Principal's Message:

Dear Stevenson Ohana,

Time is melting! I cannot believe that it is December already. Time flies when you're having fun!

This year we set out to return to a state of normalcy by resuming co-curricular activities such as athletics, band performances, blended SLC options (in person and virtual), BUCtoberfest, blended parent meetings, instruction in person for 98% of our students, Distance Learning for 2%, after school tutoring, and the optional use of face masks. What we have learned is how to be flexible and that everything is figureoutable provided that we are patient and want to figure it out.

Student Led Conferences start next week. Students have spent time selecting evidence of their learning and reflecting on their progress. Research shows that when students are involved in reflecting on their learning and articulate their thinking, they grow as thinkers. It is a good time of year for students to reflect on what they have learned, set goals on what they aspire to accomplish next semester, and to even determine how they will meet these goals. In the beginning of the year I explained to students that their responsibility as a learner is to grow and take ownership of their learning. I tasked the teachers to increase the rigor and to provide timely and focused feedback to students so that they can make corrections along the way. My hope is that students are able to share what they are learning at school and why during their conferences.

My other hope for students is that they practice gratitude, appreciation, and care daily. I wish this for students so that they lead a joyful and peaceful life. Unhappiness often stems from desiring that which we do not have. And yes, some of our students really struggle with finding joy. So, we remind them that we care for and about them, we will listen in order to understand them, and that we will help them think about what else they can look forward to. *"Hope is the thing with feathers,"* (Dickinson) and I hope that we are all inspired to be brave to do the right thing, to consider a different perspective in order to understand, and to share a common goal which is centered around peace.

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Math

In Math 8, we learned about proportional relationships and slopes from tables and graphs. We also learned how to calculate slopes using similar triangles and the slope formula as well as how to graph and write an equation of the line in the form y=mx and y=mx + b.

In Algebra 1, we learned about solving systems of linear equations graphically and algebraically using substitution and elimination methods. We will wrap up module 4 with solving 2 variable linear inequalities and systems of linear inequalities.

Physical Education

The 8th grade PE classes have just finished the weight training unit at the Thanksgiving break. We have just started our DARE program sponsored by the Honolulu Police Department with Officer Ben Lloyd. We will be finishing off the semester with tennis.

ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) / EL Program

EL students will be preparing for the Annual WIDA ACCESS Testing that will take place from January 9th to February 23, 2023. Please look out for a letter that will have more information. Thank you!

This quarter's writing focus for ESOL was Informational/Explanatory writing. All students worked on their Informational Essential Questions on one influential person who changed the world for the better. We partnered with Social Studies, Science and English teachers to integrate writing prompts with other content standards. Essential Questions:

- 1. Who is someone that has made an impact on their lives or the world?
- 2. What do you admire about a person who has overcome a tough situation?
- 3. Who is a person who has turned failure to success?
- 4. What is the social impact of natural phenomenon?

All ESOL teachers focused on the Writing Process to provide students with consistency in the Writer's Workshop run lessons. Our students practiced writing traits of Ideas, Organization, Voice, and Conventions this quarter, with sharpening their skills in source citation and text evidence. Students are improving and gaining writing stamina and skills in writing structure that will support them in future writing assignments for all subject areas.

8th Grade U.S. History


We have ended our unit on Westward Expansion, to include the rapid technological, sociopolitical, and economic changes between 1801-1861 as America grew from its size of 13 colonies to a nation that expanded "from sea to shining sea." Students have learned about noteworthy inventions of the Industrial Revolution and how they will set the stage for the Civil War (which we will begin studying after the Winter Break).

There is a special opportunity coming up for 8th grade students to complete a six week independent research with me for the George Washington Leadership Study. If students want to complete this opportunity, they need to sign up by December 12th so that their medals can be ordered over the winter break. The study will begin shortly after the Winter Break and will take one recess per week (students will come to room 118 during recess on Wednesdays to receive the study challenge for each week).

Ho'Onui Ike students should have a final first draft of their projects submitted by December 16th so that I can give them feedback to help them be competition ready in January. The registration (which includes final submission of finished projects) for the District Competition for National History Day closes on February 9th.
