy. Since STEM education shares similar values found in fine-arts education such as innovation, critical thinking, and problem solving, art was added to the other disciplines, and STEM is now STEAM at ETHS, one of the first schools in the country to adopt this concept.

Last year, ETHS took an important step to further STEAM education. A ceremonial ground-breaking was held on May 27 to celebrate the success of the STEAM labs campaign. ETHS alumnus **Leonard Schaeffer '63**, founding Chairman/CEO of WellPoint, fulfilled his promise to contribute \$500,000 after \$100,000 was raised by the ETHS Educational Foundation in private donations. That amount, and more, was raised, and four new labs were constructed over the summer.

The labs are designed to house different STEAM courses. Currently, science classes (physics, chem-phys, and anatomy) are using the labs, but other STEAM-related courses can find a home in them as well. Each lab includes moveable lab tables, steel cabinetry, water, document

tronic sensors graph the pendulum motion. The orange-and-blue floor tiling can be used for measurement studies.

ETHS also has three other STEAM labs: an Engineering Lab, a Digital Photography Lab, and the Geometry in Construction lab/



cameras that project information onto wall-mounted screens, and flat-screen TVs. Physics teachers can hang balls from ceiling-mounted steel baskets to study time, motion, weight, and space while elec-

classroom. In Fall 2015, a new Advanced Manufacturing lab will join the STEAM family at ETHS.

The push for STEAM innovations comes at a favorable time for ETHS. In September 2012,

the new ETHS-based office for Northwestern University's Office of STEAM Education Partnerships opened to provide students and faculty with cutting-edge opportunities in academics, research, career exploration, and collaboration among the various content areas. The new labs will certainly further the STEAM mission.

Schaeffer agrees. At the ground-breaking, he said, "It is a young person's high school experience that really develops his or her character and

lays the groundwork for life's direction." A 2007 ETHS Distinguished Alumni Award winner, Schaeffer is the founding Chairman/CEO of WellPoint, the nation's largest health benefits company by membership. He currently is the Judge Robert Maclay Widney Chair and Professor at the University of Southern California and is a Senior Advisor to TPG Capital, a private equity firm.

First ETHS "Geometry in Construction" house built, moved, on the market

Last year, the Mathematics and Career/Technical Education (CTE) departments at ETHS introduced an interdisciplinary course where students learn both geometry and construction skills while building an actual house. "Geometry in Construction" launched with 56 students, and on June 16, the one-story, three-bedroom house—16-feet by 75-feet—was moved from ETHS's back lot to a City-donated property.

Taught by Maryjoy Heineman (Math) and

The house had to be cut in half to fit on moving trailers and negotiate Evanston's streets. Once on site, a crane lifted each half into place, one in front of the other.

Matthew Kaiser (CTE), the course is a collaborative project with ETHS, the City of Evanston, and the Community Partners in Affordable

Housing. Throughout the year, the students gained hands-on experience in construction safety and a variety of construction skills, but just as im-

portantly, they learned about teamwork, communication, and trust.

Community partnerships are important to the program's initial and continued success. A good deal of start-up funds came from the school, and donations, including major grants from the ETHS Educational Foundation and the Evanston Community Foundation. An advisory committee of local construction-related professionals helped the school develop the course and oversaw

progress during the year. Evanston resident **Todd Kihm '88** stepped in mid-year as licensed general contractor. Hundreds of school and community residents volunteered their help on quarterly Community Build Days.

The City of Evanston worked with ETHS to find a suitable lot for the house, which will be sold by the Community Partners for Affordable Housing to low-income residents. First prefer-

Superintendent's Letter

ETHS continues to make measurable strides in outcomes for students. In 2013, our students' posted historically high ACT results and greatly increased their numbers taking and succeeding in Advanced Placement (AP) courses. Those gains continued in 2014. ETHS seniors registered the second-highest ACT composite score in school history, 64% of our juniors and seniors took AP exams, an all-time high, and more ETHS students than ever earned a score of 3, 4, or 5 on their AP exams.

This year we have exciting changes. A new Student Success Center, called The Hub, brings the academic study centers for math, science, English/history, and world languages into one place. The Hub also houses community ser-

vice, college/career services, student activities, homework center, Wildkit Academy, and community youth services provided by Y.O.U. and the Youth Job Center.

Other newly remodeled areas include four new 21st-century STEAM labs (see related story), and two new math classrooms. The auditorium has new rigging that makes the space more functional and safe, and a new orchestra shell to improve sound quality. Two smaller gyms have new bleachers. Also, we've opened a Welcome Center to give parents, families, and visitors a dedicated place to access general information, specific parent-guardian programs, and important direct services, such as language-translation services and transition pro-

grams for freshmen and transfer students.

