Course Description/Description of Standards



The Henry County Teaching and Learning Standards for 7th Grade Georgia Studies will be taught during this course. Seventh grade is the second year of a two-year World Area Studies course. Seventh grade students study Africa and Asia. The goal of this two-year course is to acquaint middle school students with the world in which they live. The geography domain includes both physical and human geography. The intent of the geography domain is for students to begin to grasp the importance geography plays in their everyday lives. The government/civics domain focuses on selected types of government found in the various areas in order to help students begin to understand the variety of governments in the world. The economics domain builds on the K-5 economics standards; however, the focus shifts from the United States to how other countries answer the basic questions of economics. Materials

Daily Breakdown

- 1. Warm-Up: Students come into class and answer questions about the previous lesson
- 2. Direct Instruction: Teacher will deliver new material to students and clear up any misconceptions.
- 3. Stations: Students will transition from station to station working on the assignments given.
- 4. Technology: Students will implement their understanding though computer-based projects or will reinforce understanding though Google Classroom, Active Classroom, Illuminate, and USA Test Prep.
- 5. Closure: Teacher will determine if students have grasped the essential questions regarding the material.

Expectations

To ensure academic and social success, high expectations are in place for each student. Students must follow the behavioral guidelines in the student handbook. Students must bring their agendas, notebook, paper, and pen/pencil to class every day. All work is expected to be turned in on the assigned due date.

MASTERY LEARNING With mastery learning, a unit of material is taught, and student understanding is evaluated before students are able to move on to the next unit. Students who have not shown mastery for a particular unit will receive feedback and support in reaching mastery. They may be given practice exercises, study guides, group work or complementary resources to help them improve and achieve mastery. Students who demonstrate mastery of the content for a particular unit are given enrichment exercises like special projects, tasks or academic games to further or broaden their



knowledge of the material.

Absences

Students who are absent from class are expected to have mastery on all missed standards. It is <u>the student's</u> responsibility to obtain the homework assignments, notes & any other pertinent information that is missed during an absence. Students are to submit missed work on or before the third-class meeting after the absence, to avoid "work punctuality" rating on their Non-Academic Behaviors evaluation being impacted. Pre-announced assignments are due upon return to school. After the third-class meeting, the student's Non-Academic Behaviors evaluation will be impacted.

Late Work Policy

It is important that students are responsible and meet established due dates for assignments. A late assignment is defined as work submitted after the teacher has collected the assignment. All missing/late assignments will be recorded in Infinite Campus with an "M-Missing" designation.

Missing Assignments (late or missing assignments): Students are expected to stay in communication with their teachers about the progress of completing late and/or missing assignments. Students with late assignments or absences will be expected to submit missed work within ten (10) school days of the assigning date. This will be the case for all assignments with one exception. Assignments that are given by the teacher within ten (10) school days of the end of the 9-week grading periods will have to be submitted prior to the close of that grading period. Homework

In seventh-grade social studies, there is one homework assignment each week. It serves as a summary of the material learned that week. It should take thirty minutes.

Retake Policy

Students will have opportunities to truly display their mastery of content knowledge and skills - even if that doesn't happen during the initial assessment. This may occur at times when students will not miss required instruction. Therefore, the following policies are in place to outline the process for students to participate in assessment/activity retakes:

- ➤ All students are afforded the opportunity for a retake within ten (10) school days, provided the student "adequately prepares for the retake" per confirmation of the teacher.
 - Teacher coordinates either formal or informal retake with students individually to determine changes in proficiency level or
 - Student makes formal request to teacher for retake assessment
- > Teacher approves request if evidence supports students has made effort to prepare for Assessment.

 - Active Classroom activity
 - USATest Prep Assignments
