The inner strength to remain constant to a purpose, idea, or task in the face of obstacles. This includes dedication, consistency and having a positive attitude.

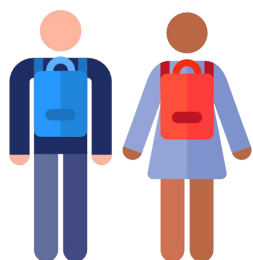
Respect

Being reliable and following through on commitments. This includes being responsible for your actions as a family member, teacher, student and citizen. You can demonstrate your responsibility through service to others and self control.

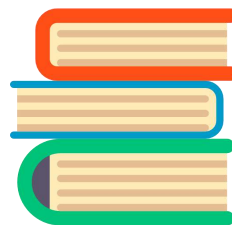

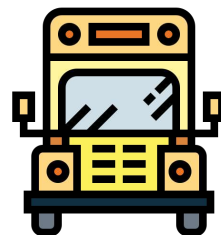

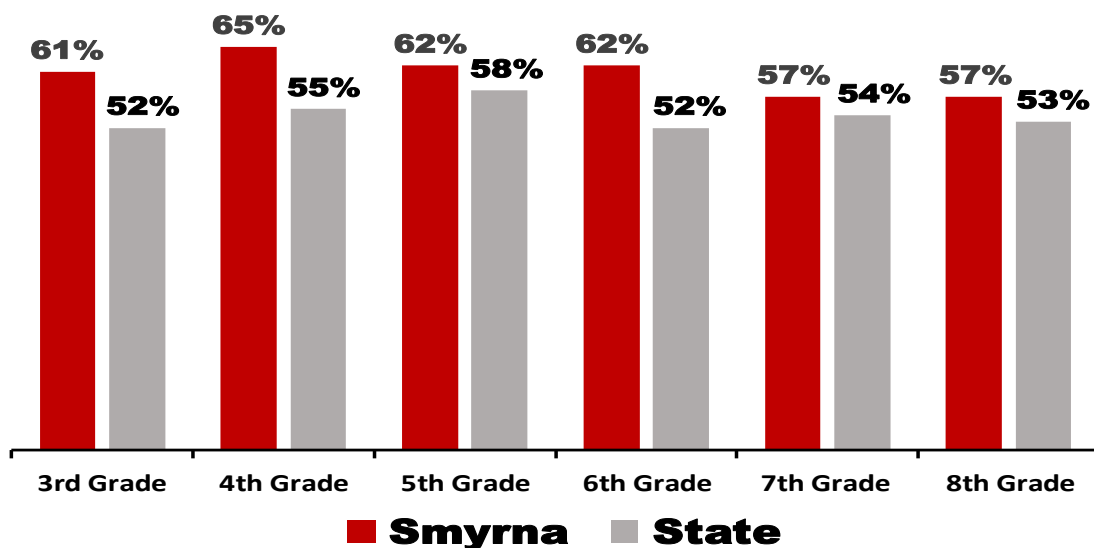

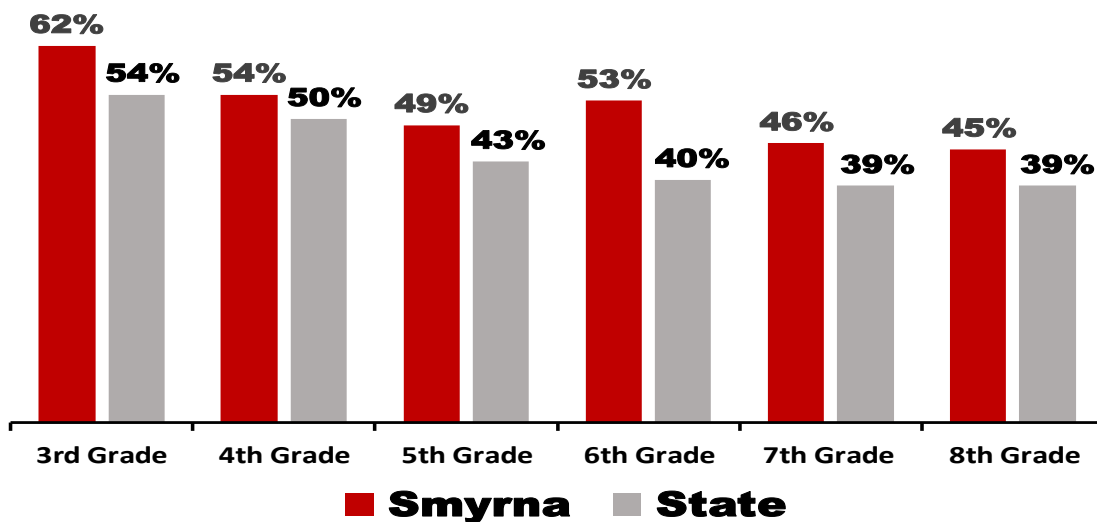
ELA Smarter Balanced Assessment

% proficient by grade level



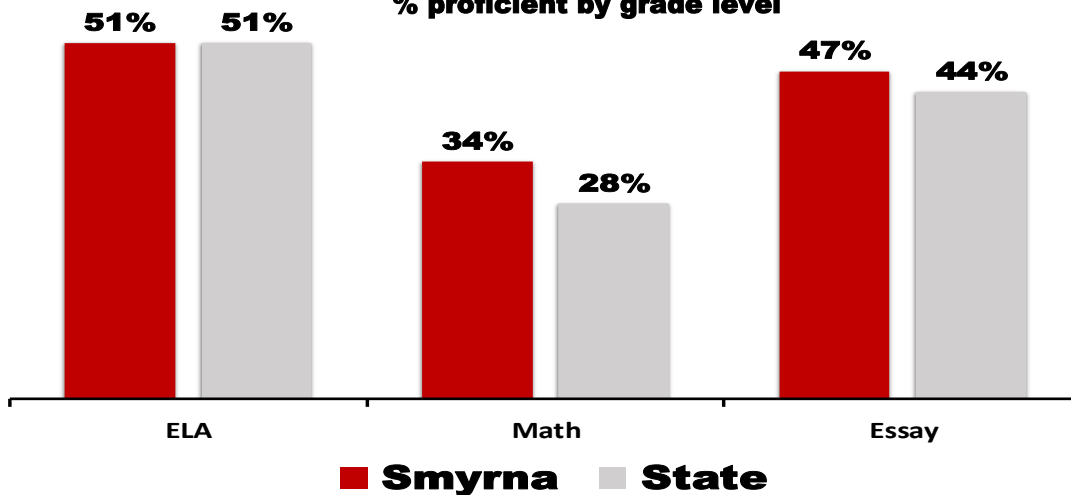
Math Smarter Balanced Assessment

% proficient by grade level



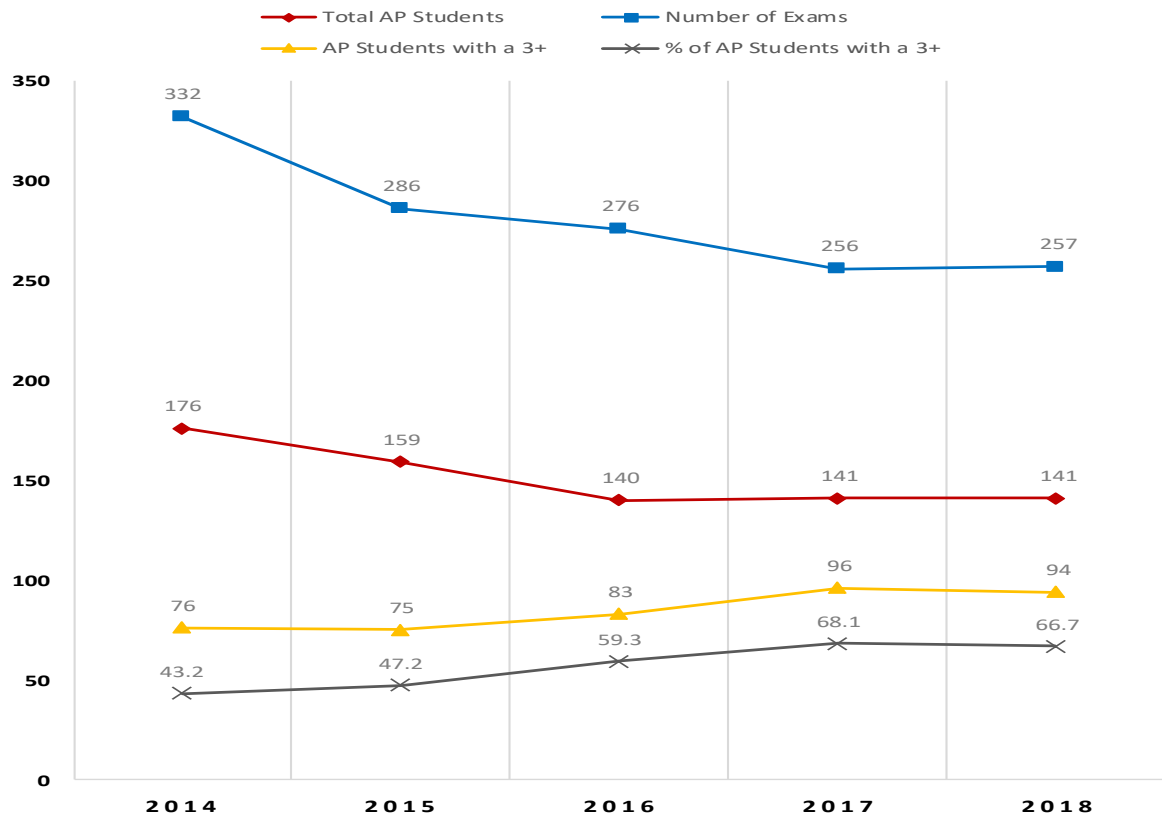
SAT Assessment

% proficient by grade level

