# Stories on Stage

## **HELLO, FAMILY!**

Over the next three weeks, our class will build their knowledge about plays, with a focus on the drama genre. We will read texts and view videos about the features of classic and contemporary plays. Children will also write an opinion essay about whether or not the stories in this module worked well as plays.

### **BRING IT HOME!** Learning fun for the whole family!

#### **Discuss the Topic**

Set aside time daily for your child to share with you what he or she is learning. Use these ideas to help build your child's knowledge about the topic:

- Talk about the ideas your child has added to the Knowledge Map each week.
- Ask about the texts your child is reading, and what he or she has learned from them.
- Share with your child your own questions about the topic, and work together to find the answers.

#### **Explore the Genre**

The genre focus in this module is drama. Discuss with your child the characteristics of this genre.

Ask your child to read to you each day and make time to read together.

Look for texts that:

- Spark your child's curiosity.
- Tie to the module topic.
- Include interesting characters, settings, and conflicts.
- Offer opportunities to perform one or more scenes.

#### **Build Vocabulary**

Use these ideas to help your child build a rich vocabulary.

The Big Idea Reinforce the topic words audition, rehearse, ability, and actor in everyday conversations with your child. Use prompts like these: When is it good to rehearse? What is your best ability?

What Does It Mean? Have your child keep a growing list of the Critical Vocabulary words. Quiz each other on their meanings.

**Word Hunt** Look for words with the prefixes *in*– and *im*–, the suffixes –*er*/–*or*, and the Latin roots *aud* and *vis* in books, magazines, online texts, and environmental print.