We are working constantly to boost communications at ETHS. Along with new print publications, we added a new mobile app that we encourage everyone to download onto their smartphones to stay connected to ETHS (see related story on p. 5).

There are also many programming improvements. All freshmen received Chromebook laptop computers to increase individualized teacher help and feedback, and to give students access to online resources at school and at home. Since reading is the gateway to learning, we're strengthening stu-

dents' comprehension skills, and training teachers how to incorporate literacy skills into all academic disciplines.

We also have several new courses: AP Government, AP Physics 1, AP Physics 2, and an additional pre-engineering course in Software Engineering. Plus, this year we will implement Individualized Career and Academic Plans to help

each student graduate, be college and career ready, and have a post-secondary plan.

At ETHS, we recognize this great school—with a rich tradition of excellence—can and must keep moving forward. Our commitment to continuous improvement in achieving equity and excellence for all students is embedded in all our work and never stops.

ETHS holds first Black Male Summit

On September 26, ETHS hosted its first ever Black Male Summit, attended by 412 students, grades 9-12, and 167 adult volunteers. Many adult volunteers served as mentors for students at the Summit and committed to working them over their years at ETHS. Over 25% of the mentors are ETHS alumni.



Planners of the Black Male Summit included (l. to rt.) M.D. Shelton '15, student school board representative; Supt. Eric Witherspoon; Calvin Mackie, keynote speaker; Marcus Campbell, Asst. Supt./Principal; and Ahmadou Drame '07, Community and External Affairs Coordinator.

The Summit goals were to connect Black male students to resources available at ETHS and in the school community, and to support their academic and social growth. At the Summit, students engaged in various activities, including:

- Workshops designed to help them construct their own identities as Black males in today's society.
- Group discussions with other Black male students and adult mentors from the Evanston community.

- Networking hour with 15 ETHS partner agencies and local institutions to connect students with community resources.
- Planning session to identify an action plan for the school year, including mentoring opportunities for Black male students.

Alumni volunteers represented classes from the 1950s to 2011.

City Council members **Delores Holmes '58**, and **Peter Braithwaite '88** joined community leader **Judge Lionel Jean-Baptiste '70**, and members of the ETHS staff and faculty such as **Franz Calixte '89**, **Harold Bailey '83**, **Corey Boyd '97**, **Dale Leibforth '93**, and many others in leading groups and becoming mentors.

Evanston Scholars Program

A special program is helping ETHS juniors and seniors transition to college. Starting in 2011, ETHS English teacher **Steve Newman '86** and many community (and alumni) supporters developed the Evanston Scholars program, a non-profit organization. Students are identified their junior year and are assigned a mentor (many are ETHS alums) who works with them through their graduation from college.

The program strives to improve college access and success for a diverse



group of ambitious, underserved students, helps them from college admission through graduation, and offers resources such as workshops, campus visits, and ACT prep to students who lack financial, academic, and family/community assistance.

One of the major issues facing students around the country is sustainability at college.

Ninety-eight percent of Evanston Scholars who started college are still enrolled compared to a national average of 40%. Over 105 ETHS students have participated in the program, and the newest and largest group of 30 juniors will be inducted in late November. ence goes to ETHS employees, next to City of Evanston employees, and then to anyone who lives or works in Evanston. Profits from the house sale will be used to buy materials and supplies for building this year's house.

The 60 students enrolled in the second-year course will build a two-

story, three bedroom, 2-1/2 bath residence on a smaller lot than the first. Both floors will be built simultaneously, side-by-side, in the school's back lot.

ETHS Kudos

ETHS student success earn national rankings

In mid-April, for the 3rd consecutive year, both *The Washington Post* and *U.S. News & World Report* ranked ETHS in the top 2-3% of high schools in the nation, based on, among other factors, the percentage of students taking

Advanced (college-level) Placement courses. Both news media used data collected nationally, but *U.S. News* also applied its own Equity and Excellence index and awarded ETHS a silver medal based on such factors

as how well all of its students are prepared for college, not just college-bound students. This fall, Movoto Real Estate ranked Evanston #7 out of the 10 best suburbs for education in America.