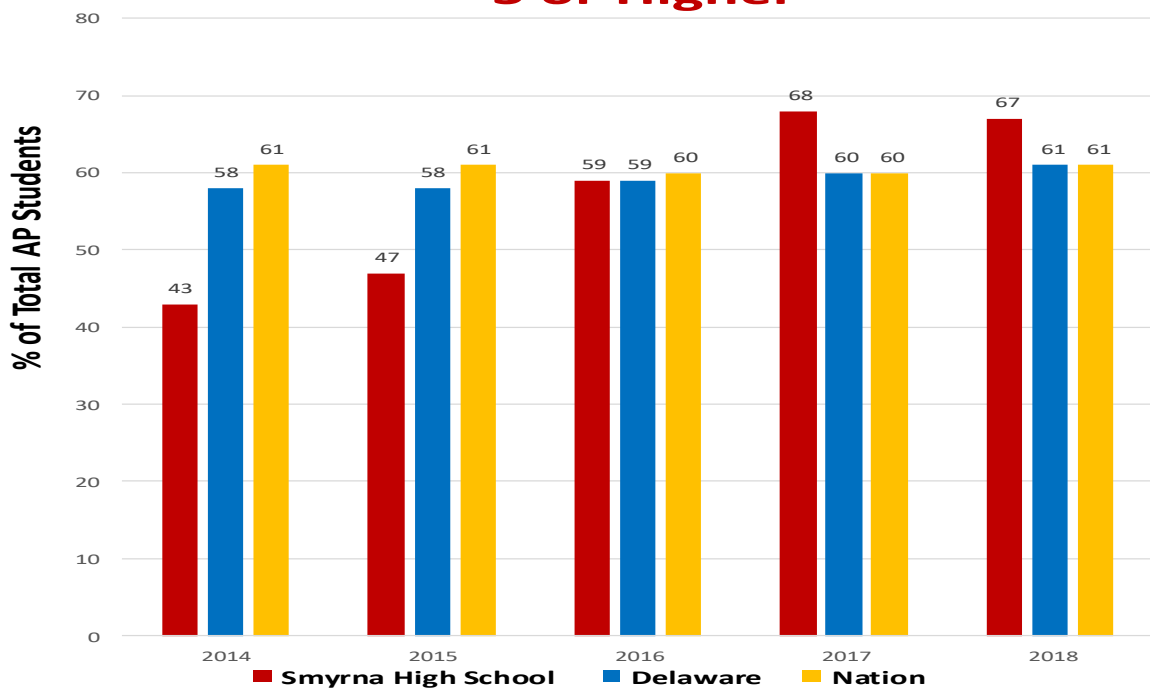

Percentage of AP Students Scoring 3 or Higher

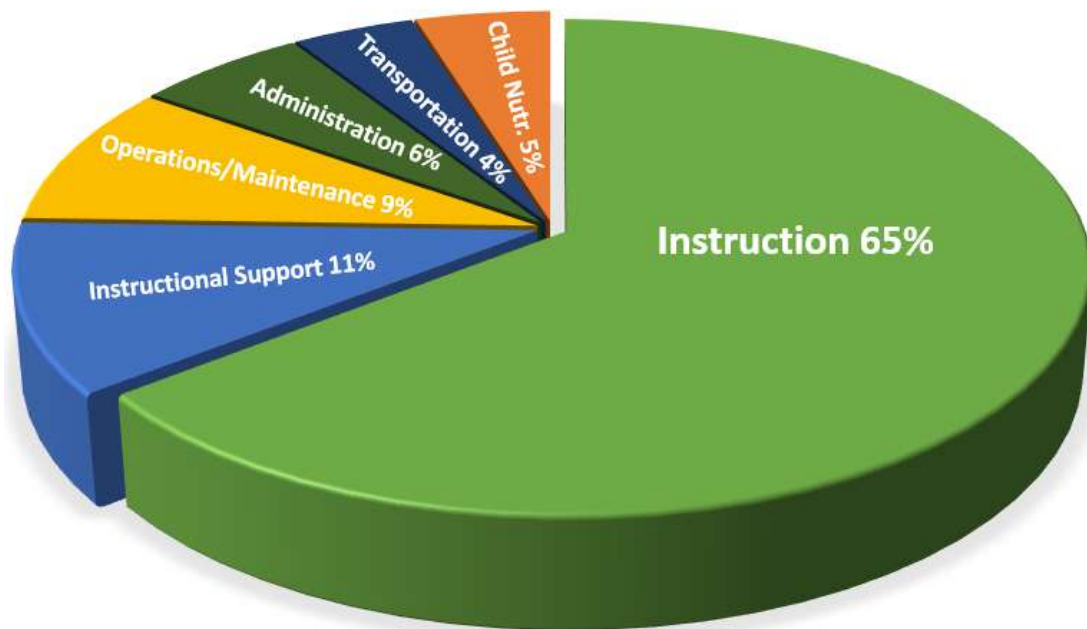

Financial Philosophy

The Smyrna School District recognizes that meticulous planning and organization of its financial affairs is critical to the efficient long-term operation of the district. The Smyrna School District maintains a fiscally conservative policy. District budgetary estimates and financial projections are based on a moderately conservative approach to funds projections with a balanced budget each fiscal year funded exclusively from current-year revenues. The Office of Curriculum and Instruction will make thoughtful, evidence-based decisions in an effort to provide leadership, resources, instructional strategies, and individualized support to educators in their pursuit of continuous, personalized, professional growth.

