




For the first time in the orchestra's history, 85% of our orchestra program students performed at LGPE, with two groups preparing and performing. A total of 58 students performed high level and quality repertoire, marking us one step closer to our goal of 100% student involvement in high level music making and assessment.

There are a total of 6 levels of difficulty with 1 being the least and 6 being the most. String Orchestra prepared a level 4/5 program and Chamber prepared a level 6 program. Both orchestra earned superior scores!

The preparation process for LGPE unified us as an orchestra program, gave us a clear unified goal, and revealed strengths and weaknesses which will drive future success. In our orchestra, the LGPE preparation process begins 8 weeks before LGPE as the true gauge of an orchestra's ability is not only in the level of music, but how quickly the skills necessary to perform and achieve are expressed and learned.

This means all graduating seniors will take 2 AP courses in art - classes they will be prepared to take. 11th grade students will move into a select studio course that is intended to prepare students for both portfolios. 
Advanced Chorus Receives Superiors in All Categories for GMEA Large Group Performance Evaluation (LGPE)





Biology Updates: Brown & Isdell

Biology students are currently working on Evolution: stability and change and Ecology: interactions among organisms in ecosystems as we get ready for the Georgia Milestones Assessment scheduled for Tuesday, April 30th. Ask your students to show you their tracking sheet of strengths and weaknesses so that they can prepare in a more efficient way to reach proficiency or distinguished on the assessment. Physical Science Updates: Sundararaj

Physical science students will develop and use models to compare and contrast the phases of matter as they relate to atomic and molecular motion. Students will analyze and explain why do the surface area of the solute, the temperature of the solvent, and the amount of agitation that occurs when the solute and the solvent are mixed affect the rate of dissolution? They also analyze and interpret data from a solubility curve to determine the effect of temperature on solubility. Students will explain the relationship between structure and properties of acids and bases and classify common household substances as acidic, basic or neutral. Students will take their unit 7 test on Tuesday April 09,2019. Students will take their **GMAS Physical science on Thursday, May 02, 2019.**

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT CONTINUED

AP Biology: Isdell

The **AP biology national exam** is scheduled for the **morning of Monday, May 13th, 2019.** Students have been working very hard this year in AP biology and I have high expectations for their success. As an incentive, the National Math and Science Institute will reward students who make a score of 3 or higher with \$100. Students can use various resources to help them prepare, such as AP biology podcasts and videos, Strive to a 5 study guides which can be purchased from Amazon or other retail book stores, Khan academy, & Quizlets for AP biology and all resources given in class.

Chemistry: Martin


Atoms are the building blocks of matter. Chemistry looks at their composition, their structure, properties, behavior, and the changes they undergo with other substances in a reaction. We are currently working on Unit 5 which focuses on Kinetic Molecular Theory, which focuses on chemical and physical motion of molecules. Unit 6 will focus of solutions and the nature of acids and bases. The students will complete and argument driven inquiry lab called *Pressure, Temperature, and Volume of Gases*. It will focus on observing the changes that occur as a result of manipulating the volume and temperature.

Environmental Science Updates: Humphrey

Environmental Science is currently working on Unit 4: Land and Agriculture. Students are looking at the various impacts mining has on the environment and the risks and benefits of renewable versus nonrenewable energy sources. Students will analyze the impacts of various mining methods on ecological systems and develop solutions for minimizing the impact of mineral extraction on ecological systems. Students also study agriculture, soil, and degradation. Students will evaluate the impact of various agricultural practices on ecological systems and food production and analyze the impact of various pest control mechanisms. We will end the semester with Units 5 (Air and Water) and 6 (Energy and Waste). Unit 5 students will evaluate the different types of waterborne pathogens, their sources and their effects on human health, describe the process of sewage treatment, and analyze sources of ocean pollution. In Unit 6 students will evaluate the pros and cons of various energy sources and methods for reducing our reliance on non-renewable energy sources, particularly fossil fuels. They will also evaluate methods for reducing various types of waste and analyze options for reclaiming/restoring contaminated land and preventing future contamination.


Physics Updates: Sundararaj


Physics students are currently working on diffraction and interference of waves by using single slit and double slit method. They use their mathematics and computational thinking skills to analyze, evaluate, and apply the principle of ohm's law to calculate the total resistance in a series and parallel circuit. They will also perform an argument driven inquiry lab to investigate and explore the relationship between voltage, current, and resistance in terms of movement of electrons. They will complete their simulation lab on balancing the three types of radioactive decay and nuclear reactions. Students take their unit 4 waves assessment on Monday, March 25, 2019.











MATH DEPARTMENT BY MR. EARL LEWIS

Algebra I

The Algebra I classes are currently covering the final unit of the curriculum, Statistics. The specific topic being covered is "Central Tendency". Students will use measures of central tendency to investigate and make coherent conclusions about data distributions. Additionally, teachers are preparing students for the Algebra I GMAS, which will occur on April 29th, with review material that students should be working on at home and during the offered tutorial and remediation prep sessions.

Geometry

Geometry students are rapping up Unit 5 which covers "Geometric and Algebraic Connections". They are beginning to move into Unit 6 which focuses on Applications of Probability. When students return from Spring Break, while working through Unit 6, they will simultaneously review for the Geometry GMAS which is scheduled for April 24th.

Algebra II

Our Algebra II classes are currently instructing students on "Systems of Inequalities". They will learn to calculate solutions to these systems graphically, both by hand and using technology. These techniques are often applied in real world situations to determine optimal or acceptable conditions in a given scenario.

AMDM

Students in Advanced Mathematical Decision Making are currently covering rational functions. As they delve into these functions, they will identify key characteristics such as x and y intercepts, increasing and decreasing intervals, positive and negative intervals, relative maximums and minimums, domain/range, and end behavior. These characteristics will be extremely important for those students who later transition into calculus.

