




Plot: The sequence of events in a work of literature. The first event causes the second, the second causes the third, and so on...




Every narrative requires specific components to have a complete **PLO+**.

Exposition: The part of the plot in which the reader is given important background information about the characters and setting.

The inciting incident is introduced.




Calvin is five years old.

His dream is to ride his bike up the steep hill at the park.



Inciting Incident: The first event that sets the plot in motion and introduces the conflict.



One day, Calvin sets out to fulfill his mission. It is a very steep hill, and Calvin is terrified.

Do you see a conflict taking shape?



Conflict: The problem or struggle between opposing forces.

There is no plot without a conflict. The conflict is at the heart of the story.





The conflict is introduced during the inciting incident and becomes clear soon afterward.

There are two types of conflict: external & internal

External Conflict: This type exists between a character and an outside force.

Man versus Man

(or person vs. person)

- The character struggles with another character.
 Protagonist vs. Antagonist
 "Good" vs. "Bad"

External Conflict: This type exists between a character and an outside force.


Man versus Nature

External Conflict: This type exists between a character and an outside force.

- The character(s) fight against the society in which he/they live.
- The character(s) struggle with the rules or traditions of society.

Internal Conflict: This type exists between a character and an inside force.


Man versus Self

> The character has to make a difficult choice or


deal with an emotion.

Calvin is facing an internal conflict.


He is terrified to ride up the steep hill.


MORE Rising Action means readers are becoming even more interested.




Calvin's legs begin to ache. He doesn't think he can make it!



Climax: The turning point. The moment of greatest tension.




Falling Action: The tension is decreasing. Loose ends are being tied up. The conflict is being resolved.





The wolf had to come up with a plan, so he said, "Why hello, Little Red, I'm so pleased you are enjoying my tunes.




"It is Little Red, Grandmother dear. I have brought you some butter and eggs and a latte."

The conflict has been resolved.

2 Inciting Incident


The Thirteenth Fairy is furious she was not invited to the christening, so she casts an evil spell on the princess.




PRINCESS BRIAR Rose and Prince Philip get married and live happily ever after.
