Kindergarten News

Hello Kindergarten Families!

We are off to a great start this year as we finish our first IB unit of "Who We Are". We learned about citizenship, responsibilities, and the necessity of rules to keep us happy and safe at school. We also learned the basic concepts of print (left to right, top to bottom, return sweep, spacing, etc), how to write our own names, the parts of a book (front cover, back cover, spine, title page), the roles of an author and illustrator and had a test on the first 10 letter sounds that we have learned (m, s, a, d, t, i, n, p, g, o). In math, we worked on counting with one-to-one correspondence, reading and writing numbers 0-5 and identifying more and less. Our next IB unit is called "Where We Are in Place and Time" where we will begin to explore the world around us and our place in it. Thank you for all of your support and please make sure you check your child's blue folder nightly and return homework assignments when due.

1st Grade News

Greetings from First Grade and Happy Fall!

We are now beginning our Unit 2: How We Express Ourselves and we can't wait to see how much each student learns and grows as we approach our 2nd Quarter.

Students will learn about how we can express our ideas, feelings, and emotions. In reading, students are also learning how to find main topic and supporting details, along with writing about it too. Please support your child's writing by encouraging to use a capital letter at the beginning of each sentence and a period at the end. Our new Wonders Stories include new characters, fiction, and Non-fiction stories to help our First Graders retell and enhance their comprehension along the way with expressing their own opinions.

In math, students are learning different ways to add and subtract. Some strategies include counting on, using a number line, and drawing counters. Our students are thinking about word problems and how to turn them into a number sentence.

In Science we will start learning about observable properties, such as size, shape, color, temperature (hot or cold), weight (heavy or light), texture, and whether objects sink or float.

Please remember to check your child's backpack and planner each night. Each teacher will collect homework on Fridays, so students will have all week to work on it. Don't forget to read with your child for 20 minutes each night!

2nd Grade News

Second grade has been cruising along! Since the beginning of this school year, we have been making great progress in our IB PYP Unit 1- Who We Are. We just finished this unit and learned so much about Communities, and how we can help families and friends in our community. We also learned how we are connected to so many symbols used through the worlds, and symbols that represent the United States. In Science, it has been great fun learning about the states and properties of matter. In ELA, we have been learning about plot structure and story elements, central idea and relevant details, author's opinion, and more. In Math, recall facts to 20, word problems, determine the unknown number, odd/even.. As 2nd grade moves along into IB PYP Unit #2 How We Organize Ourselves. We will continue in ELA to work on previous skills, but be introduced to rhyme schemes in poetry, figurative language, compare and contrast 2 stories on the same topic or theme, and more. In Math, we'll be adding sums to 100. In Science, we'll raise questions about the natural world. In Social studies, we'll explore people form governments, Citizenship by birth or naturalization, Goods and Service, and more. Please make sure your child is complete weekly homework assignments and read 20- minutes nightly.

3rd Grade News

As we roll into fall, we are starting a new unit of inquiry - How to Organize Ourselves. In reading and social studies, we will be focusing on different types of structure - the structure of writing (including poetry) and the structure of our government (the different levels of government). One highlight of the unit will be a guest speaker - the mayor of Sanford, Mayor Woodruff. He will discuss the need for government and how local government works.

In math, scholars will be using multiplication to divide. They will also be introduced to different quadrilaterals and then finding their area and perimeter. Please make sure your scholar is practicing their multiplication facts. This is a very important skill in 3rd grade. Finally, in science, scholars will be investigating the changes that can happen to water and learning about basic forms of energy. We have several hands-on activities planned for these fun topics.

During this unit of inquiry, we will focus on four learner profiles, and we ask you to encourage our scholars to show these traits daily.

1. Thinker - We use critical and creative thinking skills.

At home activities: *Encourage your child to try to think of solutions to problems independently. *Pose different real-life problems and questions to your child.

2. Principled - We act with integrity and honesty.

At home activities: *Involve your child in deciding on the rules for a game or activity and then ensure that they stick to the ones that have been decided upon. *Encourage your child to play games that involve teams. Discuss with your child the qualities of a team player.

3. Balanced - We understand the importance of balancing different aspects of our lives.

At home activities: *Encourage your child to participate in a wide variety of structured activities. *Discuss the food groups with your child. Spend a few minutes during a mealtime deciding if what your family is eating is balanced. *Role model this attribute. Spend time as a parent or family doing many different things.

4th Grade News

Happy October!

Time just seems to be flying by as we continue to work hard in 4th grade. We just stared a new Unit of Inquiry, Where We Are In Place and Time where our focus will be on contributions to change. During this unit we will be studying about Native Americans in Florida and explorers that came to Florida long ago. We are going on a field trip to St. Augustine in November to learn more about, and see in person, the oldest settlement in the United States. To continue with our focus on change, students will be studying light, heat, and sound energy in science. In ELA we continue to dive deep into all different types of texts learning about text features, text structure, central idea, and author's perspective. We are also working on writing multiple paragraph essays using text evidence. In math, students will be working on division of 4-digit dividends by 1-digit divisors. RAMP students are finishing up with adding and subtraction of fractions and beginning to work on decimals. It's time for parent/teacher conferences. Be on the lookout for communication from your child's teacher to sign up. Our next APTT (Academic Parent Teacher Team) meeting is January, 11 2023. Mark your calendars now! We appreciate all you do!

5th Grade News

As we wrap up our first unit on How We Organize Ourselves, we reflect on our learning about structures in place to influence order within systems. We have identified and discovered various systems in our world, and we are able to explain the importance of structure. We celebrate our learning and our progress as we wrap up this unit. Moving forward, we are beginning our next unit on How the World Works. In this unit, we will focus on how humans understand scientific principles as well as the impact of technological advances on our society. Our learning surrounds the idea that knowledge leads to change.

Our focuses in literature continue to include the development of plot by the contribution of setting, characters, conflict, events, and themes. In this unit, we will also introduce poetry and figurative language. Our informational text will be analyzed through the use of primary and secondary sources with the contributions of text features and structures.

We continue to develop our expository paragraph writing skills through the use of planning, writing, and improving. Through the use of rubrics and exemplar paragraphs, students will continue to develop informational writing techniques across various prompts.

In math, we will finish up multiplying multi-digit whole numbers before moving into multiplying decimals. We will make connections to the standard algorithm and solve word problems in context. Then, we will dive into division of multi-digit whole numbers and the interpretations of remainders in context. Please continue to practice multiplication and division fact fluency to assist with the ease of complex multi-step problems.

In science, we continue the study of forms of energy and more specifically move into the topic of electricity. Through hands-on labs and class discussions, students will be able to describe types of energy and their transformations as well as how electrical circuits work to conduct electricity.

Our study on exploration continues with the Native Americans relationship to European explorers. We will complete a Document Based Question assignment on Cabeza de Vaca as he survived many dangerous elements of exploration. We will analyze multiple perspectives of these events to discover and sympathize with our history.

Please check on your student to be sure homework is being completed every night. Scholars can develop their love for reading every night for at least 20 minutes and practicing their math fluency on a daily basis. Please contact your child's teacher if you have any questions or concerns!