The Office of Curriculum and Instruction works with all educators and administrators within the Smyrna School District to improve the education of our students. The Office of Curriculum and Instruction is responsible for the adoption and implementation of all curriculum throughout the district. In addition to this, the team ensures that daily instruction reflects research-based best practice. In order to best serve Smyrna's students and teachers, the team must be fully-informed and up-to-date in current classroom practices. To accomplish this, the team schedules regular visits to our classrooms; this year, the Office of Curriculum and Instruction has visited more than 2,000 classrooms. These visits have led to meaningful professional development that is targeted to each building, grade-level, and teacher. The Office of Curriculum and Instruction conducted more than 60 unique opportunities for professional learning over the last year; totaling over 200 hours of training. While professional development is unique and targeted to the needs of the teacher, many of the sessions have addressed the "Fab 4" instructional practices that have been the focus of the district; clear goals, introductions/closings, distributed practice, and deep questioning. The Office of Curriculum will continue to provide high-quality instructional materials and professional development on research best practices in order so that our teachers may continue to provide inspired and exceptional education to all of our students.

OUR VISION

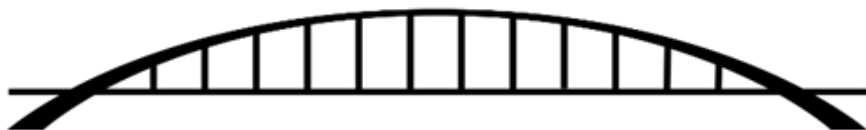
The Smyrna Special Services Team will provide students access to a dynamic education within the Smyrna School District that inspires and promotes each student's academic promise.

