Students enrolled in both classes may use the same assignment, however the essay requirements for the classes will be different (see below for further information).



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Book Selection: Where Men Win Glory By Jon Krakauer



Overview:

Pat Tillman walked away from a multimillion-dollar NFL contract to join the Army and became an icon of post-9/11 patriotism. When he was killed in Afghanistan two years later, a legend was born. But the real Pat Tillman was much more remarkable, and considerably more complicated than the public knew...

A stunning account of a remarkable young man's heroic life and death, from the bestselling author of Into the Wild, Into Thin Air, and Under the Banner of Heaven.

Assignment:

- 1) Students should read and annotate the novel referring to the methods outlined in the handout "How to Mark a Text". Students should pay particular attention to the development of the author's argument. How does Krakauer formulate his argument, what evidence does he provide to clarify his position, what evidence is there, if any, of authorial bias? (please note, these are guiding questions for your annotations, not specific questions that need to be answered).
- Upon completion of the novel, students should complete the attached chart citing important Rhetorical Devices used in the novel (i.e., persuasive strategies, tone, diction, etc.).
- 3) During the first week of school, students in both classes will write an essay in class on the novel. The essay will be a response to identifying Krakauer's purpose and the development of his argument. This will count as the first timed essay of the quarter for both AP classes.
