# Romeo and Juliet UNIT Syllabus

### Standards and "I Can" Statements

- 2. <u>Cause and Effect.</u> After you have read the play and completed the study guide, complete the Cause and Effect Activity on a separate worksheet.

### Task 4. Plot Diagram

1. Complete the Plot Diagram Worksheet, filling in ALL blanks.

- 1. Exposition background information (introduces characters, setting, etc)
- 2. Rising Action provide AT LEAST FIVE examples of this in the play
- 3. Climax (Turning Point) make sure you get this correct! See me for help...
- 4. Falling Action (things that happen AFTER the climax) provide AT LEAST TWO examples of falling action
- 5. Resolution (wrapping up the story) provide AT LEAST ONE example of this

### Task 5. Who's to Blame??

Choose the three characters YOU blame for Romeo's and Juliet's deaths.

In any visual format (poster, diorama, flip book, chart, power point)



- Explain in detail why you blame each character for the deaths use specific examples 1. (including page numbers) from the story to support your claims!!
- Use visuals to support your explanation
