



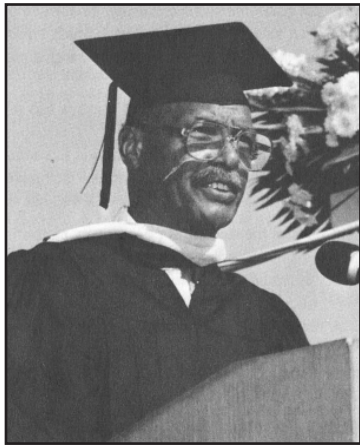

ETHS District 202 Reflects on Life of Former School Board President Daniel Phillips

Daniel P. Phillips, the longest serving Evanston school board member, passed away on October 24, 2011 at the age of 94. Phillips was elected to the Evanston Township High School District 202 Board in April 1964, and later served as the first African American board president. During his 25 years of board service, he served as ETHS District 202 board president for seven years (1969-74 and 1986-88) and as vice president for eight years.



the school and talk to your other friends about getting involved, I'll start working on these things right away. So, I did and he did."

From there, Phillips became the District 65 Caucus Committee member from Foster School, and subsequently began his service on the District 202 Board. During his time on the D202 Board, ETHS established its reputation as one of the nation's top schools. "We were innovative. We tried things differently, but at the same time, we maintained the quality of education that we're known for."

In 1970 Phillips helped found an educational lobbying organization, ED-RED, representing public school districts in northern Illinois. His expertise in school matters prompted the Illinois Association of School Boards to tap him for its governing

board and as a representative to its Federal Relations Network in Washington, DC. In 1988 the state education office named Phillips as the only school board member to its Special Education Task Force.

Phillips said that his biggest contribution to the ETHS board was "[my] ability to talk to and relate to and communicate with a big variety of society, at all economic levels, all racial levels, and the fact that I can keep a dialogue with them." Phillips explained, "It's nothing that I bought or trained for or anything, it's just probably natural, part of the way I was raised."

Dan Phillips was an Evanston resident for nearly 70 years. In addition to hosting "Dan Day," ETHS also renamed its annual indoor track meet as the "Dan Phillips Invitational Relays" in his honor. Additional highlights of Dan Phillips' life are featured in a November 4th Evanston Review article.

A memorial service was held for Dan Phillips in November 2011 at First United Methodist Church in Evanston. In lieu of flowers, the family requested that memorial contributions be sent to the ETHS Educational Foundation and Y.O.U.

On June 11, 1989 the ETHS Board of Education held a community-wide celebration called "Dan Day" to honor Phillips' 25th anniversary on the school board. At that time, Phillips was interviewed for an article in a local School News publication. Phillips conveyed that his involvement in local school politics began when his eldest daughter was preparing to enter Kindergarten at Foster School when Evanston's elementary schools were racially segregated. Phillips said that he met with Oscar Chute, then Superintendent of District 65, because he was angered by the substandard education offered at Foster.

"Oscar Chute and I spent a half day in his office. He sort of challenged me. He said if you promise to get involved with

ETHS's "Mikado" Turns 50 and Throws a Party

Evanston Township High School's Emmy Award-winning production of "The Mikado" turns 50 this year. On May 12, members of the cast, crew, and orchestra planned to gather in the ETHS auditorium, where it all began, for a reunion to see old friends and classmates and relive the magic of that momentous musical event.

ETHS presented Gilbert and Sullivan's delightful operetta in Spring 1962. In the audience was Arthur Thorson, TV producer, who at the urging of his boss, Clark B. George, Vice President and General Manager of CBS's Chicago affiliate WBBM-TV, attended the show. According to Thorson, he was so impressed by the "beauty of the auditorium-town of

Titipu and the near-professional performance of the cast" that he convinced his station to tape the ETHS musical and air it as part of WBBM-TV's Repertoire Theatre Series the following fall.

"The Mikado" aired September 11, 1962, pre-empting two evening family favorites and was sponsored by Hills Brothers. On May 13, 1963, ETHS's "Mikado" was awarded

three Emmys (for costumes, make-up, and a third award) by members of the Chicago Chapter of the Academy of

Television Arts and Sciences, making ETHS the first high school in the United States to have a student production so honored by the Academy.

Alice Haselden Lane, ETHS '62, played Katisha, the Mikado's intended daughter-in-law, in one of the production's two casts. Over 170 students were involved in the show (77 cast and chorus, 55 orchestra, and 43 crew members).

