
Challenge 1—Found Object Color Wheel: Find objects around your house or outside in each color of the rainbow. Try to include the **tertiary colors!** Arrange them in **color wheel** order. See my example below:



Challenge 2—Found Object Value Scale: Find objects around your house or outside that change in **value** from light to dark. Arrange them in a **value scale**. See my example below:



Challenge 3—Draw the Other Half: Choose a photo from a magazine, newspaper, or catalog. **Cut** it in half, and **glue** or tape it to a piece of paper. **Draw** the other half using any art materials you'd like. See my example below:







Choose one or more of the challenges below, and create your artwork with pencil, paper, or any other art materials you have. Challenge 1: Make a Board Game




Draw a wavy, zigzag, loopy **line** on your paper.





Turn it into a **path** for your game.


Divide up the path into sections. Don't forget a **Start** and **End**!



Add **obstacles** and activities to each section. For example:

- Move __ spots forward
- Move __ spots back
- Switch spots with another player
- Lose a turn
- Roll dice again

Draw **details and designs** to fit your **theme**. I chose Outer Space as my theme—other themes might be superheroes, volcanoes, unicorns, a garden, a zoo, a haunted house, etc.



Color!

Create your own **game pieces**, or use something you already have: buttons, rocks, small toys, mini erasers, etc.



Roll dice, flip a coin, download a dice app, or make number cards to tell you how far to move ahead.




Challenge 2: Cartoonize it!

Draw facial features (eyes, nose, and mouth) on a piece of paper. They can be **cartoonish** or **realistic**. **Cut** them out, and **attach** them to different objects in your house. *Check out my examples:*



Challenge 3: Toy Still-Life

Set up some of your toys in an interesting arrangement. Carefully **observe** your toys, and **draw** all the **details** that you see. *Check out my example:*



Challenge 4: Cardboard Tube Marble Run


