Things to Know for the 6th Grade Orientation:


- The 6th Grade Orientation is not mandatory, but we highly encourage ALL rising 6th graders to attend!


MCMS House Concept:

Cafeteria Procedures and Expectations:

- MCMS serves breakfast and lunch daily.
- Lunch cost: Full pay: \$2.50/ Reduced: \$.40
- ALL students will be required to fill out a Free and Reduced Lunch form in August. This must be returned at the beginning of the year, regardless of free and reduced lunch status.
- No more than 5 charges are allowed on a student's account.
- Commercially prepared foods (fast food and restaurant) and soft drinks are not allowed in the MCMS cafeteria.
- Free Breakfast for all will be offered again in the 2023-2024 school year.





Media Center Info:

The mission of the Madison County Middle School Media Center is to provide the learning community with access to information and reading and research assistance, while promoting a love of reading that will provide a lifetime of learning. We check out two books for two weeks. You may bring your books into the media center to renew or checkout with a pass from your teacher. Please renew/return your books every two weeks or you might be put on the Restricted List from school activities.

Restricted List:

Students with extremely overdue library books and students who have not turned in school-owned items (ex: uniforms) are added to the restricted list every month. They are also listed in IC as Flags and Fines. This list is sent to teachers and can cause students to miss breaks, field days, and end of the year reward days if the items are not returned or paid for.

Locker Procedures:

- Students may rent lockers for the safekeeping of books and personal property. Only school assigned locks may be put on lockers which is covered with the rental fee.
- It is the responsibility of the student to guard his or her combination and to see that the locker is secure. Students are not to share lockers.
- Lockers remain the property of the school and are subject to periodic announced and unannounced inspections by school personnel at any time during the year.
- Locker rental fees are \$2.00. Fees are paid during the first week of school.
- Students with physical education are encouraged to bring a lock from home to be used for that period alone. We cannot provide locks for these as up to six different students could use the same locker daily.

Parent Communication:

Madison County Middle School is a Title I School, and we offer ongoing events and programs to provide parents and students information about student progress:

• Report cards are sent home every 9 weeks. Progress report are sent home in the middle of each quarter to provide updated information on student progress.

• Infinite Campus is available 24/7 online via Parent Portal and allows access to a student's grades for parent(s)/ legal guardian(s).

• Teachers should call and check on a student if he/she is absent for 3 consecutive days.

• Once a student has 5 unverified absences, a blue letter will be mailed home informing the parent of what the law says about mandatory school attendance and the consequences that may occur if the school does not receive excuse notes for every absence. Once the

parent is informed, the next step is Truancy Panel for the parent and student if the student continues to be absent and/or excuse notes are not received by the school.

- The school sends home notices regularly so parent(s)/legal guardian(s) know of upcoming testing dates, parent-teacher conferences, and other activities.
- A monthly newsletter is posted online that informs families of the monthly activities, including extracurricular activities, such as sports and the performing arts.
- Many teachers use Remind to send home announcements and information.
- Daily announcements are posted on our school website.
- Announcements are posted on our school Facebook page.

MCMS BUS & CAR RIDER INFO

School Bus Behavior Policy



Riding on a school bus is a privilege, not a right, and students can be suspended or restricted from riding buses if misbehavior interferes with the safety of riders, drivers, and traffic.

Each driver has complete charge of the students riding his/her bus. The driver shall have the right to recommend suspension of any student who is disobedient or guilty of misbehavior. The driver shall furnish the administrator of the school with an

electronic report of all infractions on his/her bus, including any injury received by a child. The administrator and driver will cooperate to see that proper order is maintained on the buses. Parents shall be given written notice prior to suspension of their child.

An updated MCMS Bus Behavior Contract will be included in the 2023-2024 MCMS Student Handbook located in each student's agenda as well as online.

MCMS Car-Rider Procedures for Drop Off and Pick Up

MCMS Morning Car-Rider Drop-Off

All car-riders should be dropped off at the front of the school in the designated areas. Students may also be dropped off on the side of the building next to the three double doors at the gym between the hours of 7:15 AM and 7:45 AM ONLY.

Students are not to be dropped off or picked up behind or beside the school or at the main road.

While we would all like to drop off our students at the front door, the volume of car-riders at MCMS would cause the traffic to back up onto the main roads. With that in mind, please pull to the far cone or as far as traffic allows before stopping and letting out your student(s). During the first several weeks of school, an administrator will be directing traffic at the front to help with the process.

