THE LEADER - THE WORK- THE IMPACT

Dr. Morcease J. Beasley is a charismatic, visionary, and transformational leader who has dedicated his life to ensuring that thousands of children receive a quality education. In just a short period of time, he has been instrumental in transforming the culture of our district and helping the school system as well as surrounding community transcend a conversation that focuses on accreditation to one that speaks pridefully about the world class programs which our students experience. He has done a remarkable job of setting the tone, charting the course of the district, and working closely with the Board of Education and community to cultivate greater coherence of the work.

For decades, it has been echoed by many leaders in education that when it comes to producing more promising outcomes for children in our nation's schools, *leadership matters*. From these practices grew the district's five focus areas, which are: (1) fostering academically challenging, relevant, and safe learning environments; (2) providing wraparound support for learners and parents; (3) providing ongoing professional learning to increase pedagogy, capacity, and efficacy; (4) engaging all internal and external stakeholders, and (5) reimagining our school district's communication strategies and processes to restore trust and pride and to empower all stakeholders. He has done this by making a concerted effort to communicate the needs and accomplishments of the district in a variety of formats: through video recordings, written reports, emails, social media, blogs, communication with the media, public meetings, and attendance at school events. Dr. Beasley is highly present and purposeful in his interactions with internal and external stakeholders.

Dr. Beasley maintains a laser-like focus on effective processes that result in continuous improvement for educational systems. He does that through cultivating positive and sincere relationships with his staff, students, and community, and by establishing clear expectations of performance. HIGHLIGHTS OF THE JOURNEY

In just **THREE YEARS**, having a keen focus on five core tenets have led to copious successful outcomes. Some of these include, but are not limited to the following:

- Adoption/revision of school improvement framework to achieve greater coherence and operate more effectively towards producing district-wide improvement and increases in student outcomes, resulting from a culture of high-performance
- Creation of a Strategic Improvement Plan for the school district to chart a path towards creating a culture of high performance
- Establishment of Superintendent Advisory Groups (10) and expansion of community meetings titled Critical Conversations, Real Talk Sessions and State of the Schools Annual Addresses to engage all stakeholders in open dialogue and transparency to strengthen relations between the school district and all facets of the community; along with increased stakeholder climate and satisfaction surveys
- Revitalization of the school district's budget to stabilize expenditures and
 establishing a compensation study to ensure there are no disparities in the
 employee pay scale. Increased CCPS fund balance to \$70 Million by reducing the
 districts operating costs by 50%
- Over the past three years the district has seen increasing numbers of professional staff being retained. In 2017-18 the Retention Rate was 75.59 percent. That number increased to 81.73 percent in 2018-19 and continued its upward climb to 84.14 percent in 2019-20, an overall increase in retention of 8.55 percent. The district has reduced vacancies from 633 in July 2017 to 306 in July 2019. At present, the district has 137 vacancies. To further improve recruitment and retention efforts, a Recruitment Task Force was established in the 2018-2019 School Year
- Increases in the district's graduation rate to 69.6%. For the first time since 2011, all CCPS comprehensive high schools have graduation rates above 72%
- In the 2018-2019 school year, 42 out of 60 eligible Clayton County Public Schools (an increase of 9 schools from previous year) Beat the Odds by surpassing their predicted College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI) score
- An increase in the percent of students who are participating in Advanced Learning/ Accelerated courses, leading to increases in the percent of students scoring a three or higher on the Advanced Placement exam; and over 700 more students participating in the Dual Enrollment program – resulting in more college and career ready; Seven of the District's high schools were named by the State Superintendent Richard Woods as Advanced Placement (AP) Honor Schools for 2018













