SAT School Day: March 2, 2022 for all 11th grade students. Students must arrive at school on time. Testing will begin at 7:20 am. This test will take the entire day, so students arriving late will not be allowed to enter their testing room. This is a paper based test, so students will not need their Chromebook but are allowed to bring in their own calculator.

Dear Parent or Guardian,

Lake County Schools will administer the SAT to 11th grade students on March 2, 2022 at no cost to students. The SAT is designed to assess academic readiness for college. The exam provides a path to opportunities, financial support, and scholarships. The SAT keeps pace with what colleges are looking for today, measuring the skills required for success in the 21st century.

As the nation's most widely used college admission test, the SAT is the first step toward higher education for students of all backgrounds. It is taken by more than two million students every year and is accepted by virtually all colleges and universities.

There are many reasons to take the SAT, but here are a few of the highlights:

- The SAT tests the reading, writing and math skills that are critical for success in college and beyond.
- The SAT also provides the opportunity for students to connect to scholarship opportunities and learn more about their academic strengths.
- SAT scores are among the factors considered in college admission.
- SAT scores can be used for high school graduation concordant scores. (ELA 480 ERBW) (Math 420)

Calculator Policy and tips for SAT:

- Students may bring a scientific calculator to use. THS will not provide calculators.
- If students are bringing a calculator to use on the test, they need to practice using it on sample SAT mathematics questions before the test. Use a calculator with which you are familiar.
- All questions on the SAT can be answered without a calculator. The questions do not require complicated or tedious calculations.
- Don't buy an expensive, sophisticated calculator just to take the test. Although you can use them for the test, more sophisticated calculators are not required for any problem on the test.
- Don't try to use a calculator on every question. First, decide how to solve the problem, and then decide whether to use the calculator. The calculator is meant to aid you in problem solving select questions, not to get in the way.
- It may help to do scratch work in the test book. Get your thoughts down before using your calculator.
- Make sure your calculator is in good working order and that batteries are fresh. If your
 calculator fails during testing and you have no backup, you'll have to complete the test without
 it.
