- 7. Lost or stolen parking passes or any vehicle changes must be reported to the Discipline Office immediately.
- 8. Replacement parking passes will be subject to a fee of \$35.00, and the original hanging decal will be retired and must be returned to discipline if found.
- 9. Lake Mary High School is **NOT** responsible for any damages to vehicles or personal property.
- 10. Students may not park in any other area on campus except for the areas designated for student parking.
- 11. Students leaving campus without authorization will have their parking passes revoked and face disciplinary action.
- 12. Student's vehicles are subject to search per school board policy. Board Policy Number 5771
 - School authorities are charged with the responsibility of safeguarding the safety and well-being of the students in their care. In the discharge of that responsibility, school authorities may search the person or property, including vehicles, of a student, with or without the student's consent, whenever they reasonably suspect that the search is required to discover evidence of a violation of law or of school rules.

- Quality Instruction
 - A. Lessons aligned to Florida Standards at the appropriate level of complexity. Lessons will support both science learning standards and mental health standards.
 - B. Ongoing feedback loop between leadership and teacher, students and teachers and student with students. Lessons will engage students in conversation with one another and the teacher, both in the classroom and among peers.
- Conditions for Learning
 - A. Cultivation of positive, appropriate relationships resulting in increasing engagement of all students. Students will learn about the dangers of alcohol while in a safe and supportive environment.

- B. Development of a student centered culture. Students will better understand the possible negative effects of their choices related to alcohol consumption and peer pressure at parties.
- C. Continued focus on campus safety and building a culture of respect.
 Students will learn how to be more safe in their own lives, as well as encourage others to make better choices as well.

Goal: To educate students on the dangers and effects associated with consuming alcohol.

D. Objectives and Activities – List one or two objectives and activities you will perform to achieve your objectives.

Objective 1: Students will be able to experience the effects of drinking different amounts of alcohol, in a safe environment, and how alcohol impairs the human body's ability to process sensory information in the brain such as sight and balance. (Biology and Forensics)

Activities:

- Students will wear the goggles and will complete an obstacle course requiring them to perform tasks that may be effected if someone were under the influence of alcohol. (Biology and Forensics)
- Students will direct classmates through field sobriety tests that may be used by police officers to determine if a person may be under the influence of alcohol. (Forensics)

Objective 2: Students will be able to describe the effects of alcohol on decision-making and motor skills (such as drinking and driving).

Activities:

- Students will reflect on the safety of both driving and decision-making for people who may be under the influence of alcohol. (Biology and Forensics)
- We will have a discussion as a class as to why there laws put in place that define an acceptable legal limit for consuming alcohol and driving. (Forensics)



Outcome for Objective 1: Students will realize that as the alcohol concentration in the body increases, the ability to perform normal tasks become increasingly difficult.

Outcome for Objective 2: Students will be able to reflect on why we have laws that define the safe amount of alcohol that can be consumed without impairing the ability to safely operate a motor vehicle or make decisions. Students will also have a better understanding of the dangers of drinking and driving.

- F. Evaluation Please provide method(s) you will use to determine whether the objectives will be met and student outcomes achieved.
 - At the end of the activities we complete, I will ask students to discuss their experience. I will also ask them to reflect upon the dangers of drinking and driving (and decision-making). (Biology and Forensics)
 - I will assess students on their knowledge of the different BAC levels and the level of impairment at each range. Students will also be asked questions that tie their knowledge to real-life legal cases that involve alcohol. (Forensics)

 - I strongly believe that we need high school students to have a better understanding of the effects of alcohol on their bodies. Many of our students drink underage, and many will choose to drink at some point in their life. According to the CDC website, drunk driving accidents account for 28% of traffic-related deaths, 29 deaths per day in the US (which is about 1 death per hour). I feel that if we can allow students a safe space to experience how drinking can impair them, they will better understand why it is so important not to drink and drive. It also allows for conversation about how decision-making skills can be impaired.

Next year Lake Mary is starting a freshmen World Cultural Geography course because, as a department, we noticed a deficiency in standard-level World History students in fundamental social studies skills. Skills for Future Ready Graduates: Seminole County Public Schools will prepare each student for academic and job related success in the 21st century by offering rigorous learning environments.

• Schools will provide advanced academic courses and academic support to Advanced Opportunities students.

Currently, Lake Mary does not offer any standard-level freshmen social studies course. This means, for many students, sophomore year World History is their first high school social studies class. Many Advanced Opportunities minority and low-income freshmen students are automatically enrolled into standard World History; therefore, many of these students miss the opportunity to work up to rigorous course by their senior year. For the 2021-2022 curriculum year, Lake Mary is offering World Cultural Geography. By providing this freshmen-specific social studies course, students who used to be automatically placed into standard World History may now move into honors and then, perhaps, an AP or Dual Enrollment course by senior year. The funds provided by this grant will ensure that this new course will hit the ground running to support the most robust academic preparation for our Advanced Opportunity freshmen. Additionally, this course could also potentially increase our school's Acceleration Rate if more students are identified earlier to take AP or Dual Enrollment courses.
