Letter from the Principal

As we approach the end of the school year, I want to thank the PTSA and parent volunteers for their support this year. · Start working on your college essay

Through the Common Application website, you can apply to over 600 colleges (www.commonapp.org). Part of the application is to write an essay, and you can find the prompts on the website. If you'd like some feedback or advice, even over the summer, you may email a draft of your essay to cccessayhelp@gmail.com and someone will get back to you. Visit the CCC's website to find essay tips and links to great sample essays that will inspire you.

Complete your resume

There are links to templates on the CCC website. You'll need this in the fall when you ask your teachers and counselor for a letter of recommendation.

· Visit some colleges

Plan a trip to visit specific schools you're interested in, or just visit any of the many colleges in Atlanta to get a feel for different types of campuses.

· Plan to complete your testing

If you still need to take the SAT or ACT, do some prep over the summer (there are many options, including free online test prep and paid classes).

· Sign up for Remind 101 texts

Governor's Honors Program Participants

Out of the 16 APS students selected to participate in the 2016 Georgia Governor's Honors Program, 9 are from Grady High School. The Grady students and their fields are: Mei Nathan, communicative arts; Alexandra Schneider, dance; Walden Jones, mathematics; Carolyn Capelouto, Bailey Damiani, Gregory Fedorov and Sam Lombardo, social studies; Orly Mansbach, world languages (Latin) and Kendall Stroud, music (voice, alternate).

The Governor's Honors Program is a four-week, summer residential program designed to provide intellectually gifted and artistically talented high school students challenging and enriching educational opportunities. Students will live on the Valdosta State University campus for four weeks, June 19-July 16.

In its 53rd summer, GHP is the longest continually running program of its kind in the nation. Georgia high school sophomores and juniors are eligible for nomination in one of 20 curriculum areas. Over 3,000 students from across the state applied this year. Since GHP is fully funded by the Georgia General Assembly, there is no charge for students to attend.

National Merit Scholarships

School & District News

Letter from District 3 APS Board member, Matt Westmoreland

Matt Westmoreland, our District 3 representative on the APS Board of Education, shares the following details about an important vote coming up this month:

On May 24, voters go to the polls to decide whether to renew the Education Special Local Option Sales Tax (E-SPLOST). That's the one-cent sales tax that funds capital projects across Atlanta Public Schools. Among the projects included in this E-SPLOST proposal are:

- \$33 million to renovate and add to Grady High, adding 18 classrooms, 3 laboratories and a new administrative suite.
- \$47 million to renovate and add to the David T. Howard Building to become the cluster's new middle school (plus \$5 million from the current SPLOST).
- \$20 million to renovate Morningside Elementary to address recommendations from the 2015 Facilities Conditions Assessment.

Plans for the Grady Cluster also include using \$8 million from the current SPLOST for athletic practice fields at the Walden site in Old Fourth Ward, and using the Inman facility for additional elementary capacity for the cluster in the future.

If passed, this renewal would fund major construction and renovation projects in seven of nine clusters across APS. The new E-SPLOST would also include technology upgrades across the system, replacement of aging school buses, upgrades to athletic fields and stadiums, and investments in safety and security systems.

Voting takes place at your regular polling place on May 24. Early voting runs May 2 - 20 at certain locations. Contact the Fulton County or DeKalb County Elections Office for more information.

G3 Wins FIRST Chairman's Award

Grady High School's G3 Robotics FIRST team competed in the International FIRST

Championship in St. Louis, April 27 - 30, 2016, wrapping up a phenomenal season. The team qualified to compete at the international level based upon robot performance throughout the season and a win of a district-level Chairman's Award.

On March 10, 2016, G3 Robotics traveled to Columbus, GA for their first 2016 district competition. Competing against 40 other teams, we ranked 10th in the qualifiers and moved on to semifinals. In addition to our successful robot performance, G3 Robotics won the Chairman's Award, the most prestigious award in FIRST! This award is given to the team that is most qualified to be a role model for other teams and best demonstrates the purpose of FIRST. Leading the effort to win Chairman's Award was team captain, and senior, **Sajjad Ali**.

