- > Write a constructed response on an assigned topic using and citing evidence from an assigned text;
- > Write an extended response on an assigned topic citing evidence from text provided;
- > Compare and contrast text both fiction and nonfiction that are centered on a common theme or topic;
- > Write using the standard English conventions of grammar, spelling and syntax;
- > Conduct research on an assigned topic and provide valid sources to support ideas.

Academic Grades

b. Scholars should receive at least one academic grade in each subject each week. Grades should be entered into the gradebook weekly.

Assessments:

- Each unit, students will have a pretest. It is imperative that students try their best on the pretest because it drives their personalized instruction for the remainder of the semester.
- > DMS will have biweekly assessments. These formative assessments will cover standards that have been addressed in class during those two weeks. The biweekly assessments will help the teacher in driving instruction for students to score well on the culminating exams.
- We will also have unit exams that will address standards covered in a single unit. The biweekly assessments will help the teacher in driving instruction for students to score well on the culminating exams.

Projects:

Projects may include writing assignments, research, oral presentations, and discovery projects. Project frequency will vary during each grading period depending on the material being covered

Non-Academic Grades

Scholars will be evaluated on non-academic factors as follows through the conduct grade:

S- Satisfactory

N- Needs Improvement

U- Unsatisfactory

Make-Up Work

Scholars will have up to two weeks to submit **missed** or **late work**

- An <u>M</u> or <u>missing</u> will be placed as grade placeholder to reflect missing work; please note missing work will equate to a <u>0</u> in the Infinite Campus (IC) gradebook until the work is made up.
 - -Scholars will receive a -10pt. deduction from the grade earned on missed/late work
 - -If the work is not made up within the two week period the grade will be changed to a $\underline{\mathbf{0}}$ with commentary indicating the missed work deadline
- If a scholar <u>misses work</u> due to an <u>absence</u> the scholar will be allowed to make up work commensurate with his/her number of absences. It is the scholar's responsibility to inquire about missed work and or assessments from his/her teacher.
- Absences due to suspension from school are considered unexcused. Scholars assigned out of school suspension (OSS) will be allowed to make-up work upon return to school. The number of days to complete make-up work is commensurate to the number of days of OSS (i.e. 3 days of Out of School Suspension= 3 days to make up work missed).

Academic Integrity

Coursework submitted by a scholar must be the scholar's own, original work. Scholars shall not cheat on any assignment by giving or receiving unauthorized assistance, or commit the act of plagiarism. Scholars who commit such acts are subject to not receiving credit on the assignment in question and will be subject to disciplinary action as well.
