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Our Goals for Student Achievement

District Goals

All students will be at grade level or higher in Reading.

We will get there by increasing each student's:

- Phonics Skills
- Fluency
- Comprehension of Nonfiction Text

Increase student proficiency rates across all grade levels by 6% over 2 years.

Kindergarten School Goals

Lake City administrators and teachers have studied our student performance data to decide and plan instruction to focus on the most important areas of improvement for our school.

Reading:

Kindergarten teachers will increase students' proficiency in reading by 15% over three years, concentrating on:

- Letter recognition, and phonics
- Recognizing high frequency sight words.
- Reading fluency
- Reading comprehension

In the Classroom

The Kindergarten team will work with students and their families to support students' success in reading by:

- Providing materials to parents with letter flashcards and games to practice and increase letter name recognition and letter sound recognition.
- Providing parents with a list of sight words and sight word flash cards to practice nightly with their child.
- Offering reading workshops for parents to learn strategies to help students at home.
- Provide MyOn resources

At Home

Lake City parents joined staff to develop ideas about how families can support students' success in reading. Our families have decided to:

- Read daily with my child to increase fluency and ask questions to build literary comprehension.
- Talk about the letters of the alphabet and notice them in books and on signs.
- Point out letters, especially letters in their own name.
- Play games to match lowercase and uppercase letters.
- Attend Reading and Curriculum Night to learn ways to help my child in reading.
- Visit the Parent Resource Center to get materials and resources to help my child with reading at home.

Lake City Students

Lake City students joined staff and parents to develop ideas about how they can succeed in school. Students thought of the following ideas to make connections between learning at home and school:

- I will listen, do my work, and learn.
- Practice recognizing uppercase and lowercase letters with the flashcards sent home.
- Practice letters sounds using flashcards.
- Read sight words nightly
- Read with my family every night.
- Complete homework