- · Reduction in student absenteeism and disciplinary infractions
- Expansion of course offerings and CTAE pathways to reflect Dr. Beasley's understanding that Clayton County is a part of a global hub, and our students must be postured to compete and secure these high-skilled and high-wage jobs
- Known as the Fine Arts Capital South of Atlanta, CCPS has a fully articulated K-12 Fine Arts program and state-of-the-art Performing Arts Center (PAC) to host renowned performances of the Fine Arts Magnet programs featuring a 6,000 square foot auditorium stage supported with professional quality sound and lighting
- Plans to build a Clayton County College and Career Academy to help students
 explore career and higher education opportunities by offering training in aviation
 mechanics/avionics, artificial intelligence (including drones and robotics),
 distribution and logistics and culinary arts pathways
- Expansion of School Choice program offerings. Some programs include: Dual Language Immersion [Spanish, French, Chinese, Arabic], Early College and Magnet Programs, Cambridge Assessment International Education, and International Baccalaureate Program
- More stakeholders (e.g. students, parents, staff, businesses, faith-based community, etc.) engaged through the year-long Superintendent-led Critical Conversations and community forums
- A more coherent Professional Development Program to increase capacity and mentoring for leaders, teachers and students
- Implementation and continued expansion of the Extending Learning Beyond the Classroom initiative, increasing the number of students who have been provided laptop computers for use in the classroom and at home to increase academic achievement — established additional online reading and math tools to eliminate students' deficits and to improve student achievement as part of the Extending Learning Beyond the Classroom experience
- Enhancements to the district's STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) approach to implement a STEMulating Culture of High Performance by infusing STEM mindset into all content areas in all grade levels to apply knowledge and real-world connections in one's daily life
- Transforming summer remediation to Summer STEM Camps in order to engage students in real world learning where they apply the concepts of STEM









- Implementation of CCPS Legislative Priorities by working collaboratively with the local/state legislative delegation and officials to enact and support initiatives in the best interest of the students and local community at-large
- Expansion of prominent business/corporate, community, collegiate, faith-based, and governmental partnerships for the school district
- Increased the number of CCPS Class of 2019 graduates to over 3,000, first time
 in the history of the school system (and collected more than \$125 million dollars
 in academic, athletic, Georgia Hope, POSSE and Zell Miller Scholarships)
- CCPS Class of 2019 first 68 students to receive a Civic Engagement Diploma Seal-awarded to high school seniors who recognize the importance of serving their community and taking informed action in our democracy according to the Georgia Department of Education
- Implementation of the HBCU Promise-Initiative, a collaborative partnership with various Colleges/Universities Presidents to place students in a school of their choice with waived fees, funding resources when applicable along with special benefits as an enrolled CCPS student
- More than 80 students in CCPS Class of 2019 graduated with Associate's Degrees from various institutions.
- Class of 2019 members were awarded \$21 million in funding through their involvement in the Infinite Scholars Program.
- Awarded the Classes of 2018 & 2019 Salutatorians/Valedictorians computer laptops for their academic achievements









CLAYTON COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS "COMMITTED TO HIGH PERFORMANCE"

Clayton County Public Schools (CCPS) is fully accredited by AdvancED – Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Council on Accreditation and School Improvement. Serving more than 55,000 students, Clayton County Public Schools is ranked among the 100 largest school districts in the U.S. and is the fifth-largest school system in Georgia.



The system has 39 primary/elementary schools (including one public charter), 17 middle schools (including one public charter), 12 high schools, one alternative education center, one psychological education center, and one multi-purpose education center. Included in this number are five school-wide magnet themed schools, 12 magnet programs, one state-certified STEM program, one Cognia (AdvancED) certified STEM program, and two International Baccalaureate Candidate schools. The school district is highly diversified with 90 different ethnicities and countries represented. Seventy-two (72) different languages are spoken, with Spanish and Vietnamese as the two major languages spoken. The district is proud that two of its high schools are among the top 50 Best High Schools in the United States as published by the US News and World Report.

Clayton County Public Schools pivotal points of interest include but are not limited to (1) increase students' readiness for early learning, (2) continue to attract the best and the brightest to lead and teach in our school system, and (3) ensure high quality teaching and learning that continue to produce CCPS graduates who can think critically, communicate, collaborate, and create in meaningful ways. It is a priority of this administration to foster programs and projects that will continue to set this district apart from others while preparing our scholars to compete globally and internationally.

S.P.L.O.S.T. PROJECT UPDATES

Thank you to all Clayton County constituents and our partners in education for voting yes to the Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST) VI referendum on March 19, 2019. The highest SPLOST rate passed with a 77% approval. The SPLOST will be for the term of year 2020 - 2024 for a total of \$280 million. SPLOST VI will be utilized for the new construction of facilities, major renovations and modifications to existing school facilities as well as transportation and technology needs for the district.

Clayton County Public School District is changing the outcomes of Clayton County community with a student-focused path of improvement. Clayton County constituents one cent tax dollars will be spent on the following school-based capital projects.