MCMS Afternoon Car-Rider Pick Up

Last Year we averaged 200 plus cars a day during car-riders. We will provide a map at the beginning of the school year showing the pick up procedures we use to handle the large volumes of cars.




To make the process more efficient, each student will be given a barcoded car rider tag that should be used. If you need additional tags, please have your student notify his or her teacher.

- 1. Around 2:15 PM, MCMS personnel will begin scanning/entering car riders into a scanning program as their rides arrive in the front parking lot.
- 2. Daily, in each car rider classroom at 2:48 PM, a list will be posted that displays the students whose rides are in line and have been scanned. When a student's name is listed, he or she will report directly to the front to go home.
- 3. Around 3:00 PM, the remainder of the car rider students will be dismissed and required to report directly to the cafeteria. They will be separated by grade levels.

- 4. As cars arrive out front, these tags will be scanned and the corresponding students' names will be displayed in the cafeteria.
- 5. The names will be called in the cafeteria as well.
- 6. When displayed and/or called, the students should report directly to the front pick up area to go home.

As mentioned in the Morning section, we would all like to pick up our students at the front door. The volume of car-riders at MCMS would cause the traffic to back up onto the main roads. With that in mind, please pull to the far cone or as far as traffic allows before stopping and picking up your student(s).



Changes in Student Transportation:

Should it be necessary for a student to ride a different bus or get off the bus at a stop other than his usual stop, the parents should notify the school in writing. This notification should be turned in to the office BEFORE FIRST PERIOD for verification by parents and approved before 2:15. Students are responsible to check back in the office to pick up a note.

Verbal permission is not sufficient. The following information MUST be included on the bus note: (1) student's full name and grade, (2) a phone number where we can reach parent/guardian for verification of change, (3) bus number and/or driver's name, (4) special instructions such as what address the student is riding to, who they will be going home with, reason for change etc.

No student is allowed to ride the bus to any other school to ride home

with a sibling, etc. – this includes the high school.

Note: some buses may be 'red-flagged' due to the bus reaching its transportation capacity for students. Students, not assigned to these routes, will NOT be allowed to ride these buses even with parental permission. Please make sure you know your bus number before you send in a bus note.

If a student's address has changed, the parents are responsible to communicate that with the registrar to fill out proper paperwork before the student can ride the bus. Also after address changes, it takes up to 24 hours for the student to be approved for a new bus.

MCMS COURSES & SCHEDULE INFO

6th Grade Connections Courses:

- Each student will have 2 connections per quarter
- All course are taken for one quarter, unless otherwise noted
- Band and academic support classes, not listed here, are year-long courses

Agricultural Science

The course introduces the major areas of scientific agricultural production and research; presents problem solving lessons and introductory skills and knowledge in agricultural science and agri-related technologies. Classroom and laboratory activities are supplemented through supervised agricultural experiences and leadership programs and activities

Art

In middle school, art students are introduced to a variety of art mediums and techniques. As students progress through middle school they are challenged in art to use their creativity and develop artistically. Students should be expected to learn about: elements of art, drawing, cartooning, painting, crafts, graphic design, illustration, and printmaking. In each topic we will learn about art history, discuss techniques and develop skills that will improve art making.

Career Awareness

The purpose of Career Awareness is to develop career literacy as part of all students' fundamental education through an activity-based study of career strands and their resources, processes, and impact on society. Career Awareness utilizes computer and educational technology. As part of the BRIDGE act, students form a cluster of career ideas and a graduation plan before they enter high school.

Drama/Theatre Arts

This course provides students with an overview of theater arts. Students explore acting and improvisation. They learn the basic techniques of acting, character and voice development, presentation skills, and script writing. Some acting will be required.

Foundations of Business

This course will provide an exploratory foundation in business office administration and support. It is designed to be taught in a 9-week rotation in 45-minute daily classes. Standards should be taught in the order presented with the exception of Standards 1 and 7 being embedded standards with ongoing learning regarding employability skills, career investigation, and career-technical leadership opportunities. Through integrated instructional activities, students will have opportunities to apply employability skills and to research possible career options in the business administration area. They will also complete many hands-on activities to build a strong foundation in integrated software applications and standard office procedures. Capstone projects should be incorporated at the completion of all standards as time allows. Keyboarding is now included at the elementary level in the GaDOE K-12 Computer Science standards. Students who successfully complete this course will be prepared for the following pathways upon entering high school: Business & Technology and Health Information Technology. This course is recommended for 6th grade but may be taught in 6th, 7th, or 8th grade.