This winter and spring, ETHS's boys' basketball team won the regional and sectional titles and advanced to the Elite Eight super-sectional, where we lost to Simeon, the #1 Illinois seed and a nationally ranked team. (And, yes, we beat New Trier in the playoffs.) I witnessed the school spirit and pride of hundreds of students in the cheering section—a sea of orange and blue. In the closing minute of the super-sectional game, when it was clear Simeon was going to win, I saw hundreds of ETHS students on their feet, chanting “Thank you, Kits. Thank you, Kits” to show their appreciation for their peers on the team, thanking them for a great run, and for representing ETHS with class and sportsmanship.

During these same months, our theater department wrapped up a stunning production of *A Streetcar Named Desire*, and rehearsals are now underway for what will surely be a terrific production of our spring musical *Oliver!*. Our music department is once again a GRAMMY® Signature School semifinalist, upholding its reputation as one of the top programs in the nation.

Additional “honor roll” kudos this season include:
• A team of two ETHS students who placed third in the nation in the prestigious Siemens Corporation com-

- petition in math, science and technology;
- The ETHS DECA team won several of the state competitions;
- Two students were named 2012 YoungArts Award winners by the National Foundation for the Advancement in the Arts;
- Our urban debate and our debate teams are on a roll; no other school had students place among the top ten in more than one IHSA state championship event, and Evanston had three top ten students and two state runner-ups;
- Our chess team took second in the North Suburban Chess League and finished in the top eight at the IHSA state tournament;
- Two student teams won first and also third place in the Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers 2012 Chicago Regional Science Bowl;
- Our students won the Worldwide Youth in Science and Engineering regional competition;
- The speech team boasts a state finalist;
- Our freshman-sophomore Scholastic Bowl team won its second-straight Central Suburban League title; and
- Two ETHS seniors were named national semifinalists in the 2012 International Physics Olympiad.

ETHS Students Present Real-World Solutions in Math Contest

Three teams of Evanston Township High School (ETHS) students received regional recognition in the 2011 COMAP High School Mathematical Contest in Modeling (HiMCM). The contest offers high school students the opportunity to present solutions to real-world problems that require a combination of mathematics, science, and computer modeling skills. A total of 435 teams from 24 states and 4 foreign countries competed in November 2011.

ETHS had 50 students working in 13 teams this school year to develop solutions to one of

two problems. The first, called the Space Shuttle Problem, expected students to develop a comprehensive ten-year plan to maintain the International Space Station. Alternately, students could choose the Search and Find problem that challenged them to find a lost object under a given set of circumstances and assumptions. Teams of up to 4 students were given 36 consecutive hours to construct their solutions and submit a strong written report for their problem.

The annual COMAP competition is designed to provide students with the opportunity to work as team members in a contest that will stimulate and improve their problem-

solving and writing skills.

Three ETHS teams rated as Regional Outstanding, which were the top 15 percent of papers. Members of these teams were: seniors Aja Klevs, Alex Nierlich, Lauren Nortz, and Sammy Straus; juniors Xena Becker, Caroline Duke, Laura Goetz and Dina Sinclair; and sophomores Manny Dallas, Zach Favakeh, Henry Magnuson and Lloyd Shatkin.

Four other ETHS teams were rated as Meritorious, the third tier of recognition representing the top 40% of papers. Only one other Illinois school placed this high. The sponsors for the ETHS teams were Glenford Gordon and Mark F. Vondracek.



The ETHS Speech Team earned a 2nd place team trophy as well as individual awards at the January 21st tournament at Hersey High School.

Scholastic Bowl Team (JV) Brings Home League Title

Congratulations to ETHS's freshman-sophomore Scholastic Bowl team for their second-straight regular season Central Suburban League (CSL) title. The junior varsity (JV) team, led by sophomores Adam

Frim, Geoffrey Wallis, and Josh Davidoff, defeated Niles West and Glenbrook South to finish with an undefeated 10-0 record.

ETHS senior Erik Baker led the Varsity team this year with more than seven toss-ups answered per game. The team ended their season 6-4, yielding to Niles West High School.

ETHS Seniors Win Third Place at National Siemens Competition

In December 2011, ETHS seniors Julia Crowley-Farenga and Patrick Loftus won third place in the team portion of the 2011 Siemens Competition in Math, Science & Technology. Crowley-Farenga and Loftus share a \$40,000 scholarship that was presented at the thirteenth annual awards hosted by The George Washington University.

