
# 6<sup>TH</sup> GRADE SOCIAL STUDIES

### Homework

#### **Classroom Policies, Procedures, & Grading**

Entering Class: Enter the classroom quietly, quickly find your seat, write down any homework assignment posted on the board and promptly begin daily warm-up.

Bathroom Usage: Students my use the restroom during class as long as it is not the first or last 15 minutes.

Electronic Devices: From time to time we will use technology in the classroom. Electronic should not be seen or heard in the classroom outside of this time. Anyone caught using technology for non-academic reasons will face the follow consequences 1) A warning and parent contact, 2) Move a step on the behavior plan.

Exiting Class: In the last few minutes of class, you will wrap up what you are working on, return materials to the appropriate locations, and pick up around you. Late work- It is the student's responsibility to turn assignments in on time. All assignments will be accepted on or before the date they are due. Homework is checked at the beginning of class. If it is not complete at that time, it is considered late. Assignments can be turned in up to one week late and will result in five points per day deducted. Any assignments turned in after one week can only achieve 50%. Extenuating circumstances will be considered on an individual basis

Extra Help – If a student needs extra help tutoring will be available on Wednesday mornings at 7:45. Please drop your student off at the front doors.

Absences & Makeup Work – Students are responsible for checking on missed assignments the day they return to school. Students have as many days as they were absent to make p missing work.