Family and Consumer Science (FACS)

An introductory course includes classroom instruction and laboratory experience. It is designed to include Career, Community, and Family Connections; Consumer and Family Resources; Consumer Services; Early Childhood Education, and Services; Facilities Management and Maintenance; Family; Family and Community Services; Food Production and Services; Food Science, Dietetics, and Nutrition; Hospitality, Tourism, and Recreation; Housing, Interiors and Furnishings; Human Development; Interpersonal Relationships; Nutrition and Wellness; and Textiles and Apparel.

Health

This course is designed to assist students in obtaining accurate information, developing lifelong positive attitudes and behaviors, and making wise decisions related to their personal health. Study will include personal health, consumer & community health, injury prevention & safety, alcohol, tobacco, & other drugs, nutrition, environmental health, individual growth and development, family living, & communicable/chronic diseases.

Healthcare Science 6

This course provides students with an exploratory introduction to several healthcare careers and the safety procedures and interpersonal communication skills required for them. The course will enable students to receive initial exposure to healthcare science skills; attitudes applicable to healthcare including the concepts of health, wellness, and preventative care; and responsibilities of today's healthcare provider. Mastery of skills through project based learning, technical skills practice, and group activities will provide students with an opportunity to decide if they want to continue this course of study in high school and/or at a post-secondary institution. This course is considered broad-based with high impact.

Junior Leadership

The goal of this course is to provide you the student with the skills and knowledge needed to behave and act appropriately in school, at home, and in life. The course includes an in-depth look at you, the student, using different methods of involvement in the classroom, in the school building, and outside the school. Your process will be evaluated to help you build relationships with fellow peers and teachers. There will be daily discussions about life and social skills exercises throughout the semester.

Music Appreciation

This course focuses primarily on musical elements (such as rhythm, dynamics, tempo, etc.) and music history. Music Appreciation is not a performance class, however, students will have an opportunity to learn more about the choral program which they may join beginning in 7th grade. Music Appreciation will also include an introduction to musical notation and instrument families. All students will complete and present individual composer projects. There will be optional opportunities to share favorite styles of music and individual talents within the class.

Physical Education

(Most students will have PE 2-3 quarters during the school year)

Physical fitness is a vital part of the middle school student's life. At Madison County Middle School, we provide a superior physical education program structured to meet the individual needs of our students as well as to meet quality core curriculum objectives mandated by the state. Students will be involved in a variety of physical fitness activities and games. Fitness activities may include: jogging, sprinting, jump rope, drills, push-ups, sit-ups, lunges, and weight lifting activities. Games may include: football, softball, volleyball, badminton, pick-o-ball, Frisbee, soccer, softball, four square, tennis, and basketball. All physical activities will require students to wear appropriate attire and tennis shoes (they must dress out). Proper attire includes: shorts, t-shirts, and sweats that meet the school mandated dress code.

What is Band?

Band is a daily, year-long connection class where students learn to play a woodwind, brass, or percussion instrument.. Students get to show off what they have learned through concerts which are held at various points throughout the year. Learning to play an instrument helps students develop a greater appreciation for music, team work skills, critical thinking skills, and personal independence. Band is also a fun way to make new friends with students from across our amazing Madison County School District!

Does my child need prior music experience to participate in 6th Grade Band?

Zero prior experience is necessary! It is my privilege as their teacher to teach them everything they will need to know. We will spend the first two weeks building a foundation for understanding and reading music notation and rhythms. After the first 2 weeks, students will choose their instrument and I will then teach them how to put it together, how to take care of the instrument, and how to play it.

How do I sign up for Band?

Complete the 6th grade registration form. In the registration form, there is a section allowing you to sign up for band. Once signed-up, you are set. Students will get to see and hear the instruments in the first days of band before deciding what they might play. Enjoy your summer break knowing instrument selection will occur during the first weeks of school. If you've already completed the form and want to have band added, just email me, Mr. Smith!

What instruments are in the band? Which are not?





Woodwind: Flute, Clarinet, & Saxophone

Brass: Trumpet, Trombone, F Horn, Euphonium, & Tuba

Percussion: Single section that must play mallet and drums

String instruments are <u>not</u> played in band. This includes violin, viola, cello, bass, and guitar. However, the skills learned in band are frequently used by students to learn how to play additional instruments.



