On September 7, 2016, Hawaii's public schools will send home a U.S. Department of Education Federal Survey Form for parents to complete and return with your child to school.

Why is this important? The survey allows the State of Hawaii to qualify for a partial reimbursement for federally connected children. This funding supports all public schools, including your child's.

Here's how:

- Each year, Hawali is unable to collect local taxes from tax-free federal properties, leading to less money for public education.
- The federal government, partially reimburses Hawaii for the cost of educating federally connected students through Impact Aid funds. Last year, Hawaii's reimbursement was 15% of the total cost to educate a student. Although it is a small amount, every dollar we receive supports schools and students.
- The amount of Impact Aid schools receive is based on how many parents complete and return the survey to their child's school. Every school strives for a 100% survey form return.
- Every survey form returned will increase funding for ALL public schools statewide.
- This federal funding can mean an extra \$35 million to \$45 million annually for students.

The Federal Survey Card enables the Hawaii Department of Education to accurately report the number of federally connected student enrollments to the U.S. Department of Education for the purpose of receiving Impact Aid. This aid is a partial compensation for the loss of revenue for tax-exempt federal installations (e.g., military installations) and for increased expenditures due to the enrollment of federally connected children. Subj: 2016 Federal Impact Aid Survey

1. School districts across our nation include land that is owned by the Federal Government or land that has been removed from the local tax rolls by the Federal Government. Because Federal property is exempt from local property taxes, these school districts operate with less local revenue than is available to other school districts and as a result face the challenge of providing a quality education. Since 1950, Congress has provided financial assistance to these local school districts through the Impact Aid Program. This program provides Federal funding to local school districts with children residing on military bases and other Federal properties, as well as children who have parents in the uniformed services or employed on eligible Federal properties who do not live on Federal property.

2. Beginning this September, schools will be sending children home with Federal Impact Aid Survey cards for the 2016-2017 School Year. Each year, a significant number of survey cards are not returned which translates in the loss of Federal funding used to offset additional expenses incurred by educating Federallyconnected children. Thus, I need your support in making a concerted effort to increase awareness and participation in this important survey. Request you endorse this process as a priority and encourage your Marines, Sailors, and Civilians to complete the Federal Impact Aid Survey card. This will ensure school districts accurately report the number of Federally-connected students, ensuring school districts receive the appropriate Federal funding needed to meet the educational needs of our Federally-connected children.



lackpacking 101: The Journey is the Destination

After numerous Sunday planning meetings, nine Sierra Club High School Hikers from Leilehua, Kapolei, Pearl City, and Roosevelt High School set out on a journey to backpack Haleakalā National Park, led by Jamie Tanino, Kelson Lee, Robert Keane, and Fred Nakaguma.

Following our arrival at Kahului Airport, we stopped at our hotel and dropped of all of our heavy gear and did some sightseeing around Maui. We explored the Maui Ocean Center where we saw

first hand many sea creatures that are endemic to Hawai'i. We even got to watch a diver talk to the audience from inside a tank full of enormous fish and different types of sharks. After lunch, we went to I'ao Valley, the Hawai'i Nature Center and the Kepaniwai Heritage Garden. We took lots of pictures, saw a lot of freshwater, though we learned about the area's water diversions, and tried to read kanji on the different temples. After all that sightseeing we bought all of our food for camping and prepared our backpacks for Haleakalā.

The next morning, Mr. Nakaguma drove us up to the summit of Haleakalā National Park where we adjusted to the altitude change and, of course, the cold. Before we started our hike we filled up our water bottles one last time and did a bit of re-packing.



The journey to our destination began at Keoneh'ehe'e (Sliding Sands) Trailhead. Mr. Nakaguma and Mr. Keane said their goodbyes and watched as the clouds consumed the backpackers. The air was cold and dry. Repeatedly, we were sprinkled upon by light showers; getting wet was uncomfortable and slightly challenging for us. Going further into the crater, the trail became desolate. No one was on the trail but us... until we encountered a mule pack. Fortunately, the National Park Service rangers who were leading the mule pack had just delivered firewood at the cabin up ahead. Up until this point, we did not know how comfortable the cabin would be. This information gave us newfound optimism, so we pressed on despite the passing showers and fog.