ETHS students rank well with National Merit

The number of ETHS students honored in this year's National Merit Scholarship Program is higher than in many years. In September, 21 seniors were named National Merit semifinalists, and eight more were named National

Achievement semifinalists (National Merit's scholarship program for high-achieving Black students). ETHS ranks 8th nationally in the number of Achievement semifinalists this year and is the only comprehensive public high

school among the top 8 schools. In addition, 32 seniors were named Commended Students and Outstanding Participants in the National Merit and National Achievement competitions, respectively.



STUDENTS

In general...

ETHS junior **Andrew Bempah** was one of 80 students nationwide chosen to participate in the Minority Introduction to Engineering and Science six-week summer program at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

In business education...

In February, 40 ETHS students competed against 1,300 students from area schools at the DECA (Distributive Education Clubs of America) Career Conference in Rosemont, IL. They competed through business role-plays and business-oriented exams, and 22 ETHS students won medals in their respective events, the largest number of area winners in ETHS DECA history. At state finals, junior **Andrew Bempah** took 2nd place in his event, and seniors **Evan Doubovikov** and **Addy Sharma** took 2nd place in theirs, qualifying them for the DECA International Conference

later in May. Andrew went on to win 4th overall in his event at internationals, the highest place ever earned by an ETHS student.

In fine arts...

Last May, the ETHS Wind Symphony was one of seven high-school groups chosen to perform at the 2014 Illinois SuperState Concert Band Festival, marking ETHS's first-ever performance at this event and placing the students alongside the very best high school bands in the state.

In science/math/engineering...

ETHS juniors **Justin Liao** and **Benedict Brady** finished first in Oral Presentation in the 4AA Division at the 2014 state math contest. Sixty-two high schools across the state competed in this top division; ETHS placed 12th overall.

In sports...

Senior **Parker English** earned 1st-place in both the 200-meter and

400-meter finals at the state track meet. She also placed 3rd the 100 meters. She won four events at the Central Suburban League South division meet (100, 200, 400, long jump). Parker was named the Gatorade Athlete of the Year in the state, only the third ETHS winner in the 29-year history of this award (the others are **Janis Foster '89** and **Shalina Clarke '06**). Parker earned 13 state medals over her four years at ETHS and was a member of two state championship relay teams. She is now attends U of Notre Dame.

FACULTY

In June, ETHS Debate coach **Jeff Hannan** received a Diamond Coaching Award from the NSDA, the largest interscholastic speech/debate organization in the nation.

ETHS awarded breakfast grant

ETHS received a Fuel Up™ Breakfast Grant from the General Mills Foodservice and National Dairy Council Program to expand its healthy breakfast program. The 2014 grant program disbursed nearly \$50,000 to 26 schools, with each grant recipient receiving up to \$2,000.

The ETHS funds will support a Grab-and-Go Breakfast Kiosk located in the gym wing to give students an alternate location to purchase breakfast every day, in addition to Beardsley and Bacon Cafeterias and the snack window in the main lobby.

Gordon Segal '56 meets with ETHS student business club



Members of ETHS's Investment and Business Club were treated to a presentation and tour of the Crate & Barrel headquarters by founder **Gordon Segal**, a member of the ETHS Class of '56 and a Distinguished Alumni Award recipient.

He detailed his upbringing, how he loved his time at ETHS, which he said prepared him for Wharton business school, his great experience at Northwestern University, and the value a liberal arts education had in opening up a worldly view that would help him pioneer his business.

Several themes emerged as Segal talked to the students. Being an en-

trepreneur is hard work; attention to the smallest details has allowed him to improve and expand his company; the key to business is doing what you love; and to succeed in business, a retail store has to be so meticulously cared for and operated, that customers want to buy from you.

He feels his personal motto "stay humble, stay nervous" has helped him from becoming too arrogant because he was afraid he'd harm the relationship with consumers.

The 2014 Distinguished Alumni Awards will be presented in an assembly for the senior class on Monday, January 26, in the ETHS Auditorium. More information on each of the awardees and photos will be in the spring issue of *The KIT*, but here is a preview of this year's Distinguished Alumni.

Cleopatra Bugelas Alexander, 1966, is a leader in the not-for-profit community in the Chicago area, having led the Women's Board of the Art Institute of Chicago and serving as Executive Director of the Albert Pick Jr. Fund Foundation.

Henry Engelhardt, 1975, heads the Admiral Group in Wales, the largest auto insurer

in Great Britain. Henry has also founded a major charity supporting children's programming in Wales.

David Epstein, 1998, is the author of *The Sports Gene: Inside the Science of Extraordinary Athletic Performance*. David is a reporter and writer who was inspired by his friend and classmate, track star **Kevin Richards**, who had a heart attack and died in ETHS's field house as he completed a race.