How do students choose an instrument?

Student instrument selection is so much fun! During the first two weeks of school, I will let students see and hold the instruments. I will also demonstrate how the instruments sound and we will watch short videos of others demonstrating the various instruments. If a student likes the instrument's sound and they can see themselves practicing and playing that instrument, there is very little that can get in the way of their success!

How do I get an instrument?

Most will choose a "lease-to-own" option from a music store that specializes in band instruments. This is a great, low-risk option that allows students to try band without parents needing to pay for the full cost of an instrument. Others may have a family instrument that can be used. We also have school instruments available in certain situations. I will be available throughout this process to ensure all students are able to acquire an instrument that will help them be successful!

When do I need the instrument?

Students will not need an instrument until the end of August. While a more detailed timeline will be shared at the start of the new school year, families will essentially have 3 weeks to make decisions.

I'm afraid my child's grades might suffer. Does this generally happen?

There is an enormous amount of research available that verifies – participation in school music programs offer mental stimulus that cannot be replicated in any other activity. In order to successfully contribute in a band, students must be constantly engaged and will use high order thinking skills daily. High school valedictorians, STAR students, honor graduates, and scholarship winners all come from band programs at an astounding rate.

What are the commitments outside of the school day?

In 6th Grade, there are 2 performances in the evening per year - early December and Spring. Aside from concerts, students will practice their instrument to review what we do in class - similar to homework they might have in any other class.

Can my child do band AND sports/other activities?

Definitely! Band is a class that meets during the day just like Math or Science. In my 17+ years at MCMS, I have taught students from every sport and club offered. Band students are FFA & FCCLA officers. Band students play football and run track. Band students are cheerleaders, tennis players, and soccer players. Because music impacts the lives of everyone, band is a class with a wide variety of personalities and interests!

Can my child join band after 6th Grade?

The band curriculum builds each year. This means the best time to join is in 6th grade. Get in on the ground level! It is best to join in sixth grade so that all the fundamentals of playing an instrument are well established.

As a band parent, how can I get involved?

There are opportunities for parents to volunteer throughout the year: fundraisers, volunteering to help with band events, chaperoning band trips, etc. I will send home sign-up opportunities whenever we could use an extra set of hands. The most important thing you can do is to encourage your child throughout the year!

MCMS 2023-2024 SPORTS INFO

Reminder to Parents/Guardians and Students: At the middle school level, student physicals, a signed concussion form, and proof of insurance are **required** for participation in all MCMS sports teams. The physical forms may be accessed from the Madison County Middle School webpage under Athletics or they can be picked up in the main office or house offices of the middle school. All physicals are good for one year from the date of the physical. These must be turned into the Athletics Secretary/Coordinator, Tammy McHale. Sports that have an asterisk (*) beside them are available to 6th grade students. Some sports are only open to 7th & 8th graders.

Baseball: Co-Head Coaches: Jack Cook (jcook@madison.k12.ga.us) and John Spinks (jspinks@madison.k12.ga.us)

7th & 8th graders must try out and be academically eligible. Tryouts are in mid to late January. Students must have a current physical and insurance form on file before tryouts begin. Practice is at the MCMS field. Players that make the team will have the opportunity to purchase spikes and other apparel through a package deal with the varsity program. Game jerseys are issued, but players are required to purchase their own pants (white), belt, and socks. Also, players are responsible for providing their own equipment (gloves, bats, helmets, etc.).

Boys Basketball: *Head Coach (8th grade): Jacob Whitmire (<u>iwhitmire@madison.k12.ga.us</u>); <i>Head Coach (7th grade): Jack Cook (<u>icook@madison.k12.ga.us</u>)*

7th & 8th graders must try-out and be academically eligible. Tryouts are late October. Students do not need to provide any equipment, and coaches encourage anyone interested to try out. Coaches expect a lot from players and are interested in players with great attitudes and strong work ethics.

<u>Girls Basketball:</u> 7th and 8th Grade Coaches: Amanda Shimmin (<u>ashimmin@madison.k12.ga.us</u>) and John Spinks (<u>ispinks@madison.k12.ga.us</u>)

There will be two teams each with 10-12 girls. You must be academically eligible by passing 5 out of 6 classes to tryout and remain on the team. Tryouts are in late October. Uniforms are issued by the school but parents/guardians will have to buy warm-ups. Team members are like family, and they run, run, run, and run some more. Students must have current physical and insurance form on file before tryouts begin; grades no lower than a C and no more than one office referral. Cheerleaders must pass 5 of 6 classes. Cheerleaders must devote a lot of time and energy and show school spirit and enthusiasm.

