

Eligible students worldwide can access the online service from any Internet-enabled device for real-time help in more than 150 subjects, plus standardized test prep and more.


Students and tutors work one-to-one in a secure online classroom; that uses text or voice chat, interactive whiteboard, graphing calculator, file sharing, text editor and more.

In addition to receiving real-time tutoring and homework help on demand, students can also choose to schedule future online tutoring sessions and submit papers for offline tutor review. Feedback on papers, essays and other writing projects that a student uploads and submits for tutor review will be available in "My Sessions" in a student's Tutor.com account within 12 hours.

Regardless of how a student works with a tutor, a tutor will not simply provide answers, but will help a student learn how to approach a question and come to an answer. Our tutors do not "teach" topics or lessons, but rather help students better understand how to answer the questions students bring to their tutoring sessions.









Class of 2022 Seal of Biliteracy Application Window Reopened

The HIDOE has reopened the Class of 2022 Seal of Biliteracy application for students who missed the November deadline. The application window will be open from 8:00 a.m. on Tuesday, January 4 until 12:00 p.m. on Monday, January 31.

The Seal of Biliteracy is for ANY graduate who meets the criteria. It is NOT only for students who take a world language class.

Eligibility Criteria:

- Must be graduating in the Class of 2022
- Demonstrate a minimum overall (cumulative) 3.0 GPA upon graduation
- Successfully complete courses required for English Language Arts for a high school diploma with a minimum 3.0 GPA upon graduation
- Attain the HIDOE determined requisite score on a HIDOE-approved language assessment.

The following is a list of all languages for which an assessment is available:

American Sign Language, Amharic, Arabic, Armenian, Cantonese Chinese, Chin (Hakha), Chuukese, Czech, French, German, Haitian-Creole, Hawaiian, Hebrew, Hindi, Hmong, Ilocano, Italian, Japanese, Kannada, Korean, Latin, Mandarin (Simplified), Mandarin(Traditional), Marathi, Marshallese, Polish, Portuguese (Brazilian), Russian, Samoan, Somali Maay Maay, Somali Maxaa, Spanish, Tagalog, Tamil, Telugu, Thai, Turkish, Urdu, Vietnamese, Yup'ik

TEENS AND STRESS

The COVID-19 health crisis has brought about many changes to daily life, and teens know that things are different. Like adults, teens experience stress too. While small amounts of stress are a normal part of life, some young people may have worrisome responses to disrupted routines, school closures, social distancing, event cancellations and missed milestones.

Reacting negatively to current events, school stress or other common stressors can lead to decreased academic performance, social isolation and even declines in mental health. Parents, family members and mentors are often the first to recognize signs of stress in children and help them learn coping skills to navigate challenging times.

A study found teens' stress levels are higher than that of adults. Furthermore, teens identify their stress as unhealthy. As our nation's future, we want to take a closer look at what stresses teens nowadays.

Common Triggers of Teen Stress

In 2017, the American Psychological Association released a Stress in America survey. After compiling data, they conclusively found many teens struggle with stress at very significant levels.

Teenagers understand that their stress levels are unhealthy. However, most aren't aware of how negatively stress impacts both their mental and physical health. Data from a 2017 survey identified the most common triggers.

First, a whopping 83% of teens report school as a source of stress.

69% followed up with stressing about what to do after high school or getting into a good college.

An unfortunate 65% report financial concerns within their family. Since stress trickles down, it's easy to see how teens might absorb stress from other family members.

35% of teens report that they lie awake at night from stress. Meanwhile, 26% find themselves eating unhealthy foods or overeating due to stress.

Alternatively, 23% choose to skip meals. All of these habits are a direct result of stress.

Teens may show physical, emotional and behavioral signs of stress. These signs are relatively consistent throughout children of all ages; however, some indicators are less obvious than others. Pay special attention to any sudden shifts in behavior or unusual complaints your child brings up to you.



Physical signs of stress in children

- Headaches
- Upset stomach Chest pain
- Heart palpitations or increased heart rate
 - Insomnia
- Nightmares
- Bed wetting
- Decreased appetite, comfort-eating, or binging
- Pretending to be sick to avoid activities

Emotional symptoms of stress in children

- Anxiety
- Mood swings
- Restlessness
- Clinginess
- New or recurring fears
- Increased crying, anger, stubbornness, or aggression
- Decreased concentration or motivation
- Emotional overreactions to minor incidents
- Regressing toward comforting behaviors from early childhood
 - Social isolation or unwillingness to participate in enjoyed activities

Things Parents Can Do

- · Ensure your child is safe
- Talk to your child
- Help your child develop healthy coping habits
- Spend quality time together
- · Manage your own stress

Finally, don't pressure your child into immediately telling you what's wrong. If they are feeling scared or anxious, they may take longer to confide in you. Remember to always be loving and patient, and allow your kid to talk openly when they're ready.

2022 Scholarship Application

PURPOSE

To encourage members of the HawaiiUSA Federal Credit Union to pursue a college/university/professional education, including graduate degrees, at any two- or four-year accredited institution of higher learning. Students who are presently attending an institution of higher learning are also eligible.

NUMBER AND AMOUNT OF SCHOLARSHIP

- Twelve (12) awards at \$2,000 for graduating high school seniors planning to attend any two- or four-year accredited institution of higher learning. Recipients must be enrolled as a full-time college student during the 2022-2023 academic school year.

- CREDIT UNION MEMBERSHIP Based on number of years of HawaiiUSA FCU membership.