A week after the Columbus competition, the team again competed in Albany, GA, where they placed 5th in the qualifiers and were chosen by the 1st place alliance, advancing to finals. In addition to incredible robot performance, G3 won the Industrial Design Award, which is given to an effectively designed robot that handles the game challenge best. Senior **Steffen Martin** led the engineering design effort that led to this award. Additionally, **Ellie LaRocca-Pitts**, a student leader in G3, was chosen as a FIRST Dean's List finalist. This is given to an outstanding, passionate student who demonstrates exemplary leadership and pursues FIRST's ideals.

In addition to the team's competitive activities, G3 also hosted its second annual Drones for Good (DFG) competition from January to March! The DFG competition is the first of its kind: a program for middle and elementary school students to learn how to build, fly, and use drones. DFG launched last year by G3 students after they formed a partnership with MARTA to make the subway system safer through drone usage, and then competed at the 2014 Drone Prize. This year's DFG competition was a great success! All the teams flew skillfully with exceptionally designed drones. We expect to add more teams to the competition next year, and reach out to kids in the greater Atlanta area. The success of this far-reaching program would not have been possible without the leadership of senior **Gabriel Kupersmith**.

We are also very proud of the performance of our two mentored teams from Maynard H. Jackson and Booker T. Washington High Schools. Jackson's team completed their second year, and Washington completed their rookie year. Both teams qualified for the Peachtree State Championship and proudly represented APS along with G3. Washington's robot was deemed the "best little toaster" of Georgia FIRST Robotics because of their effective use of the rookie kit drive train in defensive game play. Washington ranked high in both of their qualifying events, and captained the 8th seeded alliance at both. Jackson's team had a rough start this season, but ended their second qualifying tournament with a strong showing as the third robot of the winning alliance at the Albany qualifying tournament. We are very proud of these teams, and are hopeful that their success will continue in the years to come with the support of the schools and the district.

It is our hope that FIRST Robotics will continue to grow throughout the district at the elementary, middle, and high school levels. We will be working with our friends at Washington and Jackson to grow programs in our clusters and across the district.

HELP FUND GRADY'S FIRST-EVER ON-SITE BATTING FACILITY.

Grady High School is the only traditional high school within Atlanta Public Schools without an on-site or adjacent baseball or softball field or practice facility. Grady High School is a flagship, inner-city Atlanta school and its baseball program has played a significant role in the history of Georgia baseball. The prestigious Georgia Dugout Club (http://www.gdcbaseball.org) was co-founded in 1962 by the then coach of Grady High baseball – E.E. Red Whitsett. Until the 1990's Grady had access to the large city park across the street – Piedmont Park. Despite years of parent advocacy, our players are still excluded from playing in the park and still don't have an adjacent home field, and no baseball or softball practice facility on site. Instead, our players are bused to a shared field across town for practice and games (16 miles roundtirp). This adds additional hardship on our student athletes. Our players must wait for an afternoon bus to return to Grady after it makes an after-school route. This means a 45-minute (average) wait after school before making a minimum 30-minute, one-way commute in afternoon, interstate traffic, through Atlanta's dangerous 'Grady Hospital curve.' This results in practices beginning late, thus ending late, which cuts into academic time. It is the mission of the newly revitalized Grady Dugout Club to help each baseball and softball player grow and develop individually, and as a team, by funding an on-site, indoor batting cage and bullpen.

The Grady facility will allow the players to:

- 1. Begin practice directly after school while waiting for the bus to transport them to the off-site field.
- 2. Hold a productive practice on days when the off-site, shared field is not available or it's not playable.
- 3. Have an area to warm up prior to games Grady's shared, off-site "home" field is not equipped with a batting cage.

To achieve our goal, we need the help of our community and anyone who loves the sport of baseball and/or softball. While Atlanta Public Schools is allowing us a site to house the indoor batting cage, the Grady Dugout Club is solely responsible for funding. Total expenses are estimated at \$80,000. This includes materials for the physical structure, concrete foundation, turf, lighting and electrical, construction, netting for two batting cages and a bullpen lane, with a portable mound. This is a long-term investment in the students of the Grady cluster and in the Grady High School baseball and softball programs.