At Kapalaoa Cabin, we cleaned up around the cabin so it was tidier both inside and out than when we arrived. We split up into groups for meal preparation, so group 1 prepared our dinner for the night. After we ate, we witnessed a beautiful moonrise!

The next morning, we set off on the next stage of our journey, Palikū Cabin. We heeded the advice of the National Park Service rangers whom we had met the previous day, carrying six logs of extra firewood since they told us Palikū was low on firewood. This made our already heavy packs even heavier! Along the trail, we went rock climbing and marveled at the sight of the largest Haleakalā 'iliahi of the entire trip. Unexpectedly, when we were halfway up the trail, it rained hard so we were forced to put on our rain jackets. Moments later, it became scary when we heard thunder and saw lightening. Everyone was soaked and freezing cold; the running water made it harder to get down. We were all relieved when

we made it safely to the cabin. As we did at Kapalaoa Cabin the day before, we tidied up around the cabin. Group 2 prepared our dinner and then we bonded through card games such as "Egyptian War" and "Toilet Bowl."

On Day 3, we said goodbye to Palikū Cabin. We all thought that it was the prettiest, but it was also the coldest. On our way to Hōlua Cabin, we performed service work on the trail by removing social off-trails. Once we arrived at the cabin,

we cleaned and ate dinner prepared by group 3. We boisterously played cards after dinner, but when Kelson started to passionately play his ukulele, we quieted down to enjoy his performance. The next morning, we woke up at 5:30 a.m. to witness the sun rise above the clouds. To stay warm, we brought our sleeping bags and huddled together outside. This was our last day in the crater. After witnessing the stunning sunrise, we trudged through a seemingly endless series of switchbacks as we climbed our way out of the crater. Once we got to the top, the smile on our faces reflected our feelings of achievement and relief, though there were some injured knees.

Removing Social Off-Trails

Leilehua's Program School Year 2016-17

The application process for the FIRST of 2 class sessions for this school year will begin in August. Please refer to the timeline of dates on the right for general information regarding this FIRST class session.

Leilehua's open application period gives all eligible students an equal opportunity to get an application from many locations on campus throughout that week. Students must be at least 15 ½ years old and have a Hawaii instructional permit in order to apply. All completed applications are due the following Monday with parent/guardian signature and a copy of the student's Hawaii permit.

Each completed application is numbered and those numbers go into the lottery drawing. This procedure was adopted to ensure everyone has a fair chance to get into the program. Parents and students are encouraged to witness an Administrator randomly pick numbers, lottery style, to determine the 30 students and 4 alternates selected to be in the first class session. Those students who've been selected must confirm with me of their placement in the class.

Please note that there are only 2 class sessions offered. Classes will be held afterschool on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. NO ABSENCES ARE TOLERATED. Please plan accordingly so that you do not apply for this session if it conflicts with sports or other extracurricular activities you are involved in. Information for session 2 will be forthcoming. 



High School students take college and career entrance exams throughout their 4 years of high school in order to prepare for and meet the admissions requirements for college, military, or vocational training programs.

All Leilehua High School **Freshmen** and **Sophomores** will take the **ASPIRE** and the **Juniors** will take the **ACT** in **February 2017** during the school day for free. For more information about these tests check out <u>discoveractaspire.org/parent-overview/</u> or<u>act.org</u>

Freshmen can take the **PSAT 9** in **November 2016** for \$10.00. Registration begins in September.

Sophomores and Juniors can take the **PSAT/NMSQT** in **October 2016** for \$15.00. Registration begins in August. Fee waivers are available for Juniors only if students qualify for the Free or Reduced School Lunch Program.

Juniors should register for the **SAT** offered in **May or June of 2017**. The fee is \$54.50 with Writing and Fee Waivers are available for qualifying students.

Seniors should take the **ACT** and **SAT** in **October 2016** if they need to improve their scores or if they did not take these tests as Juniors.

For more information check out <u>actstudent.org</u> or <u>sat.org/register</u> The military **ASVAB** test is offered to **Sophomores**, **Juniors** and **Seniors** at Leilehua High School at least two times per school year. Students can sign up in the College & Career Center in HH101.
