

World History, CP

Grade Level: 9

Credit: 1 unit

The goal of this course is to cover pre-history through modern times. This includes ancient civilization, classical history, the medieval world, the years of revolution, and modern history. Many geographical skills and materials will be reviewed and reinforced. The student will analyze and evaluate information and improve thinking and writing skills. It is anticipated that students will learn through the study of other cultures to consider other viewpoints and see themselves in a perspective of world history.

World History, Honors

Grade Level: 9

Credit: 1 unit

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U.S. History, CP

Grade Level: 10

Credit: 1 unit

Emphasis will be placed on developing research skills, retention of large amounts of information, and developing analytical skills in an approach to historic events. Requirements for the course include a book review, term paper, class project, essay writing, and keeping a history notebook.

U.S. History, Honors

Grade Level: 10

Credit: 1 unit

Emphasis will be placed on developing research skills, retention of large amounts of information, and developing analytical skills in an approach to historic events. Requirements for the course include a book review, term paper, class project, essay writing, and keeping a history notebook. Content covers American History from c.17th century to the present. Course will use debate, essays, art, music, literature, research projects and current events.

Economics, CP

Grade Level: 11

Credit: 1 unit

This course will examine the basic structure and operation of the American economic system. This required course is designed to deepen an understanding of the American economic system and fundamental economic principles. Emphasis is also placed on the economic institutions in the United States, the international marketplace, and comparative economic systems. This course will examine the basic structure and operation of the American economic system. Content covers the economic systems of the world with an emphasis on capitalism.

Economics, Honors

Grade Level: 11

Credit: 1 unit

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American Government, CP

Grade Level: 12

Credit: 1 unit

The student will gain a general background of government in which political behavior, principles of democracy, constitutional law, and structure of national and state governments will be highlighted. Requirements include notebooks, worksheets, essay writings, enrichment activities, and oral presentations. Instructional activities include readings, discussion, field trips, guest speakers, and audio-visual presentations. Some research is required to complete enrichment activities.

AP American Government

Grade Level: 11 or 12

Credit: 1 unit

The Advanced Placement Program enables willing and academically prepared students to pursue college-level studies with the opportunity to earn college credit, advanced placement, or both while still in high school. AP Exams are given each year in May. Students who earn a qualifying score on an AP Exam are typically eligible to receive college credit and/or placement into advanced courses in college. Every aspect of AP course and exam development is the result of collaboration between AP teachers and college faculty. They work together to develop AP courses and exams, set scoring standards, and score the exams. The student will gain a general background of government in which political behavior, principles of democracy, constitutional law, and structure of national and state governments will be highlighted. Requirements include extra outside class reading, notebooks, worksheets, essay writings, enrichment activities, and oral presentations.