A fall sport, Cross-Country is for 6th, 7th and 8th graders who would like to participate in long-distance running competitively with other middle school athletes. We encourage students interested in Cross-Country to complete the recommended summer workouts.

<u>Fast-pitch Softball:</u> *Head Coach: Amanda Shimmin (<u>ashimmin@madison.k12.ga.us</u>); Assistant Coach: John Spinks: <u>jspinks@madison.k12.ga.us</u>)*

7th and 8th graders must be academically eligible and try out for the team in mid-May. Uniforms are issued, but students will need their own equipment (gloves, bats, helmet, socks, pants, cleats, etc.). Players must be disciplined, coachable, and hard-working. Practice is after school. The game season runs from August to September but will include practices in July before school starts. Athletes who do not make the team are encouraged to participate in the leagues offered by the Madison County Rec Department.

7th & 8th graders who pass 5 of 6 classes, have good conduct and respect for coaches, teachers, and peers, pass a physical exam, and have proof of insurance can participate in football. Weight training starts in the summer, and practice begins in late July. All equipment *except cleats and girdles* are provided, but those who have their own equipment are welcome to use it. Football teaches discipline and hard work. You cannot be passive about playing this sport. It requires the ability to run, the strength to block and tackle, and the mental toughness to bounce back from failure.

MCMS FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q1: Can my child change which House he or she gets on his or her schedule?

A1: No. We know it's difficult at first for many students who are separated from their elementary friends, but we encourage students to see it as an opportunity to expand their friendship circle and also meet new peers. Only students who have a sibling at MCMS will be offered the same House as their sibling. Otherwise, House assignments are not changed.

Q2: Does MCMS offer after-school tutoring?

A2: No. Unfortunately, at this time, we do not have a tutoring program. However, teachers are happy to help with homework and answer questions during homeroom time.

Q3: Can students ride the bus to the high school and then ride with their brother or sister home?

A3: No, students are not allowed to get off at the high school to ride with a sibling.

Q4: How early may students arrive at school?

A4: This will depend on next year's bell schedule, but this year, students were allowed to arrive beginning at 7:15 am, and school began at 7:50 am.

Q5: Can I request that my child not have PE?

A5: No. We can only change a student out of PE with a doctor's note.

Q6: Does my child have to rent a locker?

A6: No, your child does not have to rent a locker. If your child would like to rent a locker for the year, he or she will pay his or her advisement teacher \$2 for the locker rental. The school provides the lock and the combination at the beginning of the school year and as requested throughout the year.

Q7: Do students have to attend the 6th Grade Orientation?

A7: No, it is not mandatory that students attend the 6th Grade Orientation, but it is HIGHLY ENCOURAGED.

Q8: Will my child get to choose his or her connections classes?

A8: No, students may not request connections classes until 8th grade at MCMS. Middle school is about becoming aware of oneself and one's interests. A variety of connections classes are offered to help foster students' self-awareness of their interests.

Q9: Will my student have homework?

A9: Yes! All 6th grade students will have homework! Math usually has 4 problems a night, while science and social studies encourage students to review answers to the daily bell-ringer or warm-up each evening, and ELA has homework periodically. Contact your child's teacher if you're not sure. Email is the best way to reach teachers. 6th grade is a big transition, with six different classes and teachers to keep up with. Encourage your child to write his or her agenda each night, and provide a quiet, structured environment for him or her to complete homework.

Q10: How will I know how my child is doing in school?

A10: Progress reports are sent home after every 4 ½ weeks, while report cards are sent home every 9 weeks. You can also email your child's teacher to find out how he or she is doing, attend Parent Conferences in October and February, and request a parent meeting, if needed. If your child has an IEP or a 504, you can also contact your child's counselor or IEP case manager for help contacting your child's teachers. Also, sign up for Parent Portal, so you can check grades as they're posted and view any missing assignments your child may have.

Q11: Why won't my child text me back during the school day?

A11: It is against our cell phone policy for any student to be on his or her phone or to have it out once classes begin. Students may have their phones on and may use them only before or after school hours. Contact your House Secretary to contact your child if it's during school hours.
