Your child will become fluent with computing these types of numbers and understanding the relationship between them. Students should also be able to use these numbers in real-world scenarios."

In fifth grade, your child will **read** widely and deeply from a range of high-quality, **increasingly challenging fiction and nonfiction** from diverse cultures and time periods. Building knowledge about subjects through **research projects** and responding rationally to **literary and informational** sources will be key to your child's continuing success. Your child will **write stories or essays** that are several paragraphs long.

He or she will also gain control over many conventions of grammar, usage, and punctuation.

"Science in fifth grade centers on a hands-on, student-centered exploration of our world. Earth, Life and Physical Science are studied throughout the year, giving students opportunities to build their understanding of core ideas while developing scientific skills."

" Students learn important topics including an exploration of how the surface features of the earth are caused by constructive and destructive forces. Cells, microbes, and the classification of living things are also studied. Finally, students explore chemical changes and the nature of electricity and magnetism."

- "Students are in the final year of a three-year study of **United States history** in which all four strands (**history**, **geography**, **civics/government**, **and economics**) are integrated.
- Students begin the year learning about the **growth of 19th century** industry and innovation in the United States and finish the study with the events and impact of **September 11, 2001**.
- The **geography** strand emphasizes the **influence** of geography on U.S. history during these same time periods.
- In the civics/government strand, students learn about the rights of citizens contained within the Constitution, and how changes have been made over time to the Constitution to protect the rights of citizens.

In the **economic strand**, students explore the way **consumers** and **producers** have interacted in the **American economy**."

Academic Assessments

Academic assessments incorporates the process of using evidence/data to understand and improve student learning in academic programs.

Academic Assessments

We have assessments that are given at least **1-3 times a year**. They are designed to measure specific elements of learning and to help identify our **students' strengths and weaknesses**. These assessments are also a great predictor of how ready students will be for **GMAS** testing in **April**.

Proficiency Levels and Expectations

Proficiency Levels serve as a guide of what can be expected of a student's abilities.

Proficiency Levels and Expectations For Students

Proficiency Levels

Proficient means that a learner has demonstrated the ability to comprehend a set of skills related to identified 5th Grade standards. Screening assessments, Diagnostic assessments, Progress monitoring assessments, report cards, and learning targets help indicate if a student is progressing and understanding grade level concepts.

Expectations

Good classroom behavior is essential for productive learning. We work hard to encourage and celebrate positive behavior with respect and responsibility.

Our policies uphold the same overall guidelines set forth in the WES Discipline Plan included in the school handbook.

Georiga Milestone Assessment System Preview

We will be hosting a GMAS Preview Workshop for parents in September. This will give parents of students in grades 3-5 the opportunity to see what students will be expected to do on the GMAS in the Spring and how to help them prepare throughout the year. Parents will have the opportunity to take a practice test.

Monitoring Student Progress/Parent Communication

Progress monitoring can give you and your child's teacher information that can help your child learn more and learn faster, and help you make better decisions about the type of instruction that will work best with your child. Strong relationships and clear lines of communication sets a strong foundation for parent-teacher interactions.