OUR MISSION

The Smyrna Special Services Team engages in collaboration and problem solving with staff, students, and families to develop meaningful, comprehensive plans to support students' success.

The Smyrna Special Services Office is growing. The Special Services Office serves students with disabilities (through an Individualized Education Program or Section 504 Plan), English Language Learners (ELL), and students who are homeless/displaced or truant. We also coordinate the district Title I program. We have approximately 50 staff members, which includes educational diagnosticians, school psychologists, speech-language pathologists, occupational/physical therapists, and ELL teachers and paraprofessionals. We also have an administrative assistant, an early childhood coordinator, a software support technologist, a social worker, a paraprofessional for homeless/displaced students, a paraprofessional for truancy, an assistive technology specialist, a reading specialist, a math specialist, a behavior analyst, and a transition coordinator.

The Special Services Office seeks to support students by collaborating with families, teachers, administrators, and community agencies. This year, our office has facilitated the Parent Advisory Council, the Teacher Advisory Council, Family Math and Reading Nights, the Winter Harvest, a school supply give away, and "Pumping Up for Kindergarten". The Special Services Office helps school teams review data to develop meaningful plans that support student success, both academically and behaviorally. Our team also provides direct services to students to support their developmental and social/emotional needs (e.g., specialized reading and math instruction, second language acquisition instruction, individual and group counseling, social skills development, mentoring, speech-language and occupational/physical therapy). The Special Services Office monitors student progress and makes sure that students are receiving appropriate accommodations and modifications within the least restrictive environment that supports their needs. Classroom walkthroughs and audits are completed to ensure compliance with state and federal regulations. Our focus is on reducing barriers that prevent students from fully engaging in their educational experience.

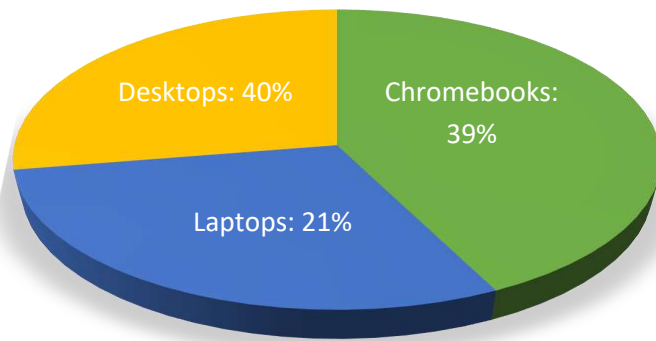

Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP) is a USDA funded grant for North Smyrna Elementary. The grant allows Child Nutrition Staff to provide fresh fruits and vegetables to students three days per week. The Child Nutrition Program received \$23,413.05 for school year 2017/2018.

Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)- USDA funded program that allows the Child Nutrition program to serve afterschool meals at Smyrna High, Smyrna Middle, John Bassett Moore Intermediate, North Elementary and Smyrna Elementary Schools at no cost to students. Students who stay afterschool for academic enrichment, clubs, sports, etc. are eligible for a meal. Approximately 34,000 afterschool meals were served in the 2017/2018 school year.

Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)- This provision, in school year 2017/2018, allowed the Smyrna Child Nutrition Program to serve 108,983 breakfast and 212,525 lunch meals at no cost to students at North Elementary, Smyrna Elementary, and John Bassett Moore Intermediate School.

Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)- This USDA based program allowed the Smyrna Child Nutrition Program to serve 1657 meals in the summer of 2018 at four locations in our community.

Custodial and maintenance staff attended all required training to stay current on safety procedures and policies.

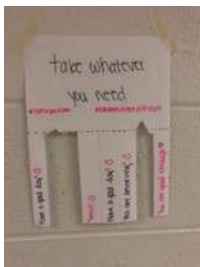
The staff works with building administrators throughout the year to make all schools safe. We also work with the community to provide clean spaces for them to hold trainings, host sporting events and other community support activities.

