## **Program Information**

Students in the Summer Bridge program will take two classes during the Summer 2021 B Session, SLS 1101 College Success and an additional course of their choosing between:

- · ENC 1101 English I
- · SPC 1608 Speech Communication
- HUM 2020 Experiencing the Humanities
- · AMH 2020 US History 1865-Present

Seminole State has multiple learning options so students can select courses to fit their preferred learning style. Whether it is by taking classes remotely, in-person or a combination of the two with our hybrid courses, there is an option for everyone. Embedded tutors and librarians will help introduce the students to the resources available at the College.

## **Program Eligibility**

To be eligible to enroll in this program, students must:

- Be a 2021 high school graduate interested in earning an Associate in Arts (A.A.) degree.
- · Submit the Interest Form.
- · Submit an Application for Admission for an A.A. degree for Summer Term 2021 and be accepted to Seminole State.
- · Complete the First-Time-In-College Students Steps to Enroll.
- Submit a 2020-21 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