Willie J. Miller, Jr., 1971, is the chief legal officer of Mondelez, the successor company to Kraft. Willie has been a distinguished attorney in the Chicago area and has served on the ETHS school board.

Jack Rakove, 1964, is the 1997 Pulitzer Prize-winning author of *Original Meanings: Politics and Ideas in the Making of the Constitution* and a professor of history, American Studies, and political science at Stanford University.

Neal Wolin, 1979, has been the longest serving Assistant Secretary of the US Treasury Department and has served as Interim Secretary. He has been involved in banking and government throughout his career.

Eat, drink, and renew friendships at ETHS-related restaurants

A new restaurant and a microbrewery with ETHS connections have opened in Evanston.

Boltwood, a farm-to-table eatery with an eclectic menu, opened this year at 804 Davis St., at the corner of Sherman Ave. and Davis St. It is co-owned by Evanston resident and restaurateur John Kim and **Brian Huston '89**, who most recently was chef de cuisine at Chicago's popular The Publican.

The new restaurant's name refers to noted Evanston educator Henry L. Boltwood, ETHS's first principal (1883-1906), and after whom the "west" wing of the

school was named when it opened in 1967-68. Check out Boltwood's web site at eat@boltwoodevanston.com.

This fall, two ETHS grads—**Josh Gilbert '91** (founder) and **Ben Geerts '90** (taproom manager)—opened Evanston's first brewery, Temperance Beer Company, at 2000 Dempster St. According to Gilbert, Temperance is not a brewpub, although pasties and gourmet snacks are available, or you can bring your own food, or order in.

So, Temperance, with a poke at Evanston's prohibition past, is all about the beer they brew

and serve in flights of 4 oz. tasters, half-pints, pints, and even returnable growlers. In fact, in September its Gate-crasher IPA was awarded Silver for English-style India pale ale at the 2014 Great American Beer Festival.

Washington, DC, ETHS alums kick off regional keep-in-touch reunions

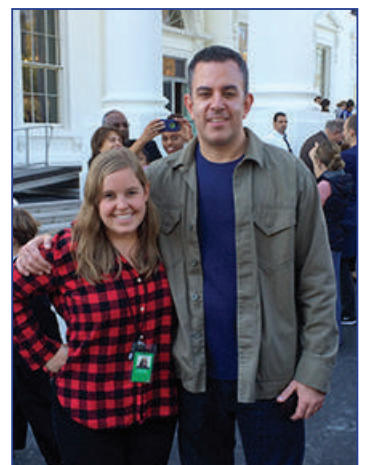
Following a great turnout at the April alumni reception in Washington, DC, several people wanted to promote staying in touch.

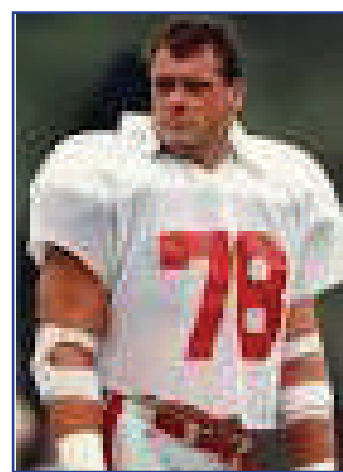

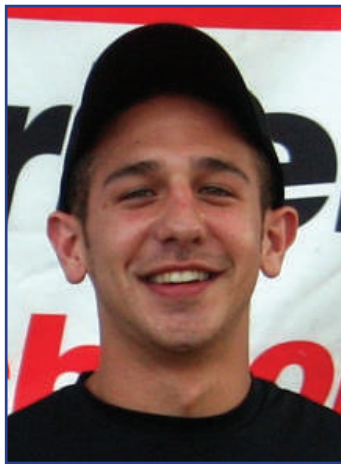

Other classes also will immerse themselves in simulations similar to those in Imax theaters such as a virtual tour of the chambers of the heart. The digitally equipped planetarium will be made available to other Evanston school children and various youth groups.

In response, **Leonard Schaeffer '63**, pledged \$500,000 for the planetarium project on the condition that his gift is matched by \$200,000 from other alumni and parents by June 30, 2015. Two years ago, Schaeffer made a similar challenge of \$500,000 for ETHS to build four STEAM labs, which opened this fall (see related story on p. 1).

The planetarium, dedicated in 1968, was the first in the country built on a high school campus. Today, however, structural improvements are needed and the equipment inside the