Finalists spent a weekend in Washington, DC as they presented their posters, gave presentations and had private Q&A sessions with judges of the Siemens Competition, the nation's premier science research competition for high school students. An all-time record of 2,436 students registered to enter the Siemens Competition this year for an unprecedented 1,541 projects submitted.

Crowley-Farenga and Loftus entered the team competition

and worked together for several months with astrophysics postdoctoral fellow Dr. Laura Trouille at Northwestern University. Their research focused on a new morphological classification scheme of post-starburst galaxies, which are rather rare galaxies in an interesting phase of galactic evolution. In the past, the sample size of these galaxies that had been studied was on order of a few dozen. But Crowley-Farenga and Loftus went through a new database of 2,800 of these galaxies, bringing in new research possibilities for astronomers. Their work immediately led to new findings that are helping astronomers figure out which of several theoretical models of galactic evolution are valid.

The Siemens Foundation provides more than \$7 million annually in support of educational initiatives in the areas of science, technology, engineering and math in the United States.

Love and jealousy are never more complicated, or hilarious, than when William Shakespeare's characters unwittingly fall for men disguised as women and vice versa, as happens in the madcap comedy, "Twelfth Night," performed at ETHS on Feb. 9th, 10th, and 11th, just in time for Valentine's Day.

"I love Shakespeare and I really think the comedies connect well with high school students," said director Tim Herbert, noting there is less Shakespeare in the high school

curriculum these days and the bard's tragedies are more likely to make the reading list. "I also think it is important for actors in educational theater to get their first experiences wrestling with the language," he said of the playwright's Elizabethan language. "The other beauty of those Shakespearean comedies is that you can get a lot of kids involved," he said, of his cast of 25 stage performers and a crew of about 15.

The production featured Lora Kelley and Anthony DeCapri as Viola and Duke Orsino, and Olivia Cygan as Orsino's disinterested love interest.

ETHS Senior Launches Alumni Outreach Program

"Evanston alumni are known for having strong careers and being very successful. Why not take advantage of that?" This sentiment from ETHS senior Jesse Chatz is the impetus for E-Town Opportunities, an alumni outreach program designed to connect ETHS students with adults in career fields that interest them. Chatz, who serves as the student representative of the ETHS District 202 Board of Education, launched the program as part of his second semester Senior Studies project and received endorsement from the board of the ETHS Alumni Association.

The E-Town Opportunities program will kick off with a career exploration fair on Monday, April 30 at ETHS, 1600 Dodge Ave., Evanston. The event will be held in Room N-112 after school, 2:45-4:30pm. ETHS alumni are invited to participate and offer advice and career guidance to current ETHS students who are seeking internships or jobs. Chatz hopes the program will help better prepare ETHS students for their experiences beyond high school.

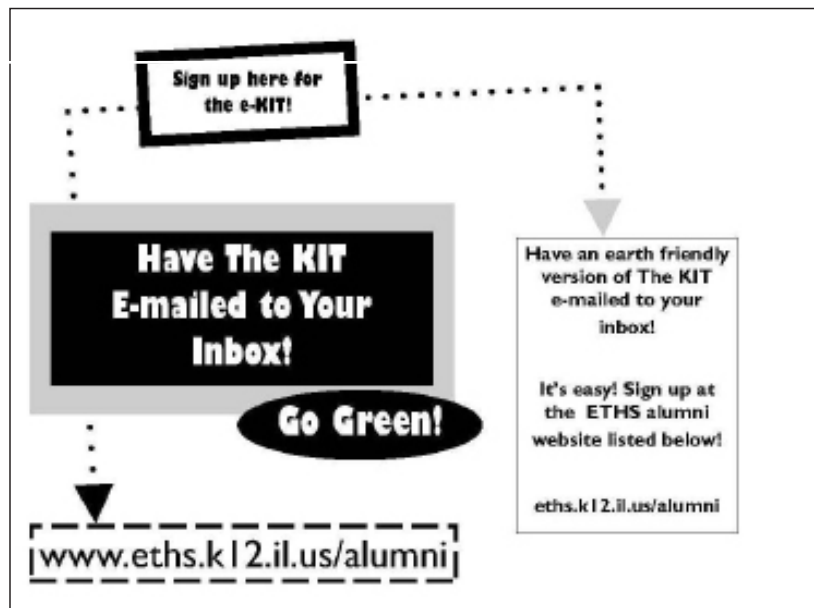

Class Gifts Leave a Lasting Impact

Their generous efforts led to the donation of a vision and hearing machine, one Titmus OV7 Vision Screener and a Maico MA 27 Audiometer, to the ETHS Health Service Department.

