Math: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Teachers will utilize word problems Story Sunshine Math to form a “common work problems” bank. Students will explain problems solutions in written form (Word Problem Wednesday) utilizing words, pictures, and numbers.. Exemplars will be utilized as models of thinking and teach children to self assess. Weekly, students will self assess their problem solving skills with the guidance of a rubric. Teacher will use the Gradual Release of Responsibility Model to instruct students in writing to communicate math thinking. Teachers will administer problem solving (math exemplar) assessments and score with a common rubric. Monthly, teachers will examine student work and determine instructional implications (collaboration). 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> Collaboratively analyze student work each month to determine effectiveness and make instructional adjustments.
