- 6. Do you "root" for anybody in this story? Explain.
- 7. Does the story offer an opinion about technology, and whether technology is a good for people? Explain
- 8. Vocabulary—Write one sentence for each of the following words:

The Landlady

- 1. Describe your first impression of Billy. Answer this before turning to p. 172.
- 2. Why do you think Billy stays and rings the bell when he had just decided to try the Bell and Dragon?
- 3. What is odd about the landlady's appearance?
- 4. Why might she appear so suddenly?
- 5. Why do you think she lowers the room rate so readily?
- 6. Would you want to stay at her place? Explain.
- 7. Why might the landlady be so interested in Billy (about p. 174)?
- 8. What is odd about the landlady's comment that she is glad Billy appeared and that she was beginning to get worried (p. 174)?
- 9. When you think about the dachshund and the parrot, what do you wonder about Billy (p. 178)?
- 10. Also answer 3, 4, and 5 from p. 180.

The Monkey's Paw

- 1. Identify a line from the first few paragraphs in which the author creates suspense. Explain how.
- 2. What do you think the mother and son glance reflects (p. 186)?
- 3. Why do you think that one man's third wish would be to die?
- 4. Why do you think the sergeant major kept the monkey's paw?
- 5. At the end of 190 ("I am from Maw and Meggins."), how does the author keep you guessing about what will happen?
- 6. On 191, what do you think has happened to Herbert? Explain why you think so.
- 7. List some words or phrases that create mood or atmosphere of mystery or terror.
- 8. What do you think Mr. White's final wish is?
- 9. The author leaves so much unrevealed at the end...why do you think he does this?

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The Tell-Tale Heart

- 1. To whom is the narrator telling the story? Where? When?
- 2. Is the narrator sane, or insane? Why do you say so? What symptoms does he describe?
- 3. What does the narrator want you to think? Do you believe him? Explain.
- 4. Describe the setting of the story. What is the mood? How does the setting establish the mood?
- 5. What is the "heartbeat" sound? What is coming from?
- 6. The idea of the "tell-tale heart" can have more than one meaning. What do you think it means?
- 7. Compare the narrator to the Landlady. Describe their similarities and their differences. Do you dis/like either, both, neither? Explain.

Creepy Culmination

- 1. Write an EXTENDED RESPONSE comparing and contrasting two of the characters from the short stories of your choice. Use text-based evidence to support your response.
- 2. Explain how the author effectively used literary devices to set the mood and tone of the story. Use text-based evidence to support your response.
- 3. Read the ending of one of the short stories in 5 to 6 paragraphs. Use a **VENN** diagram to compare your ending to the original short story.
- 4. Write an EXTENDED RESPONSE explaining how FEAR OF THE UNKNOWN CAN IMPACT OUR LIVES. Use text-based evidence and real world experiences to support your response.