These machines will be used in screening the vision and hearing of ETHS students. Over the last few months several hundred ETHS students have been screened with these new machines which are being used regularly.

The nurses at ETHS Health Service believe that the vision screener will last forever and the audiometer, which requires yearly calibration, should last 15-20 years.

"The screening machines have already proven to be a great resource to us. So far this year, we have screened the vision and hearing of 650 high school students and 15 Child Center Students. Having a second set of machines has allowed us to be more productive in a shorter

period of time. Every time we identify a student with reduced vision or hearing, we are able to intervene on their behalf. This intervention often results in improved hearing and or vision. Since eighty percent of academic learning is visual, improved vision can make a significant impact on a student's achievement. Your gift will be long remembered" said Mary Beth Siegel, BSN, RN, NCSN at ETHS Health Services.

Authors' Bookshelf

Clifford (Hal) Browder, '46, is a writer and retired freelance editor living in New York City. "The Pleasuring of Men," his fourth book and first novel, has been published by Gival Press. Set in New York in the late 1860s, it tells the story of a respectably raised young man who chooses to become a male prostitute servicing the city's elite, then falls in love with his most difficult client.

"Pleasuring," Browder's only novel with a gay protagonist, is part of a series of novels in progress all set in nineteenth-century New York, a scene of frenzied growth and speculation, plus riots, boom, and bust. Characters include robber barons and abortionists, detectives and prostitutes, ragpickers, visionaries, and cheats.

This project was first inspired by background research for Browder's two published biographies, one dealing with the colorful Wall Street speculator Daniel Drew, and the other with the notorious abortionist Madame Restell. Browder's short fiction has appeared in *Quarter After Eight*, *Third Coast*, and *New York Stories*, and his poetry in numerous reviews. He is also the author of a critical study of the French Surrealist poet André Breton. *The Pleasuring of Men* is available directly from Gival Press at givalpress.com or from Amazon.com, and also with Nook or Kindle. I was sure I would recognize no one in attendance. I was sure that this would be my last reunion and a waste of time and money.

WOW was I wrong. The ETHS edifice was more spectacular than I remembered. I knew lots of fellow "Kits" either by name or by face. I was especially drawn to the curriculum and to the current efforts to offer freshman courses that would not pre-judge and track students.

The reunion committee had worked hard and it showed. I had a personalized tour of the grounds and baseball field by the ETHS Educational Foundation Director, Fran Caan, which was meaningful as I had played 4 years of baseball under Ken McGonagle. She went out of her way to make my day.

All in all, it was a great weekend. Thanks for the opportunity to "come back home" and relive old times. It almost made me wish I was an ETHS student again.

Bobby McKeiver was the greatest high school football player any of us had ever seen. And he was ours, ETHS '52. He was All-State in football, of course; a two-year Varsity starter in basketball; All-State in Track & Field, taking 5th in the state in the 100 as a junior and anchoring the state champion 4 x 220 yard relay as a senior. He also set the record for our 17-event Field Day at ETHS and I doubt anyone ever remotely approached his numbers in that decathlon-like event. He was just 5'6" tall but weighed a powerful 175 pounds. As someone said, "He's a big man who happens to be short." And he could cut or change direction on the proverbial dime.

But it was more than that. He kicked off, kicked field goals, kicked extra points, and punted. As a senior, his punting average was 48.6 yards per punt, better than anyone at the NCAA or NFL level. He set the Suburban League (a conference that no longer exists) scoring record with 102 points in seven league games, later threatened by

George Rantis of Oak Park HS, with 96. But Bobby McKeiver seldom played the entire game. In our 80-7 win over Highland Park, he carried three times for three touchdowns and was then held out by coach Karl Plath, who already had a "blood bath" on his hands. Bobby could have scored 60 that day alone.

In four years at ETHS, Bob McKeiver played in just one losing game. His freshman team went 8-0; his sophomore team went 8-0; the Varsity was 7-1 his junior year and 8-0 in his senior year, the 1951 season, still the greatest team in ETHS history and I don't care what the historians and revisionists say. The one loss was to Proviso, at Maywood, in the mud, 14-12. Bobby scored a TD, kicked an extra point, kicked a field goal and the team got a safety. I was there, of course, and I have never seen such field conditions. Mud? Rain? More like a Tsunami had hit. In any other conditions, we'd have won. Anyway, he was 31-1 in four years at ETHS.