Precalculus

Our Precalculus classes just completed the unit on vectors and complex numbers. In this unit students learned how vectors can be used to model real life scenarios. Additionally, students learned how closely related vector quantities are with complex numbers. And they discovered that, as a result, many of the mathematical calculations used to interpret the data of either quantity were the same.

Calculus

Calculus students have recently finished the long process of understanding derivatives and how they can be used to discover important graphical characteristics. They have now embarked on investigating antiderivatives, which undoes the derivative process. Students, in the coming weeks, will learn how to calculate areas under and between curves as well as how to calculate volumes of revolutions using antiderivatives.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS

The English-Language Arts departments are currently assessing students with MAPP tests until Spring Break. Upon return, we will review Georgia Milestone Assessment System Common Core concepts and remediate challenging standards to prepare students.

9th & 11th Grade Lit-

The 9th and 11th grade students will take the GMAS between April 22nd and May 3rd. Previously in the month of February and March, we have offered after school remediation to help prepare students that may be struggling with standards.

After testing, ninth graders will finish the course with a final scrapbook project that reflects students' freshman year. This will be a creative way for students to show mastery of all writing standards covered throughout the year.


10th Grade World Lit-

SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENT

World History —Mr. Holmes - World History Classes will be completing Unit 4 before Spring Break ---which focuses on exploration, the Columbian Exchange, and Asian Dynasties of the 15th 16th and 17th Centuries. After the break we will be moving forward through the Enlightenment, the Scientific Revolution and Age of Revolutions. Then we will study the Industrial Revolution and 19th century industrialization before finally finishing our survey of World History with the 20th century. There is no GMAS for World History --so we will be going at a rapid pace all the way up to the final exams at the end of the semester. Final exams will be the last week of class. We will have a day of review to prepare for the final exam before the last class.

American Government and US World Affairs-Mr. DiTomasso

In **AP Government** we have just finished covering the three branches of government. We will be starting a mini unit on political parties while at the same time beginning our final review for the upcoming AP Exam. Our political parties section will examine the following concepts:

- •The evolution of voting rights and the current state of voter turnout.
- •Factors that influence voter choice in elections.
- •Protections, barriers, demographics, and other political participation factors
- •The functions of political parties in the United States and third parties in United States government
- •The development of candidate-centered campaigns.
- •Political parties, interest groups, and social movements
- •Federal policies on campaigning and electoral rules
- •Media's influence on political participation
- •The theory of critical elections.
- •Interest groups in United States government and politics.
- •Nominations, campaigns, and elections in United States government and politics.

The media as a linkage institution, including changes in media, such as the growth of social media and partisan media sources. I am very excited to start reviewing and am looking forward to seeing what the students can do on the upcoming exam:)

In our **US and World Affairs** classes we will analyze the competing forces and tensions that underpin global governance and condition the authoritative allocation of human needs and values. We examine the evolving dialects between numerous forces and tensions, such as integration and fragmentation, globalization, and localization, and universalism and relativism. Particular attention is paid to identifying and analyzing those forces that serve to undermine and limit the authority, legitimacy, and competency of the national state and state-centered international order. In addition, participants critically analyze the nature and context of global discourses about governance and security to identify ideas, constitutive principles, and structures of meaning that underlie those discourses and practices and associated practic-

es.

SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENT CONT.

US History and AP US-Dr. Graves US History and APUSH students are preparing for the GMAS in April on a daily basis. Currently, students are finishing their curriculum with student teaching projects. Students have been assigned the final standards and are teaching units to the class for mastery. In preparation for the GMAS, students will utilize USA Test Prep Platform and have daily review in class. After spring break, students will begin an intensive review of all content in preparation for the GMAS. AP Students will further their review for the AP Exam on May 10. After GMAS and AP exams, 11th grade students will end out the year with a Decade Disco Walk that will explore the culture of the American 20th century.

Economics – Ms. Conner - The Economics Georgia Milestone Assessment (GMAS) administration date is Wednesday, April 24. It is crucial that all students get a good night rest, eat breakfast and present the day of the examination. In preparation for the assessment, students and teacher will create review activities to share with their respective class after Spring break. The expectation of Stilwell is every student score proficient or distinguished on the GMAS. To meet this goal, students should continue to review teacher notes, review videos, and complete practice exercises on USA Test Prep. There will be a study session in the cafeteria on Tuesday, April 23 with the instructor (4:30 pm – 6:00 pm). All students must arrange transportation home before the review session. The End-of-Course examination is the final exam for economics. After the GMAS, students resume the study of personal finance with a project to conclude the semester.

Sociology- Mr. Holmes

Sociology classes have completed Unit 3 on Socialization and Social Control. After the break, we will be focusing on inequalities in our social system and determine methods of social change. Part of this will include a class project that will involve taking positive action to work toward social change in a current issue that will be decided upon by each Sociology class. After deciding which social issue we want to address, the class will do research on a particular social issue and determine a course of action to help effect change. Classes will be creating their own rubric for evaluating student participation in the class project. This will be the culminating activity of the final unit before the final exam. There is no GMAS for Sociology, so seniors will be taking their final exams the week before the end of class.

Environmental Club

Stilwell's Evironmental Club has been preparing for spring planting by deweeding the flower boxes and garden. Students repaired the flower boxes and painted them bright royal blue to match the benches. Others planted seeds in the garden that will hopefully yield flowers later this spring. We will be planting flowers in bloom in the flower boxes after spring break. Students also painted two bird feeders and will set them on a post in front of the windows by the theater. The bird feeders should be set up right after we return from spring break. The Environmental Club will continue recycling efforts through the end of the semester.


















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
