- 1. Write and answer 3 "How" and "Why" questions that demonstrate your ability to "swim in the deep."
- 2. Examine 3 risky decisions made by Romeo. As a teen, can you connect and understand why he made these choices? Explain your answer.
- 3. Examine 3 risky decisions made by Juliet. As a teen, can you connect and understand why she made these choices? Explain your answer.
- 4. A pun is a play on words where the same sound has different meanings. Explore the PUNS in this play. Quote the lines and explain what makes the words "punny."
- 5. Summarize the plot of R&J in 5 drawings (like a comic strip).
- 6. Reduction challenge: Summarize the play in one paragraph; summarize the play in one sentence; summarize the play in 6 words.
- 7. Write obituaries for the 6 people who died in R&J. Use formal language (because it IS an obituary) who they were, how they died, and what led up to their deaths.
- 8. Memorize and recite one of the sonnets*.
- 9. Memorize and rap one of the sonnets*.

 *Location of sonnets: 1) Beginning and end of Act 1. 2) Act 1.3.82-95. 3) Act 1.5.92-105
- 10. Select a plot event to act out. Lines must be recited in original text.
- 11. Recite famous lines (minimum of 8) from the play
- 12. Collect 3 famous quotes from R&J. Provide the context of each quote and explain the relevance to the plot
- 13. Analyze how Shakespeare uses irony; provide examples and explain.
- 14. Explain Shakespeare's use of mythology allusions. When does he use it and why?
- 15. Quote lines that contain similes. Provide context and explain meaning/relevance.

- 16. Quote lines that contain metaphors. Provide context and explain meaning/relevance.
- 17. Who is to blame for the tragedy that unfolds? Create a mind map that traces the causes and effects that lead to the untimely death of Romeo and Juliet.
- 18. Explore the theme of lightness and darkness. Explain how the theme is developed through the language of the play.
- 19. Explain the sequence of events that you think qualify this play as a "tragedy."
- 20. Explore the use of oxymorons by Romeo (1.1.167) and Juliet (3.2.75). List them and explain the context of their use.
- 21. Find two excellent examples of IMAGERY. Quote the lines, explain the context, and explain the effect on the reader.
- 22. Write your own sonnet. Mark the rhythm and the rhyme scheme. (Consider using the prologue as a model/guide.)
- 23. What do you think was in the letter Romeo wrote to his parents?

 Write the letter-- from Romeo's perspective and using his language.