Bobby McKeiver was a legend. When he died last year, a friend, Rick Phalen, called me with the news. He just said, "Number 46 died." I needed no explanation as to who Number 46 might have been. He was just a year or two older than us but he was like something from another planet. I've never seen such a combination of speed, power and coordination in a little guy. And, he was tough. Tacklers just bounced off him. We stood up every time he touched the ball because we knew he could go all the way. His broken-field runs were mind-boggling. He had great split vision, with wide-set eyes. He was the wonder of our time.

Our last game was at home, vs. arch-rival New Trier, in the bitter cold of that awful winter of 1951-52. Memorial Field was a sheet of ice. You couldn't stand up on it. We figured we might lose. New Trier ran the Single Wing under veteran coach Walt Aschenbach. It was designed for ball-control and perfect for the conditions. We figured McKeiver would not score on that surface. Were we ever wrong. We won, 40-0, and Bobby scored four touchdowns, skating across the ice like he danced over the turf. He was Adrian Peterson before there was an Adrian Peterson. He went inside and he went outside. The Wrath of God.

He was recruited by everyone but chose Northwestern, which impressed us. The head coach at NU was an Evanston boy, the great Bob Voigts. Voigts had also hired former ETHS coach Bob Reihsen, as his offensive assistant. All of that worked in favor of Bobby going to school right at home. He grew up not five blocks from Dyche Stadium, right near the Northwestern Railway station, not that far from where I used to live. We lived at 2537 Eastwood Avenue. Bobby's family lived two blocks away, at the corner of Poplar and Lincoln Streets. Surely, he used to sneak in to see NU play, just like the rest of us. Well, NU had a prized prospect, that's for sure.

In their first game of his sophomore year, 1953-54, NU beat Iowa State, 35-0, and Bobby played well. We were all there to see his second game, against Army. Early on, Bobby went zigzag through the West Point defense just like he'd done in the Suburban League, going for 26 yards before being tackled in front of the Army bench and legendary coach Earl 'Red' Blaik. The pileup caused a sprained ankle for Bobby. It was bad and, basically, he was done for the year. Northwestern won that game, 33-20, to go 2-0 on the year. But, without Bobby, they ended 3-6, and Bobby McKeiver, quite down about the whole thing, enlisted in the U.S. Army. He was gone for two years, 1954-56. In that time, NU went through two coaches, as Bob Voigts resigned after going 2-7 the next year, 1954. Lou Saban took over for the 1955 season, going 0-8-1, tying Illinois, 7-7, in the last game of the year. All hell broke loose at NU. Athletic Director Ted Payseur was reassigned and Purdue football coach Stu Holcomb took over. The ground is still shaking from the total overhaul he made, starting with football coach Ara Parseghian coming in from his post as head coach at Miami (Ohio). Ara took over for the 1956 season, just as Bobby was coming back from Military Service. But that's another story for another day. D

ETHS Athletic Department Seeks Nominations for 2012 Hall of Fame

The Evanston Athletic Department is taking nominations now through May 1st for the 2012 Athletic Hall of Fame. The ETHS Athletic Hall of Fame was established during the 1994-95 school year in order to honor outstanding former high school athletes from Evanston Township High School. Individual athletes, teams, and coaches or administrators may be nominated.

Criteria for individuals:

- Must be an ETHS graduate from 2006 or earlier
- Must have demonstrated outstanding athletic achievement during his/her high school years and/or after graduation.

Criteria for a coach or administrator:

- Must have worked as a coach or administrator at ETHS for at least 10 years
- Must have made outstanding contributions to the ETHS athletic program
- Must be retired

Criteria for a team:

- Must be an IHSA, ETHS-sponsored sport
- Must be a varsity team from the 2005-2006 year or earlier
- Must have state or national ranking
- Must have displayed excellent sportsmanship and provided a positive impact on the community

Alumni Reception in Phoenix, Arizona

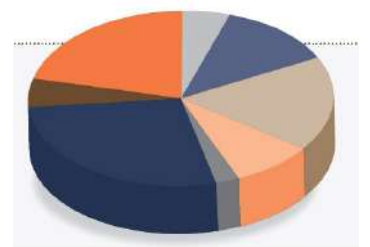