Approximately 180 of these are our littlest Eagles, beginning their Smyrna School District academic career in NSE's Early Childhood Program with the remainder in our elementary setting from kindergarten to 4th grade. Our experienced staff is dedicated to providing every student with an unrivaled educational environment fostering academic engagement and growth, self-respect, and strong relationships. We embrace and teach the Smyrna School District Community Core Values of respect, responsibility, perseverance, integrity, and compassion. As part of our continuing tradition of excellence at Smyrna School District, we offer Spanish Immersion, Early Childhood, STEP Enrichment program for 3rd and 4th grade students, and the Comprehensive Learning Program. In addition, our school participates in numerous programs and activities for students including: Read Across America, Read for the Record, Scripps School Spelling Bee, Girls on the Run, NSE Spirit Team, and NSE 4th Grade Basketball League.

Clayton Intermediate School is the newest addition in the Smyrna School District as it opened its doors in September of 2012. CIS offers a comprehensive Common Core State Standard-based education to students in grades 5 & 6. Currently, Bridges and Illustrative Math Curriculum, Wonders and Pearson Reading series, Comprehensive Science programs and Next Generation Social Studies provide the materials and structure of our daily instruction. We are a Learning Focused school in our instructional approach and strategies utilized. In addition to differentiated instruction in reading, writing, math, science, and social studies, offerings of music, chorus, band, physical education, art, library science, and technology round out the complete academic program for all grades.

The S.T.E.P. (Smyrna Triad Enrichment Program) provides advanced, hands-on learning for our gifted students. Our small group special education and support services team create and implement specialized education program for students who are differently-abled. This includes the use of innovative and technology-driven programs such as System 44, Read 180 and Math 180.

CIS offers before-school care through our child nutrition and support staff in the CIS cafeteria called "Breakfast Club." After school care is provided by a site-based group managed by the Boys and Girls Club.

CIS offers many organization and clubs for students to exercise their gifts and talents. These organizations and clubs are Student Council, Safety Patrol, Odyssey of the Mind, Art Club, Technology Club, PBS Committee, School Newspaper, Girls on the Run, Heart and Soul, Irun, Drama Club, Recycling Club, Basketball Club, Homework Club, Volleyball, and Dance Club.

Smyrna Middle School serves 986 seventh and eighth grade students in the Smyrna School District. Through a two-day, 90-minute block schedule, students have the opportunity to take not only their core courses but PE, Health, Home Ec, Band, Chorus, Agricultural Science, STEM, Creative Writing, Band, Art, Spanish, Digital Storytelling, and Computer Tech.

Students have the opportunity to participate in a wide variety of clubs including Go Baby Go, Special Olympics, Book Club, Sign Language, FCA, FFA, BPA, Math League, and Honor Society. Sports offerings include cross country, volleyball, football, field hockey, soccer, cheerleading, basketball, wrestling, baseball, softball, lacrosse and track. Congratulations to our undefeated Volleyball team and our cheerleaders who won 1st place at the state competition!

Academically, our students are using a new math series this year, Illustrative Math, and a new science curriculum called TCI. Both programs ask students to challenge their thinking and analyze materials as they learn. We have also started a course where students who are behind in their learning can work to catch up using an online curriculum while still participating in their core classes each day.

Using Restorative Practices and considering Trauma Informed Care we are working as a staff to promote wellness with our students. We start each week with "Mindfulness Mondays" and provide students with opportunities to seek the support of our counselors to advocate for themselves in their learning. It is our goal to provide a safe learning environment where students can perform at their best each day.

The Smyrna High School motto is "Making Connections & Building Dreams". It is the goal of our staff to provide an educational environment that enables all of our 1560 students to connect the content of their classes and involvement in school activities to their personal dreams for the future. We provide many different educational settings for our students including Dual-Enrollment, AP, Honors, Academy classes, Team-taught classes, and small-group settings. These settings enable us to meet the needs of a variety of learners with many different levels of support. Some highlights from the past year are:

- 67% of AP students were successful on Exams; 6% above the state average!
- 3 students were awarded the "Give Something Back Foundation" scholarship; receiving a full scholarship to the University of Delaware.
- The Business Department is adding two new career pathways, Computer Science and Business Information Management, to support student interest and career opportunities.

- Our "We the People" team of students was selected to represent the state of Delaware at National "We the People" Competition.
