Principal's Message

Thriving despite changes and challenges is a skill set to develop. It doesn't happen organically. Rather, it comes from developing a growth mindset that welcomes challenges, utilizes gifts and talents, and is shaped by context. It also takes practice, lots of practice.

During the past several years, education has had the opportunity to change how instruction and assessment were accomplished and even examined if the resources were appropriate or relevant. The shifts challenged teachers, students, and families, yet we moved forward.

This school year we have placed a greater emphasis on AA and deepened our understanding of adolescent development. This is another shift, and I have asked teachers and staff to consider the developmental needs of middle school-aged students and not only consider the academic content. There is a delicate balance between understanding the social and emotional needs of our students and wanting to prepare them academically for the next level. Both have to work hand-in-hand for our students to thrive.

Students' growth mindset develops through persevering through challenges with mentoring and coaching. I've asked teachers to host conversations with students rather than telling them what to do. We use questions to have students think, consider, and problem-solve. We've held student forums to gather student insight. When possible, we include students in problem-solving, such as offering an apology when needed, mediating differences, and facilitating restorative circles.

Often, teachers release more responsibility to students during the spring semester, which can be overwhelming. Please assure your students that we are here to support them. Should they have questions or concerns, we will listen. Share that they have the capacity to figure things out. Tell them that you believe in them. We will too.



Congratulations to all Science Fair Participants


Special recognition to all students who participated in our RLSMS Science Fair. The projects were well designed and implemented.

Ten projects have advanced to the Honolulu District Science and Engineering Fair to be held at Kaimuki High School on February 17.



culminated their unit with a comic strip that shows the rock cycle.










Students are now working on Phase Changes and will be creating Trifolds with their groups to show what happens to matter molecules when thermal energy is added or removed from pure substances.


